The fourth clause of the eighteenth section renders i imperative that before any alteration shall be made in School Sections by Township Councils, the consent of the majority of those interested must be first obtained which renders it impossable to make any alteration, as the majority would always hold the manority, we consider that this portion of the School Law ought to be amended so as to allow townships Councils to have a discretionary power in the altering of School Sections after

giving proper notice.

2nd. We consider that the present mode used in apportioning money to Union School sections is unfair. Teachers should be required to make oath to keep correct School registers, and the teacher of any Union School required to keep a register for the portion of every Township united to such School sections, and that the Local Superintendent be required to add the average attendance of part of School sections to the average attendance of the Township where such part is situate,

and apportion the public money according thereto, and to give an order in favor of the teacher of any Union School section on the sub-treasurer of each Township of which said Union section is composed for the amounts for which each section shall be liable:

3rd. We would recommend that the Council do Petition Parliament, setting forth the above particulars and praying that the School Law may be amended so as to aleviate these difficulties, and that the Petition be forwarded to our representaive forthwith.
