A Better Law Required.

The Prohibition proposition is now before the Legislature, the "Moder-ates" of the city and the outports hav-ing laid their case before that august body—the House of Assembly. The ing laid their case before that august body—the House of Assembly. The present law is not what the extremists or the moderates voted for, and a policy between that advocated by the extremists and the moderates is what is sought for by those who have engineered the law as it is now carried out. The world-old adage that people cannot be made sober by act of Parliament is as atrong now as it ever was; the proof of which is fully shown by the conditions that existed before the prohibition Law was put into effect, and during the halcyon days of what was supposed to be a model sober existence, the days, when the whole country was under Local Option Act, and the capital city was the only centre of the liquor sale. Nevertheless, the difference between the importation and sale of intoxicating liquors before and after the country went dry, as far as the sale of spirits were concerned, was

of intoxicating liquors before and after the country went dry, as far as the sale of spirits were concerned, was negligible. It seems that St. John's must have its liquor even if the country wants it or not. Under the present law, occasions, are reported when, at feetive gatherings there, the supply of liquid refreshments was as plentiful as it ever was fifty years ago at a St. John's regatts: We do not say that the liquid was whiskey, brandy, rum or gin, but circumstances indicated that it was something stronger than water. The present law is acknowledged to be anything other than what it was intended to be, and a law better in every way is desired. A total prohibition law is impossible in this Island—certain sections have easy and convenient means of securing supplies and the others, except a few sections, will fall back upon the practice followed in the blue grass states of America—will make all they require. Moral suasion is the best and only cure for this evil—the use of intoxicating liquors. A sensible law can be made and carried out, but a law that is under the control of extremists is doomed to be a failure. Let the assembled wisdom of the House Make a law free from all control outside the law, and have it a temperate measure.—Harbor Grace Standard.

Relief Works Closed.




