CANADA'S BUDGET- REDUCTION IN FAVOR OF FARMERS.

Sir Thos. White delivered his budet speech to-day. In his tariff proder the Customs' Tariff War Revenue Act, 1915, a British preferential tariff rate of five per cent. and an intermediate and general tariff rate of seven and a half per cent. was imposed with certain exceptions. 

Now, with the additional high cost of living, it is bringing higher prices, sales during the present week being made at 75 cents a pound, wholesale. 





Newfoundland Politics.

For some time there have been signs that Newfoundland's war government was not as happy a political family as it might be, says the Montreal Gazette. Lord Morris resigned the premiership as a result of conditions personal as much as political, it seemed, and Sir William Lloyd undertook to carry on. The cessation of the war removed the cement that held the section together, and when Sir William Lloyd returned from the Peace Conference it was to from the Peace Conference it was to preside over a divided political family. At the beginning of April it was stated that an immediate dissoluwas stated that an immediate dissolution of the legislature and a general election had ben resolved on. A sudden change was made in the programme; but it was not followed by satisfaction. Sir Michael Cashin, the minister of finance, precipitated the crisis. He made his budget speech last week and presented a record creditable alike to the government and the colony, and that should have helped to strengthen public con-fidence. The conditions were evidently making for disruption, however. Mr. Coaker, who has been strong with the fishermen, was a disturbing influence also, and Sir William has thrown up the responsibility that goes with the premiership. In Newfoundland, though there are no marked issues separating the parties, political feeling runs strong and the discussions are warm if not broad. An election will clear the atmosphere and probably do no harm to any but personal interests.-Sydney Record.







Thrilling Experience of Father and Son During Frightful Gale Last

named Furneaux, belonging to Rose Blanche and his son, had a thrilling experience and narrow escape from drowning last Saturday.

In the hope of landing Dr. Weeks, Mrs. Weeks and his daughter on board the Kyle at Port aux Basques before the steamer left for North Sydney. Mr. Furneaux and his son set out from Rose Blanche Friday, and after a very rough and trying voyage succeeded in reaching their destination in time to catch the Kyle.

The same day Furneaux and his son n spite of warnings and protests of riends, attempted to make the return royage to Rose Blanche. It was a nerve-racking experience for father and son until they were sighted by the little steamer Scotsburn, which arrived here Monday. However, owing to the turbulent seas which tossed the motor boat containing the two men about like chips in an angry sea, on the steamer to make a rescue.

In the meantime however, the schooner Brunhilda, owned by Mr. J. Davis, of Port aux Basques, hove in and she was being buffeted about in such a manner as to lead the Scotsburn's commander to believe the craft vould become a total wreck. None the less dismayed, the skipper of the schooner managed his craft in capital style, while some members of the rew succeeded in launching a boat n the little motor boat, which was rapidly filling and in a few minutes afterwards sank from sight. Before she took the final plunge, however the dory from the Brunhilda reached the men and with much difficulty father and son were transferred and short time later were safely on

The Scotsburn's commander stood by for three or four hours ready to end what assistance he could to the Brunhilda, but thanks to sturdy Newoundlanders and a skilful skipper the schooner was successfully steered o a safe anchorage at her home port. Modern governments employ trained journalists to praise them in the public press. Napoleon Bonaparte

own propagandist and assumed all the

duties and responsibilities which are nowadays delegated to a committee

But what a sad failure! At the beginning of his career he made no at-

tempt to hide his intentions. "A Sove ereign," he stated, "must confiscate

public opinion and use it to his own advantage." Twenty years later, an

exile on St. Helena, he dictated a few

sad words of commentary: "My son will be obliged to rule with the help

of a free press." Whatever his orig-

inal ideas upon the subject, the great

Emperor could not put there into

practice until he had been appointed

commanding general of the French

armies in Italy in the year 1796. It

was a time when freedom of the press

ran riot in revolutionary France. De-

livered from the restrictive laws of

the old regime, every political party,

every political leader, printed a little

Napoleon wrote often to the direc-

tors and asked that steps be taken to

protect his reputation. The Paris

press, so he argued, was helping the

Austrians and the Sardinians, and

something must be done to counter-

act this evil influence. He suggest-

ed the foundation of an official newspaper, reflecting the opinions of the French Government. The directors

listened patiently, failed to answer the letters of their commander-in-

chief, and did nothing, until Gener-

al Napoleon, in despair, began to print

his own newspapers. In the year

1797, the Courrier de l'Armee d'Italie

appeared in Milan. A few weeks later

it was followed by La France vare de

The next year Napoleon transfer-

red the scene of his activities to

Egypt. As soon as he reached the

shores of the Nile, the Courrier

d'Egypte appeared, printed in Cairo,

originally in the French language, but

soon followed by editions in Arabic

for the benefit of the native, who must

be impressed by the glory and fame

of the foreign conqueror. From that

moment on Napoleon is master of the printed word in his adopted country.

After the coup d'état of XVIII Bru-

maire the freedom of the press was a

dead issue in France. On the 17th of January of the year 1800 Napoleon

restricted the number of newspapers that were to be printed in France to

exactly 12. The others were suspende

Not contented with his fame on

the field of battle the great general

fought his quarrels on paper and

concentrated his efforts upon a single

sheet, the Moniteur. This journal

was not a new enterprise. It had

made its first appearance early in

the year 1789 as an independent

newspaper . After 1801 it became the

defender and expounder of the Na-

poleonic theories of government and

administration. It printed the official

decrees and the official announce-

ments and was to be found on the

table of every Imperial office-holder.
