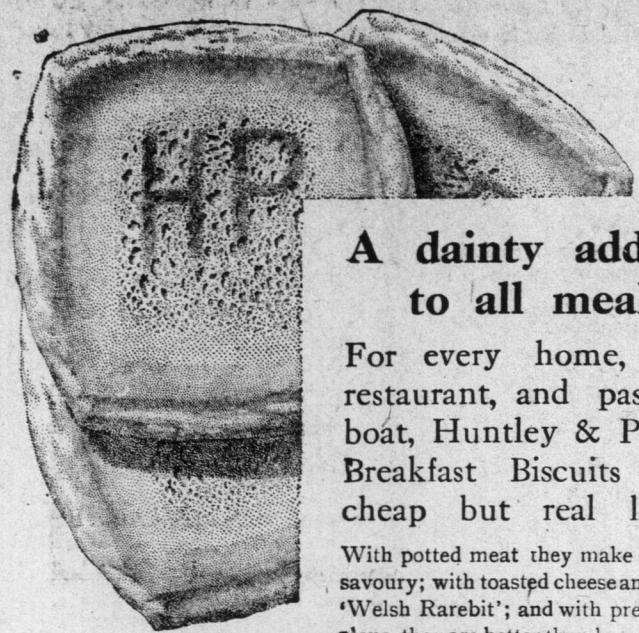

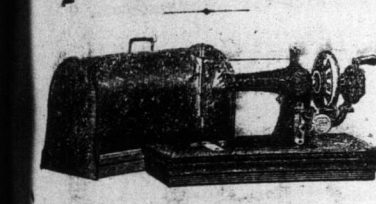

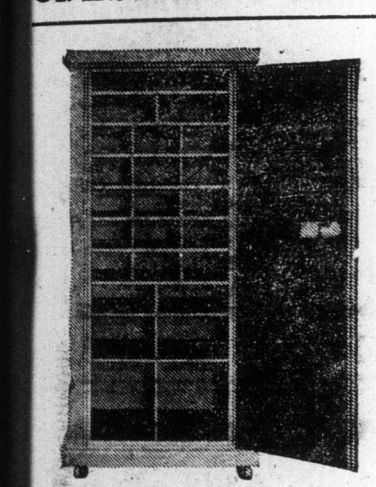

People's Party Flouts the People

We observe in glancing through the official report of the Legislative Council of the proceedings of March 28th, last, published in the Daily News, this morning, that matters reported are certain financial amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Section of the Act, dealing with Teachers' Pensions.

The strange feature of the breach of principle that no amendment shall be made to a money bill except in the People's House is that the violation of principle was committed by the Government itself.

The Hon. Mr. Bishop, the Government leader in the Legislative Council proposed the amendments on behalf of the Government, and the amendment could equally as well have been made in the House of Assembly.

At the time the amendments were made in the Council, we directed attention to them, and Mr. Keat also strongly criticized the unconstitutionality of the course when the amendments were returned for consideration in the House of Assembly.

"I have never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any timber or mineral wealth. I have never made an application for a piece of timber or a mineral grant."

Dr. Grenfell Talks Confederation.

That the Confederation of Canada and Newfoundland would do much for the development of both the Ancient Colony and of Labrador is the firm opinion of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, of the Labrador Medical Mission, who is here to give a lecture in the Windsor Hall on Saturday.

"In travelling through Canada," said Dr. Grenfell to-day, "I have heard expressed on every side the wish that Newfoundland would come into the Canadian Confederation. Speaking as a Newfoundlanders—for I look on myself as a Newfoundlanders now—I cordially agree with the idea of confederation, not only from the Imperial point of view, but because I believe it would make for the welfare and prosperity of both countries.

"But there is no denying the fact that a certain section of the Newfoundland people are totally opposed to coming into the Confederation. Mostly, I believe, they are the manufacturing classes, who are relatively small, and who believe that Confederation with Canada would result in the ruin of their industries, which are now protected from Canadian competition.

