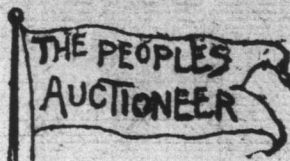

Household Notes.

To prevent the lace yoke of an evening dress from being soiled by contact with the skin line the yoke by hand with a piece of chiffon. When soiled by perspiration this is easily ripped out and a clean piece substituted. Net serves the same purpose and is cheaper than chiffon.

Very quickly the baby's dresses become too snug for comfort. Did you ever try trimming out the neck and armholes and putting in new sleeves? This will enlarge the little dress enough to insure comfort, until the material shows signs of wear and the dress must be discarded.

It is sometimes difficult to understand how clothes come from the wash spotted with iron-rust. This may be caused by the chemical action of a bluing that contains iron, with the soapuds. There are two ways to prevent it—thorough rinsing and another brand of bluing.

If you want a watertight vessel in

which to wash dishcloths, napkins or any small articles of clothing, fold a cloth and lay it over the drain pipe of the sink and turn a saucepan upside down over the cloth. This will make an ideal wash basin to use instead of a pan or bucket.

In case your fing is too soft, try tying a band of stiff wrapping paper a little higher than the cake, and see how nicely it sets the lining. I find another help for this band: if left on my cakes and stood in the cake-box they are just as moist a week or two later as the first day baked.

If a small clock is beyond repair do not throw it away, but set it aside for use in the sickroom. It will then be found useful to indicate the next time for taking medicine. As each dose is given to the patient turn the hands to the hour when the next dose will be due. This is much better than trusting to memory.

The glossiness which appears on one's much-worn suit may be entirely eradicated by the judicious use of emery paper. The paper should be rubbed against the fabric hard enough to raise the nap. This plan is not injurious to the goods and greatly improves the appearance of the garment.

One wise girl before sweeping, always wrings an old napkin out of water and, pinning the ends of the linen around her head makes most effectual offer for the dust which would otherwise fill her lungs. The cloth hangs loosely over her nose and mouth, not interfering with her breathing in the least.

Nickel silver should be cleaned with ammonia and whitening. Take half a cupful of finely powdered whitening and work it into a paste with a cupful of cold water, in which a tablespoonful of rock ammonia has been dissolved. Keep this in a well-corked bottle, and use it for scouring. Afterwards polish with a leather.

Always wash fruit before giving it to children, especially figs and dates. Their sweetness attracts flies and other insects, and their stickiness

makes a resting place for dust and its undesirable germs. The bushes of small fruits, grapevines and fruit trees are frequently sprayed with poisons to prevent the brood of worms and insects; so it is never safe to eat fruit without cleansing.

One of the best ways of covering jams and jellies, so that they will keep well in to cover the jars as soon as they are filled. Have the papers cut ready and the white of an egg slightly beaten, brush the papers with the white of the egg, and tie down quickly. The heat of the jam destroys all germs that might cause it to mould and dries the egg so quickly that it is hermetically sealed.

Very few women seem to know that the ripe sweet peppers can be economically, quickly and successfully canned at home to take the place of the Spanish pimientos that are so toothsome in salads, sandwiches, etc. Wash the peppers thoroughly, take out the inner veins and seeds, cut them to a size suitable for packing in a glass can, pack as many as possible in the can and fill full with cold vinegar, and seal.

A trained nurse tells of a curious home remedy for erysipelas that effected a cure. Ripe cranberries were pounded to a paste and applied over the afflicted parts. They were bound with thin muslin and kept on until they dried, when a new portion was applied until the inflammation was drawn out. Cranberries reduce inflammation; they are almost as if cooked from the absorbed heat, but they do not act as would a poultice.

To make pear conserve wash the peel of one lemon and one orange, cook until tender, turn off the water, chop the peel and add to four pounds of coarsely chopped small, three pounds of sugar, the juice of three lemons, one can of shredded pineapple, half-pound of raisins, one orange and one cupful of water. Cook several hours. About a half-hour before removing from the fire add one pound of chopped meat nuts. Keep in a stone jar.

Some Queries.

Why does the Government not tell the people plainly if the difference with the Contractor as to the building of the Spur Line into Trinity West has been settled or not?

There is no doubt whatever that a serious dispute did arise, and what the people want to know is how the dispute stands at present.

We repeat there is no doubt about the existence of that dispute, as there is abundant evidence of it, and it may prove interesting to our readers to recall it to their mind.

One survey (or more) was made into the heart of Trinity West by the Contractor's surveyors, and we presume a route into the heart of the settlement was decided upon by the Government. But it would be interesting to know if the decision of the Government was ever acquiesced in by the Contractor. We draw attention to this phase, because of the apparent difficulties of the grade in reaching the settlement, of subsequent events, and of a feature of clause 2 of the Agreement.

