## Boy Scout Entertainment

BEST EVER PRESENTED BY THE LOCAL TROOP

The ninth annual entertainment of the Wolfville Troop of Boy Scouts was presented at the Opera House on Monday evening to one of the largest audiences ever seen at the Opera House. Every seat was occupied and a large number were forced to stand. The entertainment was the best ever given by the Boy Scouts and was much enjoyed by those present. Great credit is due to Scoutmaster Brown and Mrs. Brown for their painstaking efforts to make the entertainment the success it was. The success of the entertainment was due in a great measure to the assistance of the Port Williams Scouts, who presented the play, "A Couple of Scamps".

The program opened with an overture by the Scout Band, after which the scouts stood to attention on the platform, repeated the Scout Promise, and sang the Doxology, God Save the King and O, Canada. Two choruses, "The Scout Song" and "The Irish School Master", were sung heartily by the boys. The drill and song, entitled "Upsetting Gravity," was also well done and much enjoyed. Second class badges were presented to Gerald DeWolf and Clair McKenna, and first class badges to Donald Munro, Tom Tamplin and James Northover. The shadow pantomimes were very amusing and drew forth loud applause from the audience. Doane Hatfield gave a recitation which was well rendered.

A pleasing feature of the program was the presentation of proficiency badges. ## Council of the Board of Trade Meets

A successful meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held at the Council Chamber on Monday evening, with President Phinney in the chair and all the members present except Messrs. Wright and Ilsley and Dr. Elliott.

The meeting evidenced that the Board had made a wise choice in President Phinney, who is a good presiding officer and on Tuesday evening gave unmistakable evidence that under his direction the Board is destined to again become a powerful factor in the progress of the town.

The matter of harbor improvements was discussed fully and the Secretary was instructed to write the Public Works department at Ottawa and ascertain just what had been done and what plans were in contemplation in the direction of work being done here. A strong committee was appointed to gather all information possible and report at a future meeting of the Council.

The proposition to again establish a golf course was brought up and discussed. A committee made up of Messrs. J. E. Hales, G. W. Munro, T. S. Sanford, H. E. Calkin, F. E. Wheelock was appointed to take the matter in hand and report progress at next meeting.

Town improvement, came in for considerable attention and Messrs. B. O. Davidson, H. E. Calkin, Capt. John Pratt, A. M. Wheaton and David Thompson were appointed a committee to look after is important department of civic activity.

The Council discussed the recent action of the town authorities in disposing of the petition of residents of the section adjoining the town on the East seeking an extension of town limits. The opinion was freely expressed that such action was not in the best interest of the town, and steps were taken looking to a reconsideration of such action.

Fitting reference was made to the death of the late R. Earl Burgess, a valued citizen of Wolfville and for many years an active member of the Board of Trade and its Council. It was ordered that a letter conveying the sympathy of the Board be sent to the sorrowing widow and family.

The Council meets again next Tuesday evening when other important matters will be introduced.

The Board of Trade exists to promote the best interests of the town and invites the co-operation of every citizen. Any suggestion for the making of a bigger, better and more prosperous town will be gladly received, and any move in that direction will have the hearty support of the Board.

## A Missionary Jubilee

The Golden Jubilee service of the Woman's Missionary Society held in the Baptist Church last Sunday evening was attended by an audience that taxed the seating capacity of the auditorium.

In commemoration of the occasion, the platform and surroundings were beautifully decorated with golden colored bunting in a background of green, and a prominent place were displayed the dates 1870 and 1920.

Mrs. Grant, President of the Society, presided in the usual graceful manner. After the opening exercises, in which Mrs. Martell offered prayer, Mrs. J. W. Manning gave a very interesting account of the work of Mrs. Norris in founding thirty-two missionary societies among the Baptist women of the Maritime Provinces, the first of which was in Canso. This Society, organized June 18, 1870, was the first women's missionary society of any denomination in Canada, and the first among Baptist women in the world.

Mrs. Manning also told of the work in heathen lands that has been accomplished during fifty years as a result of the founding of these societies, which have later been united under the name of the Women's Baptist Missionary Union. Thirty-five women missionaries have been sent out, houses built for them, their work supported, and a \$25,000 hospital erected.

Miss Andrews, a former Secretary of the Wolfville Society for a number of years, read a paper giving the principal facts of its fifty years history. This had been written by Miss Margaret Bess, the only survivor of the ten charter members, who, in 1870, after listening to the inspiring words of Miss Norris in the parlor of Mrs. J. W. Morse, on Main St. had banded themselves together to work for missions.

Mrs. Smallman gave an account of the missionaries who have gone out from Wolfville, and of the money the local society has contributed, contrasting the thirty-two dollars raised during the first year of organization with the six hundred dollars raised in 1919.

Referring to the study of medical missions carried on this winter by the Mission study class, Mrs. Grant announced that the next number on the program would emphasize the appeal for medical missions. This was very effectively done by eight girls of the B. Y. P. U. dressed in costumes representing different heathen countries, and was impressively followed by the singing of the Consecration Hymn by the Ladies' Chorus of the Seminary, which had previously rendered a very beautiful selection.

