Must be Put Down.

It is well known to every one who has watched the course of affairs in this country that the policy of the present leader of the Government has been for years to put down, and keep down, the Province of Ontario. This formed the basis of the complaints of Reformers during the long struggle for representation by population, which resulted in Confederation. When that was secured, the people of Ontario fondly believed that at last justice would be done to them, and that their political rights, guaranteed by the Union, would be respected and kept inviolate. But through the treachery of Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues who helped to draw up the Confederation Act, such fond expectations were destined not to be realised. They have been charged time and again with unfaithfulness to their pledges, with gross injustice to Ontario, and though they have repeatedly denied the charge, yet facts which they cannot gainsay or disprove meet them at every such denial. That such has been their policy no reflecting man doubts for a moment, and that such is to be their policy in future we have good proof. At the meeting in Toronto, on Thursday night, at which Mr. Robert Wilkes was nominated, Col. Denison, a Conservative, testified to the following fact: A prominent politician of British Columbia said recently to him (Col. Denison): "You in Ontario belong to the pivot Province in the Dominion. Sir John is our leader, and we will unite with him to keep Ontario down."

In the face of such an admission, and such a damning exposure of the treachery of Sir John Macdonald, we wonder how any elector in Ontario can be found to support such a Government, as employ every means in its power to keep Ontario down. Every man who does so is voting against his own interests and for men who studiously shape their policy in order to keep Ontario down. What better proof than that it is true can be furnished than the fact that Sir John gave British Columbia more representatives than the Constitution allows and extravagant sums of money to help him to put Ontario down. He gave Manitoba more representatives than the Constitution authorizes, and condoned the murder of a British subject to get the aid of Manitoba to put Ontario down. He violated the Constitution in giving Nova Scotia an extra subsidy, in order to get the aid of Nova Scotia to put Ontario down. He promises New Brunswick better terms in order to drag New Brunswick into the work of putting Ontario down. He wasted twelve million of dollars for the sole benefit of Quebec in the matter of the Intercolonial Railway in order to have the aid of Quebec to put Ontario down. He is working to cut off the Pacific Railway from connection with the railway system of Ontario, so that the expenditure of a hundred million dollars of public money and lands may inure to the chief benefit of Montreal, and so put Ontario down.

ELECTION NEWS.

Le Nouveau Monde is of opinion that the election of Mr. Smetzinger to the Local House in Cornwall practically determines the Dominion election in favor of the Reform nominee. The cordial support Mr. Patterson is receiving in South Brant has made the Conservative party aware of its weakness, and Mr. Watt had to succumb to the demands of his friends. As we stated yesterday he has withdrawn in favor of Sir Francis Hincks, who is now in the field against Mr. Patterson. There is no doubt that the Finance Minister will be badly beaten, as the Reform party was never so united. Mr. E. B. Wood attended the Barford meeting on Thursday night, and his speech told strongly against John A., Hincks & Co.

At a large and enthusiastic meeting of Reformers for Centre Toronto, held on Thursday night, Mr. Robert Wilkes, wholesale merchant, was nominated to represent that division of the city in the Commons. A requisition numerously signed was also presented to him, asking him to stand. He has accepted the nomination. Mr. Wilkes is an earnest, intelligent and able Reformer, and will make a valuable acquisition to Parliament. It is thought he will go in unopposed, but whether or not his election is sure by an overwhelming majority.

Speaking of the Conservative candidate for South Perth, the Stratford Beacon says that to every one's surprise Mr. Kidd has allowed the glamour to be cast over him, and he is going down into the pit which his newly found friends the Orangemen have dug for him. He is in many respects a good citizen, and we are sorry to see him being used for unworthy purposes—but purposes that even with his candidature will not be accomplished. The fate of his protegee at the election of 1871—the base betrayal of his co-religionist, Mr. Donovan, by the Orangemen at that time—should have been to Mr. Kidd a sufficient warning.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of

Reformers was held in London on Friday evening in the City Hall. Speeches were given by Hon. A. Mackenzie and Mr. Hugh McMahon, barrister, of that city, on the political issues of the day. Mr. Mackenzie met with a most enthusiastic reception, speaking for more than two hours, and his address was carried unanimously, and the meeting closed with hearty cheers for both speakers.

Sir John visited Stratford on Friday, when owing to Grand Trunk influences he received a better reception than he has done at any other place. After lunch a meeting was organized when Sir John entered into a defence of his Government. Another honourable put in his appearance, but much as he would desire to be placed in that category, he is not yet a Cabinet Minister. This was the Hon. William Macdougall. He also spoke, and like a whipped hound fawned on the men who had kicked him. His speech was taken up mainly by some old charges against Mr. George Brown and abuse of the Ontario Government. He also repeated the old accusation of mismanagement of the railway fund, and of being concerned in the Proton affair. The new minister, Hon. Mr. O'Connor, also addressed the meeting. The demonstration was a complete failure. It was expected that from two to three thousand persons would have been present, but the number at the luncheon was less than five hundred.