We ask again if the Contractor ever acquiesced in the decision that he should build the Spur Line into Trinity West under section 27?

A glance at the last clause of section 2 will bring out the bearing of our questions. The Contractor agrees to build "All the said branches, as nearly as may be practicable, the routes that may be decided by the Government."

Has the Contractor ever agreed that it was reasonably practicable to take the branch into Trinity West? Does he claim that he is following the contract by touching at Gott's Cove?

If that is so, is there a dispute on the matter between the Government and the Contractor?

Certain it is, he continued the building of the branch to Bonavista, and has not taken it into the heart of Trinity West, as the Government promised he should and ordered him to do so.

Certain it is, that the Government have expropriated much land for the route into Trinity West and no Spur Line yet runs over it.

Certain it is, that the Government told him he was building the sta-

tion at Jenkins' farm without authority.

These matters afford evidence of a dispute between them. The people would like to know if the dispute has yet been settled, and if so, ON WHAT TERMS?

Is the branch line to be built under section 2 at \$15,000 a mile?

Does the Contractor claim that he has approached as near Trinity West as he is called upon under section 27?

If so, has the Government ordered it to be done under section 34 as an extraordinary work, "not included in or incidental to the completion of the works comprised in the contract, as the Government in their discretion may consider necessary and appropriate?"

If the latter is the course adopted, then under section 37 the Government will have to pay for it specially, no matter if the Spur Line costs \$100,000 a mile.

We hope that the Premier may devote some of that exuberant energy of which we hear so much towards enlightening the public on these matters.

In Dangerous State.

Mrs. Butt whose husband was attacked and ill treated yesterday while on his way home came to the court house to-day and made a deposition of the facts of the case before the authorities. The man is badly hurt internally, she says, from kicks received in the stomach, and is in bed and suffers much pain, was attended last night by Dr. Macpherson who yet cannot say what the issue may be. Mrs. Butt testified that a man named Leary III, used her husband and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

Stopped Her Loading.

To-day as the S. S. Freya which is loading fish for Europe, had not entered at the Customs for loading, as she should have done, all work was suspended on her by order of the Customs, until the regulations in this respect were complied with.

OBITUARY.

The death occurred this morning of Mrs. Bradbury, wife of Mr. Hy. W. Bradbury, of the Angli Engineering Coy. Mrs. Bradbury who was well and favorably known in the west end, had been ill for 5 months past and her death had been expected for several days past. Tariff Reformers Are Delighted.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day. The result of the Canadian General Election has put great heart into the Tariff Reform movement here, and it has been received by the Unionist newspapers and Unionists generally with enthusiasm. Fred Smith, Unionist M.P., says Canada's example will be an immense encouragement to Tariff Reformers here, while Lord de Broke declares with delight that Canada has not forgotten the Old Country. Bonar Law, Unionist, believes the result of the election will hasten the triumph of Imperial Conference. According to Amery, Journalist, the election is the most important and decisive event since the South African War. He declares Canada has given a lead which England must follow. Peel, a leader of the Tariff Reform Party, says the Canadians have defeated the American conspiracy to absorb their country and that Imperial Reciprocity is now certain. Sir Max Aitken declares that time alone can make clear the far-reaching significance of the victory by which Canada has set the seal on a new brand of Imperial Unity. Viscount Biddley says the door, bolted and barred by Asquith, has been flung open again by Canada. Tariff Reformers will work with renewed vigor and with certainty of success. The Daily Telegraph thinks it will be a long time before the statesmen of the States or of Canada propose another Reciprocity Conference.

Females Terrible Experience

Special Evening Telegram.

Wednesday morning two females named Smith, an aunt and niece, of Chance Cove, T.B., left there to go berry picking and travelled several miles in the country. In the evening it became very foggy, with heavy rain, thunder and lightning, and they lost their way when darkness overtook them. They travelled along whither they did not know for hours, drenched to the skin, hungry and fatigued, until a flash of lightning showed them the edge of a steep cliff towards which they were walking, and over which they must have gone had they continued on their aimless journey. Retracing their steps, after an hour or so they found themselves in the middle of a wide marsh covered with water, and both women sank to the ground exhausted. Here, with absolutely not a tree or bough under which they could hide from the storm, both lay all night until 7 a.m. Thursday, when the weather cleared and both managed to reach home in a terrible state and have since been very ill. All Wednesday night until daylight Thursday a search party of men were out with guns and lanterns but could not find them, having gone in an altogether different direction from that which the women took. It will be some time before they will forget the hardship they endured on that terrible night of weather.

Trouble Between Italy and Turkey.

Special Evening Telegram.