After a few appropriate remarks by Dr. MacDonald, the meeting closed with the singing of the Doxology.

The offering, a large proportion of which came in Thank Offering envelopes contributed by the members of the Society, amounted to \$142.67. Of this sum fifty dollars was given by two gentlemen to constitute their wives members of the society.

**Notes and Comments**

Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks were married at Los Angeles on March 28th.

Canada's population is officially estimated at 9,000,000, with an estimated expenditure of 675 million dollars the per capita share of the burden is \$75, while the net debt per head is about \$213.

The liquor bill of the British Isles last year averaged about eight pounds per head. Some of the agitation against the cost of living, as The Toronto Globe says, should be directed against the high cost of drinking.

All of the people may strike for higher wages some of the time, and come of the people may strike for higher wages all of the time, but what will happen when all of the people strike for high wages all of the time? asks the Boston Transcript.

There were more strikes, labor disputes and general industrial turmoil with consequent time lost in Canada during 1919, than in any other year in the country's history. This is revealed in a report compiled by the Labor Department at Ottawa, and just issued.

Why, asks The London Advertiser, don't workingmen put their energies into the bearing down of prices instead of boosting wages? "Every time a price can be forced down, all will benefit, while a wage boost benefits only a small group, and that temporarily or even only in appearance."

Massachusetts has followed the lead of New York in adopting Statewide Daylight Saving to go into effect on April 25th. With no national law in either the United States or Canada this year, Summer Time will be a matter of local choice. Its general adoption, however, will ultimately come. It is too good a thing to lose.

Prohibition has come to stay. The Cleveland Plain Dealer warns the politicians of the United States who may think of throwing the question into party politics. "The saloon," it says, "was finally routed and its activities proscribed because of the solemn conviction, growing through the years, that its continued presence was an evil; that far more ill than good was accomplished by permitting it to do business."

Sweden does not possess a Ministry of Sport, but it has long been the only country in which the practice of athletics among adults is State-aided. The Swedish National Union of Athletes receive an annual subsidy of 20,000 crowns from the Government. All who attain a certain standard in athletics receive gold, silver or bronze badges from the Union. In order to encourage the continuance of training in later life these badges are bestowed according to age as well as proficiency. The gold badge can be secured only by men over 32 who can swim 200 meters, take a long jump of five metres, and run 10 kilometers in 15 minutes. This performance has to be repeated annually in order to retain the gold badge.

Daylight Saving is about to be adopted practically throughout the entire Province of Quebec. Already the City Councils of Quebec, L'Annapolis and other towns in that section of the country have voted to advance all clocks within the town or city limits by one hour on May 2nd next. Although nothing official has yet been given out, it is believed that the Provincial Government of Quebec will shortly proclaim a law whereby clocks and watches will be advanced one hour on May 2nd. Daylight Saving will also come into force in Montreal on May 2nd, the Administrative Commission having decided that all clocks shall be advanced one hour on that date.

Months ago Uncle Sam went back to the penny postage. Since last July a two cent stamp has sufficed across the line for a letter. The report of the Canadian Postmaster-General shows a net profit for the fiscal year ending early in 1919 of nearly two and one-half million dollars. Is it not about time for Canada to do away with its three cent letter rate?

**What Is Worry?**

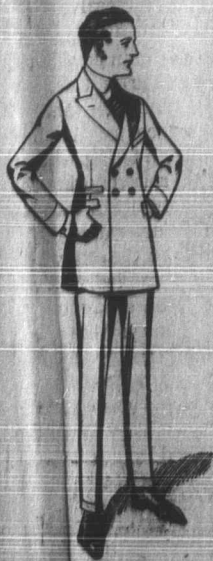
Worry is a feeling of fear, but is never of the present. It is always about something that may happen or that has happened. It is generally in the future, sometimes in the past, but never in the present.

### Editorial Jottings

We noticed at the last meeting of the Council frequent references to the Electric Light Commission. Business was transacted as though this organization was already in existence. Are not the members of the Council aware that the Commission has not yet been appointed? So far the business of this department is under the sole control of the Council.

The action of the Council at its meeting last week, when it gave an unfavorable answer to citizens of the section adjoining Wolfville at the east end who asked admission to our town, has not been favorably commented upon by citizens. As THE ACADIAN pointed out some weeks ago the opportunity of extending the town's boundary in that direction was too good to be disregarded. It is only fair to state that the Council was not unanimous in their action. The vote stood 3-3, the Mayor giving his vote with the "unprogressives". The matter will be up again. "Nothing is ever settled until it is settled right."

The matter of a free supervised play-ground for children during July and August is arousing much interest among the parents and friends of children. Little folks are gregarious by nature and would thoroughly enjoy spending part of the long summer days in amusing and instructive play together. A trained director would be always on hand to welcome, care for and assist the little ones in their fun. Permission has been granted for the use of the school grounds and primary building. Awnings will be erected for protection from the sun where shade trees are not available. The equipment will consist of a sand box for the very small children, see-saws, volley ball, swings, sliding board, simple games and also material for different forms of hand work, basketry, tissue paper flowers, dolls and wood blocking.