"Now what I suggest is this—that as Canada, so far as I can judge seems to be of one mind in favor of Confederation, it should be made the business of someone to prepare statistical information such as would show Newfoundlanders exactly what they would gain from Confederation, as against what, if anything, they would lose. As far as the fishermen go, I believe that they would favor Confederation. They have nothing to lose by it, but on the contrary, have, I think, a good deal to gain.

No Authoritative Statements. "But there is the difficulty. There is no reading matter or authoritative statements showing exactly what the effect of Confederation would be, and in the absence of it, it is impossible to argue effectively for Confederation except from a sentimental point of view.

"Perhaps it might even be shown, if the matter were worked out, that the manufacturers of Newfoundland would gain rather than lose by the taking down of the tariff wall between Canada and Newfoundland. I am told—but on this point I have no first hand information—that the price of staples is cheaper in Newfoundland than in Canada. If that is so, perhaps the result of Confederation with Canada would be that Newfoundland would export to Canada the products of such manufactures as she has, instead of importing them, and thus gain a wider market.

"Now on general grounds I think the result of coming into Confederation would be to give a great impetus to the development of Labrador and Newfoundland. Going all through Western Canada I have seen immense works for the development of the natural resources of the country. Now it stands to reason that a big people like the Canadians can finance and subsidize such works for the development of natural resources of the country better than a small people like the Newfoundlanders."—Montreal Star, Feb. 12, '12.

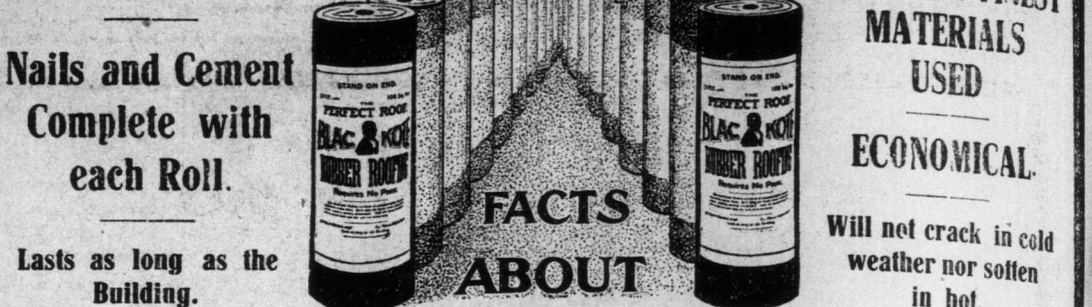

**MASSACRE**

**In Morocco—Horrible Cruelty to Women—Nationalist Convention Approves the Home Rule Bill.**

Special to Evening Telegram.  
 PARIS, April 23.  
 A massacre at Fez, in which a large number of French officers, soldiers and citizens were killed and wounded, has given rise to considerable criticism of the Government authorities for not foreseeing and preventing the occurrence. It is pointed out by the newspapers that the French troops occupied the Moroccan capital more than a year ago. Special correspondents to the French newspapers at Fez indicate that the plan of the rebels included the massacre of the whole French mission, headed by M. Regnault, which recently arrived at the Capital to establish a Protectorate. The plan failed owing to the impatience of some Arabian women to begin the carnage. These women are described by the correspondents as Hecates of terrifying appearance, who pass their time rushing about the streets, torturing the wounded, and sometimes aiding the Moorish rebels in the final mutilation and desecrating of their victims.

