

THE SESSION AT AN END.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT TO BE BROUGHT ON SATURDAY.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—In the House of Commons to-night before the third reading of the Appropriation Bill, Charles E. Lewis (Conservative) moved an official inquiry into the conduct of the magistracy and police of London during July, when he said the police violently attacked respectable citizens on the occasion of the demonstration of the poll, causing a number of deaths.

Mr. Morley said the whole case rested upon the evidence of a letter from the Bishop of London and the personal testimony of Mr. Lewis. But Mr. Lewis's evidence was not so much accepted as the testimony of great or decisive value. A more trumpety affair had never been brought before the House.