Other towns that have adopted this vacation play ground have found it invaluable in the care and training of children and there is no doubt that the citizens of Wolfville will respond liberally toward the financial end of this project.

On Wednesday evening next a meeting will be held in the Town Hall for the purpose of forming a Wolfville Athletic Association. In the past years sports in Wolfville have been carried on in a more or less haphazard manner and with the exception of hockey very little has been accomplished. A Wolfville base-ball team has already been entered in the Annapolis Valley Base-Ball League for this season and it is hoped that in the future base-ball, basket ball, cricket, hockey, golf and all other games will be given more attention. This meeting is being called in order to form a foundation for anything which may materialize along the sports line. Every person in Wolfville who is interested in the subject is requested to be on hand at 8 o'clock on Wednesday next and assist with their suggestions and personal support.

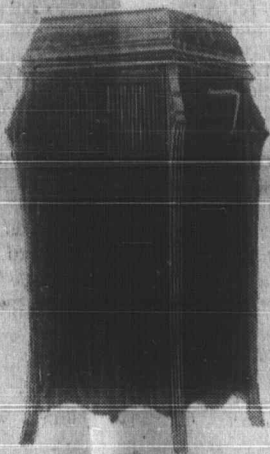

The Central Leather Co., of the United States, annual report for 1919 shows a surplus, after all dividends, charges and interest are deducted, of \$8,384,470, or nearly \$2,000,000 more than in 1918.

## Laying Fowls Require Meat Scrap in Ration.

One of the most significant fact in feeding fowls for egg production—as brought out by experiment at the Ohio Experiment Station, is that rations containing approximately 12 per cent. meat scrap decrease the cost of feed under present market prices more than 20 per cent. and increase the egg production more than 50 per cent., as compared with a ration containing only 2 per cent. of meat scrap. This comparison has held true with both the light and heavier breeds of poultry.

A ration in which the grain mixture was made up of three parts of corn and one part wheat and dry mash mixture of two parts of weight ground corn, one part bran and two parts meat scrap, has given satisfactory results. The fowls consumed twice as much grain as mash.

## Covering Iron With Iron

During the war many worn parts of aircraft machinery and motor vehicles used by the British forces were rapidly repaired in a remarkable way. The metal worn away was replaced by depositing a film of iron by means of electricity. This process was applied in the case of ball bearings and other parts where even a minute amount of wear was so serious that scrapping would be necessary. It was also used with good results in saving from the scrap heap any parts of machinery which had accidentally been made a few thousandths of an inch too small. The problem of electrically depositing iron is a very difficult one, but the methods applied by British engineers were most successful. By means of heat treatment the deposited film becomes so closely welded to the metal that microscopic examination can detect no dividing line. Much of the research work in this matter was carried on at Sheffield University.

## Three Hundred Thousand Cars in Canada.

Of the 7,884,000 automobiles in the world 6,500,000 are in the United States, according to a survey by the Alexander Hamilton Institute, New York. Therefore, there are almost five times as many automobiles in the United States as all other countries combined. The 1,384,000 automobiles not in the United States when the survey was made were distributed as follow: Great Britain 415,000; Canada, 300,000; France 200,000; Germany, 75,000; Italy, 35,000; Argentina, 35,000; The Netherlands, 20,000; Russia, 15,000; Japan, 3,000; all other countries, 321,000.

### 20,000 Cheap Suits Coming to Canada

The Canadian clothes buying public will benefit from the recent release of large quantities of woolen cloth by the British Government. Twenty thousand ready-made men's suits are to be shipped to Canada from London at a wholesale export price of about 54 shillings per suit, which at present exchange rates is less than \$12. The suits comprise government tweeds, serges and worsteds, and are not of the type known as "standard suits."

### Annual Meeting of "The Big Store"

The annual meeting of the well known firm of Wentzells Limited was held at Halifax on the first instant, an unusually large number of shareholders being present. The company is in a strong position financially, its total assets approximating \$800,000.00. Sales for the year ended Feb. 29, 1920 exceeded one and a half million dollars. Net profits after deducting all operating expenses and providing for depreciation and probable Federal taxes were equal to about two and one quarter per cent on the turnover, showing that "The Big Store" has been doing its share toward keeping down the cost of living. The usual dividends on the preferred and common shares were declared.

The directorate consists of the following: Hon. R. Moulton, John W. Regan, F. P. Ronnan, J. J. Penny, G. F. Ring, of Halifax, and Donald S. Hart, of Wolfville. Mr. Moulton is President, Mr. Penny, Manager, and Mr. Hart Secretary of the board.

It has been impossible to learn where the potatoes came from but the Health Inspector is continuing to make inquiries. During the last two weeks of March over ten tons of meat and other food was condemned by the City Health Inspectors.

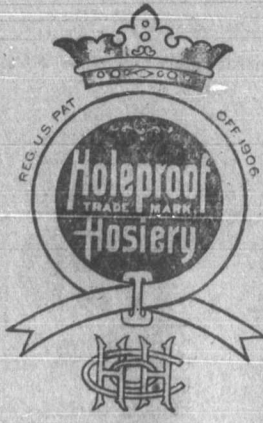
