

The late Elections in the States.
Although it will be some time before the full returns of the Presidential election in the States are known yet a near enough estimate can be made that Grant and Colfax have carried the day by a two-thirds vote. All the States with the exception of New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Kentucky, Georgia, Louisiana and Oregon gave heavy majorities for Grant and Colfax. Out of the 26 States carried, they have 214 electoral votes, while Seymour and Blair out of the 8 States which gave them majorities have 79 votes.

The N. Y. Tribune thus estimates what the republic has gained by the election of Grant:—"In the election of Gen. Grant, the people have secured that for which they fought, UNION, PEACE, and EQUAL RIGHTS FOR ALL MEN. After seventy-five years of struggles over the question whether the Union is a league or a nation, and after fifty years of contest as to the right of all men to be free, the election of Gen. Grant finally seals the restoration of the Union, and founds an indissoluble nationality on the basis of universal liberty and manhood suffrage. The next four years may be occupied in part in getting the machinery of our new system into harmonious operation. But the principles on which our nation is now based admit of no further dispute. We are one indissoluble nation; all inhabitants are, or may become, citizens all citizens have equal civil rights, and all adult male citizens have equal political rights. In 1860, none of these propositions were true. In 1864, two millions of men were in the field, contending on the one side for, and on the other against them. In 1868, they are settled forever by the election of Grant on the Chicago platform. Such a reformation in our Constitution when viewed in all its aspects is infinitely more important to the American people and to mankind than our change from Colonies into independent States, or our adoption of the Federal Constitution. Both were steps toward the birth of a great and free nation. Neither was adequate to make the nation great or free. Independence transferred the control of our foreign and national interests from the Crown and Parliament to a body elected by ourselves. But independence alone involved no guarantee that our foreign and national affairs should be conducted with greater justice or even security than before. On the contrary, we found it perverted to aid Bonapartism by a war with England, and to extend Slavery by a war on Mexico."

DEGENERATING INDEED.
Other papers besides the Mercury are taking notice of the extraordinary course of the Advertiser in its feats of swinging round the political circle. Among others the Newmarket Era reads the following serious lecture to our erratic and erring brother:—
The Guelph Advertiser must have lost its reckoning in some way. In a late issue the editor recommends to the electors of Hon. Geo. Brown or Hon. M. Foley declining to accept a nomination for that constituency, the defeated South Wentworth—a gentleman of decidedly Conservative politics. Surely our contemporary must be in a bad way, when he can glide so easily from one side of the compass to the other. We recollect when the Advertiser was no uncertain sound, and when its columns would no more recommend a Conservative to the yeomanry of old Wellington than the verities of political mountebank in the country. We repeat the editor must have lost his reckoning; there is a screw loose somewhere. We fear the journal is fast degenerating. In years gone by the Advertiser done good service for the Reform party—had its colours nailed to the mast head—but a change appears to be "coming over the spirit of its dreams." Yes, Hon. George Brown or Mr. Thos. White: certainly a strange recommendation to any constituency.

Court of Chancery.
NOVEMBER 6th.
HARVEY vs. BOOMER.—Bill filed to declare that the late Absalom Shade, of Galt, was a trustee of properties conveyed to him in his lifetime by Alex. Harvey, of Fergus, for Mrs. Henry, and for an account of his dealings with the property. The counsel agreed to argue the case in Toronto. Mr. Strong, Q.C., Mr. Roof, Q.C., and Mr. Cross for plaintiff; Mr. Blake, Mr. Cattanch, and Mr. Moes for defendant.
NESBIT vs. HUTCHINSON.—The plaintiff was unable to proceed, on account of the absence of some of his witnesses.—His counsel entered into an understanding with defendant's counsel to hear the case at Hamilton on the 10th inst., and if plaintiff was not prepared then, the bill to be dismissed with costs. Mr. Murray for plaintiff; Mr. Evans for defendant.
WALKER vs. BROWN.—This cause did not come on for hearing, a settlement having been made by counsel. Mr. Bain for plaintiff; Mr. Guthrie for defendant. The business being finished the Court adjourned.

Henry Benn was charged by the issuer of tavern licenses, Thomas Saunders, with selling liquor without a license. It appeared that when he moved from Ennoscville to the Junction Hotel, the certificate of Mr. Lillie, the former proprietor, had been transferred to him, and this being presented to Mr. Saunders, he issued a license in the name that was on the certificate, viz. in Mr. Lillie's. It was Benn, however, who paid the necessary fees. Mr. Saunders warned him some time ago to procure a proper certificate, and take out a lawful license, but the defendant having been somewhat remiss the charge was laid. His Worship said that if Benn paid the money for the license, and Lillie never sold under it he could not see that he was guilty. The case was adjourned till the afternoon to procure further evidence.

Mary listened to this little discourse with her eyes fixed on those of the speaker. The words were soft enough in their way, but they were spoken from habit not from heart. Although disposed to gaiety, and a quick passionate nature, Mary was thoroughly sincere in every thought and act; so that falsehood under the cloak of religion was to her doubly repugnant.

She could not conceal her impression, and the frown which flitted across the brow of the Prioress, together with a shade of palor, denoted that she observed the effect of her words.