An awful scene of horror occurred in the Jewish quarter of the city, where a mob murdered, pillaged and burned all the Jews they could find, throwing their bodies from the roofs. Many young girls were carried off, and suffered indescribable outrages. The Jewish quarter was set on fire and three-fourths entirely destroyed, rendering over 1,000 people homeless. The story of the death of the telegraphers is a narrative of coolness and bravery, the newspapers comparing their faithfulness to duty with that of the wireless operators of the Titanic. Although possessed with only one revolver between them, they kept the howling mob outside at bay for a considerable time, and succeeded in picking off and killing sixteen of the fanatics. All the time one or other of them were sending despatches to headquarters at Tangier, telling of the plight of the city. Finally the Arabs tore a hole in the roof, through which they poured a murderous fire, together with flaming torches which set the room on fire. Three of the telegraphers fell dead, and the fourth turned his revolver on himself rather than fall into the hands of the murderous Moors. He shot, but missed, and later was able to escape from the burning building. Fears are expressed in Paris that similar outbreaks may occur in other parts of Morocco.

DUBLIN, April 23.  
 The Nationalist Convention assembled to-day, under the Presidency of John Redmond. Their first act was to pass a resolution expressing sorrow at the loss of the s.s. Titanic. Although the acceptance of the principle of the Home Rule Bill was a foregone conclusion, there was plenty of enthusiasm among the delegates, and salves of cheers broke out when the Leader of the Party described the Home Rule Bill as the most satisfactory measure ever offered to Ireland. Redmond declared that under it, Dublin Castle, with all its blood-stained traditions, would disappear, and that the Irish would be a nation of fools not to accept a Bill which gave to Ireland immediate control of nine-tenths of the Irish services and eventually the whole. The finance of the Bill was better than that of either of the two previous measures. Redmond concluded by moving a resolution accepting the Bill, which was seconded by the Lord Mayor of Cork and carried amid scenes of enthusiasm and the unfurling of the green flag.

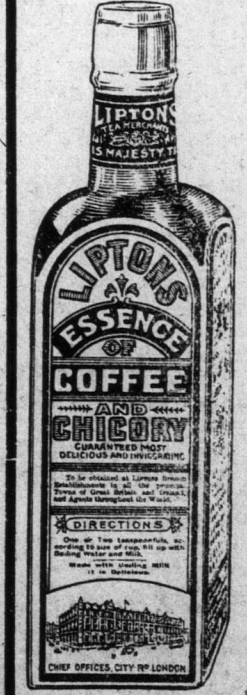

### Criticizes the Board of Trade.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, April 23.  
The British press, which severely criticizes its own Board of Trade and demands a more searching enquiry, declines to judge the case until the British enquiry is held. Strong feeling is displayed at the manner in which the American enquiry is being conducted, and what is regarded as the unfair treatment of Bruce Ismay. The Morning Post editorially protests against the American and German papers branding Ismay as a coward, declaring that it was clearly his duty to live and help the Company to retrieve the disaster by facing the music. The Daily Express describes the Senatorial enquiry as a parody on justice, and one which is calculated rather to swing public sympathy to the side of Ismay and the White Star Company. The Express contends that Ismay did nothing disgraceful, yet is attacked as though he played the part of a shameful coward. The Daily News says: We have no intention of prejudicing the case or imitating the hasty and often savage verdicts pronounced in the States. All papers express satisfaction that Lord Mersey has been appointed to preside at the enquiry, thereby ensuring a thorough investigation. Lord Mersey has had a wide experience of maritime affairs as a former President of the Admiralty.

### Companies Lose Heavily.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
NEW YORK, April 23.  
Insurance men say that local losses paid by various Life, Accident and Marine Companies as a result of the Titanic disaster will approximate \$15,000,000. Two-thirds of this will fall on Marine Insurance Companies. The Insurance Field, a Trade Journal published here, asserts that nowhere in the annals of insurance is there a parallel to the insurance losses occasioned by the sinking of the Titanic. It makes the following estimate of total loss: Life Insurance, \$2,193,000; Accident Insurance, \$2,213,000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$5,000,000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$5,000,000, 406,000.

