

These mixers are great galvanized tanks laid horizontally, fitted with a worm that revolves them slowly, connected respectively with the oil tanks and the launders and arranged in sets of three. In the revolutionary process the oil picks up a proportion of the mineral and passes out at the lower end to a separator on the next floor be-low. The residue from the first mixer passes into the second, receives more passes into the second, receives more oil and the affinity of oil for min-eral is again exploited. A similar pro-cess takes place in the third tank in each series, after which the system is regarded as complete so far as the saving of mineral is concerned. 



SELIUM, THE NEWEST METAL

The announcement comes from Germany that a Frenchman, Edward Mollard, has reported to the state departent the discovery of another metal.⁴ This new metal is called selium and is both lighter and stronger than aluminum. 

The Mediterranean and the Carribean are open seas, to which the whole world may enter. Hudson bay, by the Washington convention of 1818, is a closed sea. It belongs unquestionably to the Canadian people.

No diplomacy won this great inland ocean for the British Empire. In 1818 it was regarded as a barren sea of ice, and was thrown to the British side, c.s. a grocer might throw an extra lump of sugar in the scale.

But as civilization trickles northward more and more is shown the value lands and northern waters. And in late years, as their value appears, a well defined movement has been observed in the American republic to open the closed sea question.



The Rossland public school trustees are not the only trustees who have had. the question of non-resident pupils under advisement. The Phoenix board has decided upon a line of action that will certainly bring the question to a showdown, having concluded to bar non-resident pupils from the schools after October 1 unless the department pays for their education. The matter was not regarded as of sufficient importance locally to justify extreme steps so long as the department of education gave an assurance that it. would be taken up on its merits.

Non-resident pupils in attendance at schools supported in part by munici-palities have been a thorn in the side of the education department for some months.

In the Rossland schools, for instance, there are probably not more than a score of children whose parents reside outside of the city and who thus avoid the payment of the municipality's two per cent tax levy for educational pur-poses. These children are distributed among the lower grades of the Central and Cook avenue schools, and if they were eliminated the cost of conducting the two institutions would not be lowered by one cent, so that from the purely practical standpoint no special reason exists for taking such action or for making a special levy or


