It is no wonder that the Grit Party in Nova Scotia is fast becoming demoralized and showing signs of dissolution. From a once strong party with fixed views and principles it now grasps at every straw to keep itself afloat. Each succeeding six months shows a new cry raised to do duty instead of a policy which it has neither the courage or ability to originate. Since 1886 view the Grit Party in Canada. First the repeal struggle was perpetrated upon the people of Nova Scotia. Then the riot cry was used with equally satisfactory results as they supposed. Both these sectional cries, dangerous alike to the peace and welfare of Canada, reacted upon their guilty authors, and the people of Canada at the general elections of 1887 fully rebuked the party which sought to win success by such unworthy means. Filled in these attempts at grasping power, and utterly destitute of any further policy of their own, we find them compelled to go to the United States and adopt the "Commercial Union" theories of Battersworth and Wiman. Such every grit paper was ringing with the praises of their newest idol: a plan investigation simply revealed it to be an annexation scheme disguised and then it ended. Now the Great Liberal Policy is again changed. This time it is, if we believe the latest reports, "Unrestricted Reciprocity," simply the old one set to a different key. The Grit leaders do not allow sufficient time for their own followers to comprehend one scheme before it is dropped and another takes its place. The Great Body of the Electors are not to be thus gullied by such Political Tricksters. The Liberal Conservative Party (the party of progress) has the brains to originate a Policy and the courage to stand by it. Sir Adams Archibald in this contest represents a Policy sustained in two General Elections and innumerable bye elections. Stand by him.

UNRESTRICTED RECIPROcity MEANS UNRESTRICTED RUIN.

The Grit Leaders in their frantic endeavour to delude the Farmers of the Country with Bental Censor that though Unrestricted Reciprocity would be fatal to the great Manufacturing Industries of Canada, it would prove a great boon for the Farming Class. To use their own expression it would be "taking the Manufactures by the throat." Now let us calmly consider how the Farmers are to be benefited by destroying our manufacturing interests. Over \$124,000,000 of Capital is to be invested in manufacturing. It is estimated that at least 37 per cent of that sum would be wiped out by this Policy. Unrestricted Reciprocity. The entire business of the Country would be stagnated. Think you the Farmers would escape, and not be affected thereby? To come down to our own County. Think you a Policy that would close the Factories in Truro and throw the immense number of men employed here out of Employment. That would they gain by this side spread ruin? simply a market in Boston, New York, for their Lumber Potatoes Eggs, wool etc. That is all that is promised by any one in favor of this ruinous Policy. Well if we read the late Washington Despatches, we will find that the "Mills" Tariff Bill passed a few days ago makes every one of these articles free. The success of the Democratic Party (already a foregone conclusion) in the Presidential Election, this Fall, will

give us all these advantages, without our sacrificing a dollar of invested capital. Dont let our Farmers be in a hurry to ruin our manufacturing interest but vote against Cyrus Eaton and the Policy of Unrestricted Hamburg.

I have all my life owed very much to the kindness of the men of Colchester, and felt that, if for any reason they thought that in the public interest I ought to assume the responsibility, I was bound to subordinate my personal convenience and comfort to the duty I owed to them, and therefore, though with extreme reluctance, I consented at last to accept the nomination. I am quite aware how much better you would have been served, if our friends could have rallied round a younger and more active candidate; and I wish sincerely that they had seen their way to do it. You may rest assured however that your interests will receive my best attention and that I shall not shrink from any of the duties which my acceptance of the nomination imposes on me.

UNRESTRICTED RECIPROcity AND COLCHESTER.

"Commercial Union," with the United States was not a name to conjure with in Canada, so the policy of inequitable annexation was repudiated by the vast majority of the Halifax Chronicle had a series of amusing articles on the question. They were amusing from the manner in which their own arguments were refuted by their circumlocutory logic. In view of the pending election in Colchester an attempt is being made by the Chronicle to galvanize a little life into the moribund Commercial Union fall. Its article on the Acadia Mines, some of the utter want of knowledge to the facts and true condition of the iron trade. That the Steel Company of Canada was not a success financially is well known, and none know the reasons so well as the people of Londonderry themselves. NOMINATION

Nomination day passed off pleasantly and quietly, owing to the dullness of the day a number of farmers embraced the opportunity of being present. At one o'clock Sheriff Crowe opened the Court. Mr. Fulton's nomination paper was the first handed in, it had quite a number of signatures attached. Sir Adams Archibald's closely followed with a host of signatures. There appeared some little delay about Mr. Entons, and it was thought by many that the crisis had wisely decided to throw up the sponge, but after a while a remnant of the once strong party brought forward the necessary document, which was more conspicuous for names which did not appear on it, than for those which grace it.

The time set apart for each speaker was one hour. Sir Adams was the first to rise, and the old time vein which so characterized him in his younger days seemed to rebound back with double force. He commenced in a cool and deliberate manner, stated his facts, advanced his theories, and then proceeded to argue his points and substantiate his position by his past record, and common sense arguments. He rode over the grits

rough shot and showed conclusively their present position and utter destitution of a policy, and the impregnability of their latest fall. He was heartily applauded throughout and took his seat amidst roars of applause, having thoroughly captured the mass of intelligent voters present, and disheartening the few hide bound grits who were present. Mr. Entons was the next to follow, and made a very weak and ineffective speech. He pronounced himself fairly and squarely in favor of unrestricted reciprocity much to the discomfort of a few of his most intelligent followers who had hoped and would rather he had kept silent on that question, he harped away on the old string about our Sons and Daughters going to the United States to seek employment. No enthusiasm was manifested during his whole mournful tale, much of his time was devoted to the abuse of Mr. Fulton and the third party, which he compared to a poole dog which would be neglected on the 15th Mr. Fulton was the next to respond, and in a clear, distinct, and forcible manner defined his position in this present contest, stating that the third party had come to Colchester to stay, he then proceeded to show up grit agencies and show their real position in the temperance cause, after a neat and well delivered speech Mr. Fulton took his seat winning many friends from the grit ranks who are now thoroughly disgusted with their party and its tactics.
