The consolidated debt of the city is no eing reduced, although a large sum has been ealized annually from the increased assess nent, while a very great addition has been made to the debt for local improvements, amounting to about one million two hundred nousand dollars, which, with expenditures inder control, will bring it up to about two nillions of dollars, for which the ratep. yer is millions of dollars, for which the ratep. yer is specially taxed over and above the ordinary rate of taxation. This branch of finance demands, it seems to me, much closer attention than has hitherto been devoted to it.

I need hardly point to the rapid growth of the general expenditure. The annual cost of the police force has more than doubled within the last ten years. In 1873 it was \$51,000, while it is now upwards of \$115.000; and I for one will not aumit that there has been any increase in the efficiency of the force at all commensurate with the increased outlay. I do not say this in any carping spirit, or with any intention of reflecting upon the members of the force individually; but I am satisfied that there is something radically wrong in the management. In former times when crime was committed, the perpetrators were, as a fulle, brought to justice, but of late burglars and thieves appear than of the ordinary of the ordi and the ves appear (onavenad the appear and the hard-working citizen loses' his property without redress, though compelled' to pay roundly for its protection. I think that with proper organization and discipline the police should be able, not only to cope successfully with criminals, but also to relieve the

The waterworks, which cost an enormous sum of money, are in a most unsatisfactory condition, endangering the health of the city, and should be renovated without delay. The cleansing of the public streets I regard as a matter of great importance, and some economical system should be adopted for accomplishing this desirable object.

Regarding the abolition of exemptions, I consider that every citizen should bear his fair share of the taxation, and that all lands should be assessed. But I am also of opinion that in connection with churches or charitable institutions the buildings should be exempt.

BROOKLYN HOME. Children Scattered Over the City-A Visitor Lost-Prompt, Action to Res build the Institution: BROOKLYN, Dec. 19. -The fire which detroyed St. John's home yest rday was attended by a large loss of life. At 12,30 this afternoon twelve bodies had been recovered ven were the remains of boys in the institution. The remaining one was that of an adult, either McCaren or Mrs. Haligan, ac-

adult, either McCaren or Mrs. Haligan; acdresses unknown, who were visiting the home, and both of whom perished. The bodics are so blackened that identification is impossible.

Several of the trustees visited the ruins this evening with the intention of learning as far as p ssible how many lives were lost. Col. Carroll made a careful inspection of the remains and came to the conclusion that only ten bodies had been found. No more bodies had been found up to dark when the searching closed. The body of the woman found in the ruins is that of Mrs. Mary McCaren of New York, who had been to visit her fatherless boy.

The board of managers met this evening to take steps for providing for the homeless. Several charitable institutions made offers of assistance, and the county charity commissioners sent word that they had several buildings racant which the asylum people were welcome to. The committee appointed to collect the orphans could not find them all, as they have gone to every part of the city. The building committee was directed to proceed at once with the rebuilding of the west wing.


