UNION STOCK MARKETS TORONTO

The high values revealed at the Union Stock Yards last week served to bring in a heavy offering of cattle for the opening market this week. Far too many cattle were received yesterday. In fact about half of these would easily have met the whole demand. The rushing of the packers to market saw a repetition of the old story—a decidedly slow trade and lower prices. Packers announced at the opening of the market that they were out to buy cattle from 60c to 75c a cwt. lower. Early sales were about steady, the packers picking up a few baby heaves and odd choice offerings, with the small butchers also doing a little buying.

Very little trading had been transacted before prices slacked considerably and values generally were off 50c a cwt. Buying was more or less draggy all day, and at 2 o'clock not many more than 2,000 had passed over the scales. The offering was a comparatively heavy one, comparing with 2,500 a week ago, 3,000 on April 10, and 3,700 on the third of the month. The action of the market at this week is somewhat similar to the first week of the month, when heavier receipts on the first two markets of the week sent values lower. There was little buying except by the packers, the exporters not being in the market at all. Activity in stockers and feeders was listless, as farmers do not generally buy on a falling market.

The offering of calves was a decidedly heavy one, and despite the fact that the Jewish buyers were again in the market, the trade was slow. Values eased about 21 per cwt., with a few tops bringing from \$10 to \$10.50.

The bulk of the calves sold from \$4.50 to \$8. Sheep had a better sale, a couple of heavyweights bringing \$10 per hundred, and the bulk of the good from \$8 to \$9. Some yearlings brought from \$12 to \$14.50 with spring lambs changing hands from \$8 to \$15.

A fairly light run of hogs resulted in this market, strengthening a little, most of the sales being made at \$13.25 on the fed and watered basis.

GOLDEN WEDDING

Not many families have been so richly blessed as Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Huber, who celebrated their fiftieth anniversary of their marriage on Monday of this week. On April 23rd, 1872, Mr. and Mrs. Huber were united in wedlock in the Carlisle R. C. Church, Rev. Father Franz conducting the ceremony. They made their home in Carrick and to them were born seven sons and one daughter, all of whom are now married, and all excepting one son, Peter, residing in Carrick. All were united on the happy occasion on Monday. The family and many friends and relatives assembled at the St. Ignatius Church, Deermerton, where High Mass was read by Rev. R. M. Haller, who congratulated Mr. and Mrs. Huber publicly and commended them for the exemplary manner of their lives. The aged pair were made the recipients of a large number of valuable presents by the children and friends. Besides their seven sons and one daughter, they are proud of having 19 grandchildren, nearly all of whom were present to help celebrate their half century of married life.

It has been estimated that if all the cars that were registered in Canada up to the end of 1921 were used to end they would form a procession of 1,760 miles long. In other words the first car would be entering Winnipeg when the last one was just leaving Halifax. A conservative estimate of the annual gas consuming possibilities of these four hundred and sixty-nine thousand and more vehicles places the figure at nine million gallons, which represents an annual gasoline expenditure of approximately two and a half million dollars. It is estimated that this amount of gasoline was consumed last year, and that an even greater amount will be required this year by reason of the natural increase in the number of cars in use.
