REVOLUTIONISTS HAVE TAKEN NATIVE CITY OF SHANGHAI

No Resistance Offered when Rebels Take the Arsenal

The Police take Side of Rebels

Order Issued to Cease Hostilities Pending Peace Negotiations.

Shanghai, China, Nov. 3.—The arsenal and native city of Shanghai was taken over by the revolutionists late last evening. No resistance was offered by the authorities or such of the public as remained loyal.

Some of the foreign warships landed marines in this city before the rebels took possession. Foreign volunteers were called out and have taken every precaution to protect the consular buildings.

Only a few shots fired. At 5:30 o'clock all telephone and telegraph communication with the arsenal was cut off, the rebel troops drew to greater proportions and in the natural excitement a number of shots were fired by the government forces in the direction of the mob.

Complaints reached this city that the rebels holding the forts below Kiu Kiang, have been firing indiscriminately at steamers passing that city.

BUSINESS SECTION OF LONDON SWEEP BY FIRE
