The beat of the Mounted Policeman is from Hudson Bay to the Pacific, and from the forty-ninth parallel to the frozen Arctic, and he does not take tips or sleep on duty; you cannot bluff him, you cannot bulldoze him, and it is not exactly safe to try to "square" him. Of this man, as of Lord Bobs, we may say. "E don't advertise"; it is the boast of the service in Canada that they seldom "get into print." Yet it is strikingly true that on the margin of every page of the unwritten hitory of this great, lone land the figure of this solitary horseman is vignetted.

Arms and the Man

In 1870 the Hudson's Bay Company gave up to the Canadian Government their exclusive rights in "Rupert's Land," the great prairie Northwest of Canada. The intrusion into the then unguarded Indian-country of wolfers and illicit whisky-traders from the South made it necessary for Canada to send there some body of men empowered to protect the red man from the white man's cupidity, to enforce law and order on the frontier, and to try the unique experiment of making by moral suasion law-abiding British subjects out of warlike Sioux, Assiniboin, Blackfoot, Blood, and Ojibwas.

How far the little force has succeeded in its mission may be judged from the fact that Canada has never seen a lynching, that she has never had an Indian war (the nearest approach being the two ill-advised and soon-suppressed halfbreed risings of Riel), and that, with one weak-kneed exception, there has been no hold-up of a train within Canadian

An officer of the Mounted Police is not an exponent of the law; he is the law itself. When he rides his cayuse to foot-hill camp or threads on snow-shoes the worn north trails of the trapper, he goes clad with the authority of courts. He preserves order, but he also makes arrests; he tries offenders in his own courts, and then escorts the man upon whom sentence has fallen to a prison of his own making, where the law-breaker may be incarcerated for ten days or thirty years. Back of that slight, silent, steel-nerved rider is the strong arm of England and the whole of Canadian jurisprudence, and when he speaks it is as one with authority. In extreme cases when the death penalty has to be enforced, one Mounted Policeman may have to act as clergyman, executioner, and coroner.

What is Demanded of the Trooper

There is scarcely a department of the Canadian Government service that is not assisted by these judges in red coats. As veterinaries they aid the Department of Agriculture by dipping every doubtful head of stock that comes across the border; they act as escorts to the officials carrying treatymoney to Indians at the time of the annual payment; they guard from theft the crown timber reserves, and make complete weather reports for the Meteorological Office. Mounted Policemen are called upon to be physicians and gentle nurses, bailiffs and interpreters. The patrolling policeman, riding his lonely rounds, makes Piegan Indian and Swampy Cree keep each to his respective stanmping-grounds, calls upon Four Horses and Eagle Sitting Down to account for each new piebald pony, incidentally stamps out a prairie fire, prevents Mormons from marrying overmuch, and Doukhobors from eating grass.

Your Mounted Policeman sent out to make an arrest must not shoot first; he has no orders to bring in his prisoner "dead or alive." If he brings him in dead, he gets three months' imprisonment with hard labor; if he fails to bring him in, though he go single-handed into a hostile Indian camp or a gambling-hell on that errand, he is equally accorded "three months' hard." So the record of the force is one long bead-roll of divine tragedies, brave adventures, and impossibilities made facts.

The official blue books of the R.N.W.M.P. issued by the Government at Ottawa are interesting chiefly because of what they do not say. One has to read the romance that lies between the lines of "I beg to report" and "I have the honor to be." The blue-book has its origin in the business-like stub of the pencil with which Constable Smith or Sergeant No. 897, riding from Cree camp to settler's hut, jots down the condition of the crops, the state of the roads and bridges, the peculiar cattle-mark adopted by the last Ruthenian settler, the amount of gold that the prospector washes out of the sands of the Saskatchewan. Muffs are this season most extraordinary not only as regards size and shape but variety of style and skins that are used. Fox is a name applied most indiscriminately to various furs. Alaska sable, better known as skunk fur, which has attained to such dizzy heights of popularity as to be classed with the expensive furs, is now not only made up into neckpieces and muffs, but trims gowns to be worn in the house. There was a time when such a thing would have been declared quite impossible for many

Imitation furs have always been ranked as impossible by the woman with refined taste and inexhaustible pocketbook, but today the cost of the imitation is satisfactory enough to those who feel that because an article is costly it is necessarily most desirable. Consequently the possessor of priceless sable is quite willing to have her opera cloak trimmed with some lately fashionable furs, like fisher, and to have a muff and neckpiece of the same.

There would seem to be just as much uncertainty over the size and shape of the muffs as of the hats this year. 

THE HOME BEAUTIFUL

The thought of spring should engender in every farmer's heart the desire to do something that will make his home surroundings more attractive. The chief essentials are trees and shrubs, flowers and vegetables. No longer does the intelligent westerner believe that climatic conditions will not permit the growing of a reasonable variety or horticultural products.

In order to guard against disappointment, however, it is well to exercise good judgement in the purchase of ornamental and fruit trees and bushes. Southern growers who establish a loca agency, as a rule, supply stock that is worthless. It seldom survives one winter. Nurserymen who are established in the north have made such selection that the general rule is for a very high percentage of stock to give entire satisfaction.

Of course, methods of planting frequently result in the loss of good stock. It is essential that the soil be thoroughly propared and that reasonable care be taken in the setting out as well as in attention until the roots have developed sufficiently to feed the part above ground and produce increase in stem and leaf.

The effort is well worth while. The net result is an improvement in the home. When a well kept vegetable and a small fruit garden accompanies trees and shrubs the farm homs is made one that city! folk envy.—Farmer's Advocate.





So delicate an operation does this constitute that the workmen are actually obliged to observe the slightest change in the weather, lest a slight variation in temperature make a big difference in the quality of the soot. The finest soot is prepared in rooms that are obsolutely airtight. If there are any windows in the room, paper is pasted over them, so that every crack may be

Frequently the workman wil cautiously approach a dish and dust off the gathering soot, employing for this purpose the lightest of feathers. But although the soot is so soft and fine that it will float in the air, still it is not fine enough for the Chinese, for it is then run through sieves, and only when it has passed through these is it deemed fit to mix with the liquid material that transforms it into india-ink. Here comes the mystery, for no one knows, aside from the Chinese, what this secret liquid is. When the union with the liquid has been effected, the compound is kneaded for many hours, and subsequently ground fine again in mortars, which stand in

the slightest variation in temperature. Then the product is shaped into the sticks so familiar to every one, and is beaten with little hammers until each stick attains the perfection of form sought. After this the sticks are placed in wooden forms to harden. The forms have raised letters carved on them, and these impress themselves on the sticks, making the trade-marks to be found on all india-ink sticks.

Even when all this has been accomplished, the painstaking Oriental is not satisfied. Each stick is wrapped with fine silk paper and laid in its box with other sticks. The spaces between them are filled with ashes obtained from rice straw. Each day the ashes are removed and new ashes substituted, this being repeated until every bit of moisture has been eliminated. 
