





But queer as he looks when he is at ease it is only when he is frighten-ed or excited that he becomes funny. If he is hooked, for instance, he comes to the surface grinding those protruding teeth so that the sound can be heard a good many feet away. And then as soon as the hand touches him he begins to grunt hoarsely, and with each grunt he swells a bit till within a few moments he has puff-ed himself so full of air that he is guite round and firm like a ball. So

So thoroughly does he distend himself with air that when the fishermen hurl him at the water with all their force, as they often do, he will bounce just like a rubber ball. If he is dropped into the water after blowing himself full of air he floats on it as lightly as thistledown, and he will stay that way until he has assured himself that danger has gone by. He does the same when pur-sued by other fish. And as he floats almost entirely out of water, with only a little bit of his hard, spiny body sunk under the surface, very few fish can hurt him once ha is inflated.

Titanic Goes Down With 1,300 Lives.

New York, April 15 —The greatest marine disaster in the history of the world occurred last Sunday night, when the Titanic, of the White Star Line, the largest and finest of steamships, shattered herself against an iceberg and sank with

herself against an iceberg and sank with 1,300 of her passengers and crew in less than four hours. Out of nearly 2,200 people that she carried, only 866 were sayed, and most of these were women and children. They were picked up from small boats by the Cunarder Carpathia, which tound, when she ended her desperate race against time, a sea strewn with the wreckage of the kost ship and the hodies of drowned

What Drainage is Worth in a Dry Season.

Free Assistance In Drainage Again Offered By The O. A. C,

Offered By The O. A. C, During the exceptionally dry season of 1911 land that was underdrained pro-duced on the average about \$16.50 more per acre than land that was not drained, according to data collected by the De-partment of Physics at the Ontario Agri-cultural College. Reports were received from a large number of farmers, of whom twenty-five were able to give definite figures on yields on drained and undrained land. Three of the number said they saw no differ-ence, but all the others reported in-creases. Eleven counties were repre-sented in the reports, from Jurham in the east to Essex in the west. The value of increases, including straw, was figured at October, 1911, prices, and March, 1912, prices. The former showed an average of \$15.97 per acre and the latter \$17.04, and both together an average of \$16.50. The three who reported no increases were counted in obtaining the averages. In wet seasons the results are even more marked, but even at \$165 op per acre, drains more than pay for them-selves in two years.

note marked, but even at \$16.50 per sacre, drains more than pay for them-selves in two years. The O.A.C. is again renewing its offer of assistance to farmers in laying out their drainage systems. The Depart-ment of Physics has a special staff of Drainage Advisers for this work. There is no charge tor the services of these men, the only outlay to the farmer being the travelling expenses, which are low. As the railway fare is only one cent a mile for this work, and as several surveys are made on one trip the expenses are dividee among the several parties con-cerned. Anyone wishing to have a drain-age survey made should drop a card to the Department of Physics, O. A. C., Guelph, whereupon regular application form will be sent, and later on one of the Department's Drainage Advisors will make the survey. make the survey.
