Tariff Reformers Are Delighted.

The result of the Canadian General Election has put great heart into the Tariff Reform movement here, and it has been received by the Unionist newspapers and Unionists generally with enthusiasm. Fred Smith, Unionist M.P., says Canada's example will be an immense encouragement to Tariff Reformers here, while Lord de Rroke declares with delight that Canada has not forgotten the Old Country. 

Sewer Outlet Choked. Evening

r outlets and the condition of the coves along the waterfront submitte at last night's meeting, reveals a serious state of affairs and calls for in mediate attention. Here it is: "I made an examination of the Beck's Cove storm outfall and found that it was partly choked at its nouth by the sand thrown up by th indertow. The sand had banked up against the bulkhead to within two

feet of its top on each side of the outfall pipe. There is an open channel through the side ten feet wide under the public lavatory. The va locity of the sewer current helps to keep this channel clear, but when the sewer is tide-locked at its mouth, and partly, blocked with the sand shifted by the undertow, the sewer becomes 'over-charged.' During heavy rain storms the water backs up in it and escapes through any branches that are connected to it. I have on many occasions reported that the public oves were being gradually silted up. In each one of these coves there i an outfall for a storm sewer. From ersonal observation I can state posi tively that since the year 1890 some of the coves have been silted up to an elevation of four feet above the level at that time. In order to expedite the discharge of surface water from the streets, and at the same time to intercept the sand which flows down the surface drains during rain

storms, the city has constructed system of catch-pits, which prevents the sand frm being discharges through the storm water sewer int the Cove. Netwithstanding this fac the silting of the coves is constantly increasing. The only remedy for existing conditions is the dredging the coves. Stringent measures should be taken to prevent waste materials of any kind from being deposited in the coves, the dumping of loose soluble materials for filling purposes

into any part of the harbor front without a protective bulkhead shoul; also be prohibited."

ollowing resolution: WHEREAS it has been shown b he Engineer's report that the accuulation of silt in the public coves reates such a condition as not alone to inconvenience the public and people engaged in business along the water front but at times actually interferes with the working of the pub-

RESOLVED that this Council considers it its bounden duty to report the present condition of affairs, and to urge upon the Government th necessity of immediate action in co nection with this matter.

RESOLVED that a copy of this r clution be forwarded to the Premier Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris." The motion was supported by Coun cillors Myrick, Martin and Coake

I am directed to thank the Committee, through you, for their courtesy in receiving our deputation, and for the care and attention which they have bestowed on this matter. I am further directed to suggest the following changes in

(1) Railway Station, 1 to 4 persons taken from any point West of the eastern end of Military Road, one delivery, 50c. - The Committee considers the charge of 75 cents for 4 persons, to be more than the public is prepared to pay.

Trips to and from trains and steamers after 11 p.m. to 12 p.m., to four persons, 70c.; 12 to 7 a.m., \$1.00; Sundays, \$1.00.

(2) From any cabstand or place within city, Mill Bridge, etc., 1 person. 30c.: 2 persons, 40c.: 3 to 4 persons, 50c. Delays to be charged for t the rate of \$1.00 per hour.

(3) To or to and from Cuckhold's ove, without delay, \$1.00. (4) To and from Signal Station within half hour' delay, 1 to 4 per-

son's, \$1.50. For any afternoon within nine miles the city, \$4.00.

(5) "Outside of the afternoon, 1st our, \$1.00; 2nd hour, 90c.; and subequent hours, 80c. "I am directed to request that this paragraph be stricken out, as the



few years on this account. Rewarding Treachery.

Russia has always had an unenvi able reputation for corruption. When Port Arthur surrendered a larg number of Continental critics of the land of the Czar did not hesitate openly accuse General Stoessel having accepted a large bribe from th Japanese. Reports were floating round at the time that half his stai were subsidized by the Japanese These reports were manifestly absure but there is at least one case on re

known to surrender for a considera This was said of Marshal Bazain about the fall of Metz. The French Government investigated the terrible charges against him, and found him guilty. He was sentenced to death though this was afterwards com muted to imprisonment for life. A the time the amount of the bribe said to have been paid to Bazaine by the German Intelligence Department was definitely stated to be £210,000!

Though the French Government found Bazaine guilty, there were grave doubts cast upon the verdict. This cannot be said of the surrende of Scio in 1822 to the Turks. In con sideration of this surrender the Turk paid out a sum of £170,000. This piece of rank treachery resulted in th most terrible massacre in moder

history, 40,000 people being slain. "Graft" From Gambling Dens. The hotbed of bribery is New York eneral Bingham, an ex-Commissione Police, estimates that £20,000,00 in bribes is paid in New York ever wear. He openly said that he could have made, £200,000 a year for himsel from this source alone. One gambling den offered him a bribe of £2.000 a month if he would allow them to remain open. So frightful is the "graft," as it is called, that the positions in the police service are eagerly sought after. Habitual criminals purchase police protection, and many New York "bobbies" receive bribes from



The Premier, calm amid it all, assures the poor Colonial Secretary (trying to save his scalp in the next election) that all will be done and resumes his chat with the Contractor!



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