### Look-Outs Had No Glasses

Special Evening Telegram.  
WASHINGTON, To-day.  
The failure to provide binoculars or spyglasses for the lookouts on the Titanic was one of the contributing causes of the ship's loss with 1,500 lives. Witnesses before the Senate Investigation Committee yesterday agreed on this. They were Frederick Fleet, lookout on liner; Major Peuchen, Canadian Manufacturer and Yachtsman among the rescued passengers. Fleet acknowledged if he had been aided in his observations by good glasses, he probably could have spied the berg into which the ship crashed in time to have warned the bridge to avoid it, and was made to appear in blame. Being without glasses did not rest with the look-out men. Fleet said they had asked for them at Southampton and were told there was no need for them. Reuchen criticized in strong terms the lack of experienced sailors on board the Titanic. He said when the call to quarters was sounded, there was no big enough crew responded to undertake the work required in lowering and filling of boats. Pittman, third officer of Titanic, told of his failure to turn back the lifeboat in which he and passengers were idly drifting to attempt to rescue others when the Titanic went down.

### Within 30 Miles and Did Not Know.

Special Evening Telegram.  
PORTLAND, To-day.  
Had the freight steamer Lena been equipped with wireless outfit she could have reached the scene of the wreck of the Titanic in time to have saved many lives. Lena which arrived here from Fowey, England, yesterday and was within 30 miles of Titanic when the latter foundered. The Lena did not know of the wreck until she took a pilot of Portland. Three ships passed the Lena on April 14th, the day of the disaster.

### The Earl Grey Towed Off.

PICTOU, To-day.  
The steamer "Earl Grey" arrived at Pictou yesterday, having come from Tony River, where she was ashore, under her own steam. The Dominion Coal Company's tug "Douglas H. Thomas" towed her off yesterday morning.

### The Social Movement

BY ANDANTIN

IL—POVERTY

W. T. Stead will certainly be the most widely mourned of all the ill-fated company that went down with the Titanic. He faced the danger fearlessly and went to his death with the calmness of a Socrates—in sharp contrast, if we may believe the reports, to the actions of some of the other notables (?) on board. Writing in his March Review of Reviews he notes that the rapidity with which public opinion is setting in the direction of freeing the richest country on this side of the Globe (England) from the shame and pain of starving the poor is shown on many sides and in the highest quarters.

Perhaps most significant of all, as a proof of the movement of the most staid, cautious and conservative elements in our national life was the deliverance of the Primate of all England, made in the course of his quadrennial charge in Canterbury Cathedral. The Archbishop said:—

"He was prepared quite deliberately to express his own belief that, given a little time, say a couple of generations, poor poverty of the extreme sort, crushing, degrading poverty, ought to be and in a Christian country like ours might be, practically abolished altogether. He did not believe that anything short of that would satisfy even elementarily the conditions of Christian Brotherhood. He could see no obvious and simple road. But that there was a road, and a Christian road, he was sure. It was the task of workers in the Church of God to foster the growth of such a spirit as would make these results certain; to promote such a sense of responsible brotherhood in the Church of Christ on earth that men should see that the solution, by whatever pathway reached, was imperative and inevitable. Be that their resolve and prayer. Could they doubt that it was the Will of God? Could they doubt that it was the duty of His Church on earth to set it forward?"

Archbishop Gleason, of the Roman Catholic Church, has said:—

"The time was when men held their fellowmen in slavery. Such slavery has been abolished, but it is not possible that to-day a slavery more extensive has been inaugurated, not alone of the body but of the soul? This slavery is the outcome of immoral and unsanitary surroundings which gradually render body and soul a slave of disease and vice. . . . There are some people who give their thoughts and time to the caring of pet animals, while on the other hand human beings, their brethren, are starving and homeless, even little children crying for bread, and a large percentage outcasts from hope and home and happiness."

I quote these distinguished men because their words concerning Poverty will present to your minds with more force than any words of mine, the fact that there are men, women and children in want to-day, and by no fault of theirs and that laziness and drink are not at the bottom of all destitution. And coming further up the scale, have we not in the City of St. John's an army of say middle-class who are continually struggling in the effort to provide raiment to wear and food to eat?

