

Parcel Post for Nfld. Expeditionary Forces!

The attention of the public is drawn to the very urgent necessity of strictly observing the regulations published by this Department from time to time concerning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should be strictly observed:

(1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds.

(2) Parcels should be addressed with the Regimental number, rank, name and surname of addressee, followed by the last known address of the Unit with which the individual was serving; for example:

No. 0978 Cpl. John J. Kent, 2nd Battalion The Royal Newfoundland Regt.,

Hazeley Down Camp. Winchester, Hant's Camp,

England. (3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded, if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The Original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel.

(4) If second address is not furnished a of posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for

(5) Parcels containing articles of personal nature or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.

(6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to soldiers.

(7) Parcels should be packed securely.

(8) Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later than the end of November.







Germany's Broken Merchant Marine.

(Montreal Herald.)

The Germans are beginning to wail merchant vessels. For instance, Hern Heineken, the director-general of the German shipping company, in a re-cently published year book of that company, says:

"Economically, from the point of view of the German navy, the American intervention—it would be folly to deny it—has been a hard blow to Germany. Our best, indeed, our most precious vessels, some of which are in fact unreplaceable, have been confis-cated. And now these vessels are transporting to France and England America's troops and ammunition. Of course, it is not merely the Nord-leutscher Lloyd which has to suffer from this measure. The other German companies have met the same fate. In addition, the prohibition imposed upon the agents of German offices to communicate with their correspondents has been no less harmful to the above mentioned companies. The net of lines which we have established with so much toil in the United States has been torn, and it will take years before we can reorganize them."



LONDON, Oct./ 30,

That the immediate release of all British prisoners will be insisted upon by the Government, as part of the armistice terms, is confidently expected here. Sir George Cave, the Home Secretary, announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the same conditions imposed upon Bulgaria in this matter would be insisted upon in any truce with Germany or Austria, and General Allenby had been instructed to follow the same policy in dealing with the Turks. Such a demand will be a very important factor, and it is not likely that the other Allies will show less regard for their nationals who are surfering in German camps. Even since the German peace overtures were launched they have not tended to instill any spirit of conciliation, forgiveness or leniency toward the enemy in British breasts. Yesterday, discussions in the House of Commons of the treatment of the British prisoners appeared to have been about the last straw breaking the back of British patience, which the country generally seems to think has been carried much too far. 