PARIS, To-day. Advice from Rome say the entire naval force is ready in case of emergency for a conflict with Turkey, if the Ottoman Government refuses to give consent for an Italian Protectorate over Tripoli. The Italian plan, according to these advices, embraces the bombardment of Tripoli simultaneously with a military expedition of 20,000 soldiers to block the Turkish coast along the Adriatic Sea and to operate in Macedonia, Sinai, Arabia, with a view of protecting numerous Italians living in these countries. Efforts are being made to induce Turkey to come to an amicable agreement for insuring Italy's preponderant influence over Tripoli. Italy being willing to go to the extent of leaving Tripoli under the Sovereignty of the Sultan. It is understood that Germany and Austria are supporting this plan and that France and Italy stand ready in case of acceptance to furnish an indemnity to Turkey. The dispatch adds that the Taranté has been proclaimed in a state of siege.

The Irish Railway Strike.

Two hundred passengers, some of whom came on the White Star steamer Cedric from New York on Thursday others by the same company's steamer Arabie from Boston yesterday, are stranded here, unable to reach their destinations, because of the general strike on the Irish railways. The city is practically isolated on the land side and railway officials state they do not know when they would be able to resume operations. Not even mails can be dispatched.

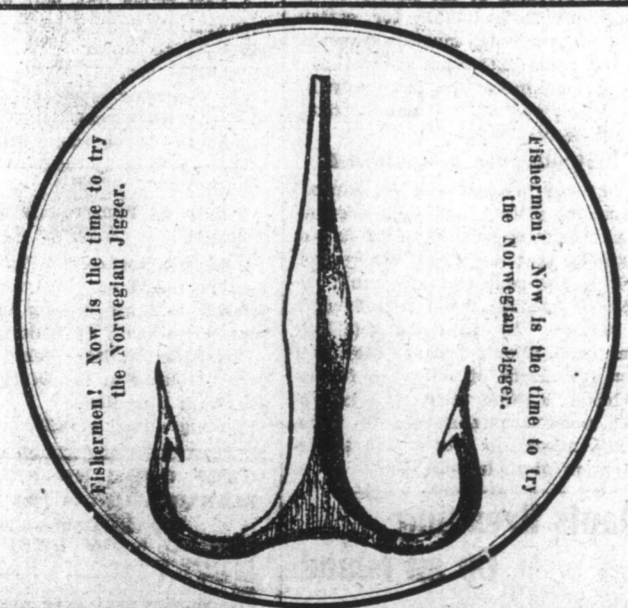

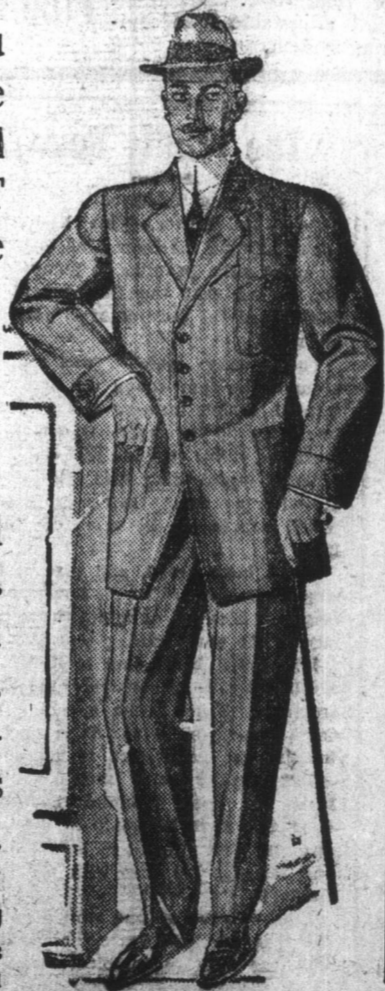

Public Notice. CENSUS, 1911.

The following Regulations in connection with the Census are published for general information:—

1. The father of a family, if alive and present, is the proper authority to give information of his family; if the father is dead or absent, then the mother or person in charge shall speak for him;
- (a) Provided that any child over sixteen years of age objecting to be classed in religion by the parent may be permitted to name his or her religion to the Magistrate;
- (b) That the wife, boarder or servant, or other person of full age present in a house, may speak for themselves, and can have alterations made by applying to the Court of Revision.
2. No person who has been continuously absent from Newfoundland for eighteen months immediately preceding the time of taking the Census shall be included in the Census, but this shall not be taken to exclude (1) Any child who is absent at school; and (2) Any head of a family who is employed out of the Colony, but whose family continues to reside in the Colony.
3. Every person resident in the Colony at the time the Census is being taken shall be included without reference to the length of time during which such person has resided here. In other words, the name of every actual and bona fide resident must be included.

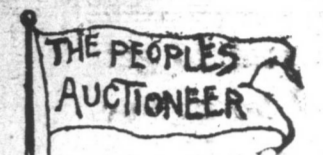