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word "Rich." At least in their reasonings, they do not allow for the fact that it is a relative word implying its opposite "poor" as positively as the word "north" implies its opposite "south," so that the force of a guinea in your pocket depends wholly on the default of a guinea in your neighbour's pocket, and the art of making yourself rich is therefore equally and necessarily the art of keeping your neighbour poor.

Perhaps most significant of all, as a proof of the movement of the most sane, cautious and conservative elements in our national life was the divergence of the Primate of all England, made in the course of his quadrantal charge in Canterbury Cathedral. The Archbishop said:—

Public relief and private beneficence represent a bewildering total, and a prodigality of generosity has been reached which the history of philanthropy has never witnessed before. But, as F. G. Peabody says, it is precisely at this point, however, where the Christian conscience might seem to find some satisfaction, that the first problem of charity in its modern form comes into view. This prodigious movement of sentiment and compassion is now very generally observed, and with undiscriminating admiration, but with a high degree of suspicion and criticism.

He was prepared quite deliberately to express his own belief that, given a little time, say a couple of generations for bringing about the change, real poverty of the extreme sort, crushing, degrading poverty, ought to be and in a Christian country like ours might be, practically abolished altogether. He did not believe that anything short of that would satisfy even elementarily the conditions of Christian Brotherhood.

As regards the Cure for Poverty, practically the only means attempted by the Church and other philanthropic agencies is that known as Charity.

It was the task of workers in the Church of God to foster the growth of such a spirit as would make these results certain: to promote such a sense of responsible brotherhood in the Church of Christ on earth that men should see that the solution, by whatever pathway reached, was imperative and inevitable. Be that their resolve and prayer. Could they doubt that it was the Will of God? Could they doubt that it was the duty of His Church on earth to set it forward?

Has the Volume of Poverty Grown Distinctly Less? Is not the whole work of charity an insult to those who claim, not a share in the rich man's bounty, but a right to the rich man's possessions? Ought there be any Poor?

Archbishop Gleason, of the Roman Catholic Church, has said:— "The time was when men held their fellowmen in slavery. Such slavery has been abolished, but is it not possible that to-day a slavery more extensive has been inaugurated, not alone of the body but of the soul? This slavery is the outcome of immoral and unsanitary surroundings which gradually render body and soul a slave of disease and vice. . . There are some people who give their thoughts and time to the caring of pet animals, while on the other hand human beings, their brethren, are starved and homeless, even little children crying for bread, and a large percentage contrasts from hope and home and happiness."

Religion must be more than merciful and generous; it must find, as the Archbishop of Canterbury intimated, a place for itself in that search for better economic conditions, and better social organization which absorbs the attention of the present time. For the prosperous to imagine that the demand "Give to the poor" is a superficial interpretation of the Gospel as it is for the poor to imagine that mendacity is endorsed by the saying of Jesus: "Ask, and it shall be given." The teaching of Jesus must be drawn not only from His many sayings about the poor but also from His habitual way of dealing with the poor.

I quote these distinguished men because their words concerning Poverty will present to your minds with more force than any words of mine. The fact that there are men, women and children in want to-day, and by no fault of theirs and that laziness and drink are not at the bottom of all this destitution. And coming further up the scale, have we not in the City of St. John's an army of say middle-class who are continually struggling in the effort to provide raiment to wear and food to eat?

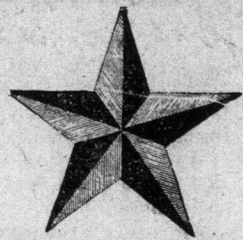

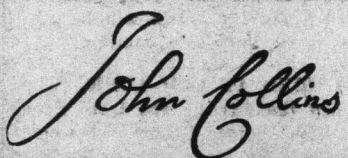

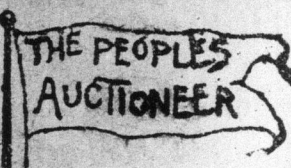
