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
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
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

The death occurred at Plymouth, C. B., of Henry Outfin, a former quarter master in the Navy and war vetalan, aged 92. He commenced a scafaring life in 1837, and three years later was present at the fall of Acre. After seeing African service he was wounded in the expedition up the River Plate South America. In 1854 he volunteered for the Crimea and fought in the trenches before Sebastopol. He was probably the last of the 24 survivors of the brig Heron, wrecked on a voy age to St. Helena, when over 100 were drowned. He was also shipwrecked

and Newyfoundland would do much for the development of both the Ancient Colony and of Labrador is the firm opinion of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, of the Labrador Medical Mission, who is here to give a lecture in the Windso

"In travelling through Canada," said Dr. Grenfell to-day, "I have heard expressed on every side the wish that Newfoundland would come into th Canadian Confederation. Speaking as a Newfoundlander-for I look on myself as a Newfoundlander now-I cordially agree with the idea of confed eration, not only from the Imperia point of view, but because I believe it would make for the welfare prosperity of both countries.

"But there is no denying the fac that a certain section of the New foundland people are totally apposed to coming into the Confederation Mostly, I believe, they are the manu facturing classes, who are relatively small, and who believe that Confederation with Canada would result in the ruin of their industries, which are new protected from Canadian com-

"Now what I suggest is this-that o be of one mind in favor of Confederation, it should be made the business of someone to prepare statistical nformation such as would show Newoundlanders exactly what they would gain from Confederation, as against what, if anything, they would lose. As far as the fishermen go, I believe that they would favor Confederation They have nothing to lose by it, but on the contrary, have, I think, a good deal to gain

#### No Authoritative Statements.

"But there is the difficulty. There s no reading matter or authoritative tatements showing exactly what the ffect of Confederation would be, and n the absence of it, it is impossible to rgue effectively for Confederation xcept from a sentimental point of

"Perhaps it might even be shown the matter were worked out, that he manufacturers of Newfoundland would gain rather than lose by the taking down of the tariff wall beween Canada and Newfoundland. am told-but on this point I have no first hand information-that the price of staples is cheaper in Newfoundland than in Canada. If that is so, perhans the result of Confederation with Canada would be that Newfoundland





#### Criticizes the **Board of Trade.**

Special to Evening Telegram

LONDON, April 23. press, which severely criticizes its own Board of Trade and demands a more searching enquiry declines to judge the case until the British enquiry is held. Strong feeling is displayed at the manner in which the American enquiry is being conducted, and what is regarded as the unfair treatment of Bruce Ismay. The Morning Post editorially pro tests against the American and German papers branding Ismay as a coward, declaring that it was clearly his duty to live and help the Company to retrieve the disaster by facing the music. The Daily Express describes the Senatorial enquiry as a parody on justice, and one which is calculated rather to swing public sympathy to the side of Ismay and the White Star Company. The Express contends that Ismay did nothing disgraceful, yet is attacked as though he played the part of a shameful coward. The Daily News says: We have no intention of prejudicing the case or imitating the hasty and often savage verdicts pronounced in the States. All papers express satisfaction that preside at the enquiry, thereby en suring a thorough investigation. Lord Mersey has had a wide experience of maritime affairs as a former President of the Admiralty.

#### Companies Lose Heavily.

NEW YORK, April 23. Insurance men say that local losses paid by various Life. Accident and Marine Companies as a result of the Titanic disaster will approximate \$15,000,000. Two-thirds of this will fall on Marine Insurance Companies. The Insurance Field, a Trade journal published here, asserts that nowhere in the annals of insurance is there a parallel to the insurance losses occasioned by the sinking of the Titan ic. It makes the following estimate of total loss: Life Insurance, \$2, 193,000; Accident, Insurance, \$2,213,-000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$\$5,000,-000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$5,000, 406,000.