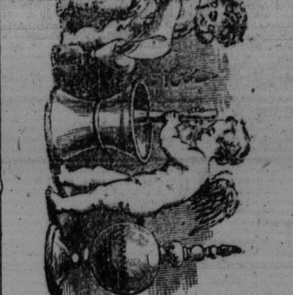

The Wool Clip in the North-West.

It appears that the wool clip of the North-West promises to come in late this season, owing to the backward spring, which has retarded general farm work, and hence made it necessary to postpone shearing very generally until other work has been disposed of. As to the amount of the clip, there is reason to fear that it will not exceed, if indeed it will not fall somewhat below, that of last year. In Wisconsin the flocks are not as large as at this time last year, and in Michigan it is estimated that there will be a falling off of at least ten per cent. There seems to have been no general effort made to keep up and increase the flocks in the North-West, owing to the moderate price of wool last spring; while the drought of last fall injured the pastures and compelled many of the sheep raisers to begin foddering a month or so earlier than usual; consequently flocks were reduced in number to save fodder, which was neither abundant nor cheap. The advance in the price of wool later in the season came too late to stimulate production, and there seems, therefore, to be good grounds for believing that the amount of the clip in the North-West will be somewhat, and possibly considerably less, this year than last. In Ohio, the largest wool-growing State east of the Rocky Mountains, the condition is reported to be much the same. Nor is there any good reason for believing that there will be any considerable increase of production in this or the New England States. In West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri, Kansas and Iowa, however, the clip is likely to be in excess of last year, though not sufficient to offset the deficiency reported elsewhere, while the production of Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and other States is so small as not to affect the supply materially.—Financial Chronicle.

And whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable as hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned, towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County hereinafter mentioned, and to grant the sums hereinafter mentioned to assist in making and maintaining the Township and County lines hereinafter mentioned, the Council of the Corporation of the County of Wellington deeming the County at large sufficiently interested in the said works to justify such assistance, but not sufficiently interested to justify the Council in at once assuming the same as County Works, namely: To the Township of Maryborough towards making the road known as the centre side road in that Township \$600 To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the road between the eighth and ninth concessions in that township 800 To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that township 200 To the Township of Pilkington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions 400 To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the Minto and Normanby town line \$300, on condition that the County of Guelph grant an equal amount 800 To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that township 600 The Village of Elora towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads 200 To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road known as the extension of the Ferguson and Douglas County Road to Waldemar Railway Station 500 To the Township of Arthur towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that township 500 To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making a bridge over the Grand River on the road between the second and third concessions of that township 500 To the Village of Mount Forest towards making the road known as the town line east of Main street, and the bridge over the river M'land 300 To the Township of Guelph towards making a bridge over the river Speed, on Wellington street, by Mr. Gow's mill in Guelph town 500 To the Village of Orangeville towards making a bridge over the river Credit in that village 200 To the Township of Erin towards making the road from Brisbane to Erin village 400 To the Village of Arthur, towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station 200 To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the centre side road in Peel from Arthur village to Glenallan 1000 To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the seventh concession line in that township 1000 To the Township of Eramosa towards making the road in that township from Rockwood to the town line of Guelph 200 To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgours' road in that township 400 To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road between the fourteenth and fifteenth concessions of that township 500 To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of Amaranth and Luther and East Garafraxa 400 To the Township of Arthur towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel, Maryborough and Arthur 800 To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin 200 To the Township of Peel towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station 100 To the Township of Maryborough towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourteenth concession 100 To the Township of Luther towards making the town line road between the townships of Arthur and Luther 400 And whereas it is necessary to rebuild the bridges at Arthur, at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the said County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand, two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges. And whereas for the purposes aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt of twenty thousand dollars to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned. And whereas it will require the sum of three thousand and nineteen dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars and interest. And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said office, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$13,596,258.

And whereas there is no interest in arrears. And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in this municipal year contracted any debts or loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditure which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars. And whereas a copy of this By-Law hath been duly published according to law. Therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington, in pursuance of the powers in it in that behalf vested, and by the Council thereof enacted as follows: That the Wardens of the said County for the time being, be, and he is hereby authorized, empowered, and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue in due form of law the sum of twenty thousand dollars in debentures of the said Corporation of the said County in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twelve years at farthest from the day on which this By-Law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be signed by the Wardens, and countersigned by the Treasurer, and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of said interest, which debentures the Wardens is hereby authorized to negotiate and dispose of.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to all other rates be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said County during the continuance of the said debentures. AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinbefore mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and no account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council. No person lending money upon or purchasing said Debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-Law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two. The above is a true copy of a proposed By-Law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
