MR. LAUDER will give Weekly Recitals of the works of the great masters, both ancient and modern, and will deliver a series of lectures, embracing, besides the theory and practice of the art, the following subjects : Beethoven, Mozart, Chopin, Schumann, Wagner, The Romantic School, The Italian, French, German Opera, Sonata, Origin of Music, Forms of Composition, Passion and Miracle Plays in connection with the Opera, The Music of the Ancients, The Orchestra and its Instruments. Each of the lectures will be illustrated at the piano by the performance of characteristic compositions.

The Private rooms accommodate three pupils, and the dormitories eight.

The payments for board and tuition, which are proportioned between THREE TERMS, must be made STRICTLY IN ADVANCE at the commencement of each term, viz. : 20th of September, 20th of January, 1st of April.

A term's notice or a term's payment is required before the removal of a pupil.

If any pupil desires instruction in any department not mentioned above, the Principal will endeavor to arrange therefor.

REDUCTIONS.

A limited number of the *daughters* of Clergymen are received at a reduction of one-half the usual charges—except in regard to extras.

For children under ten, \$50 per annum.

For sisters entering at the same time, \$25 each per annum.

YEARLY SCHOLARSHIPS.

The authorities of Hellmuth Ladies' College wishing to accommodate, as far as possible, parents who desire that their daughters should attend the College steadily, and enjoy all the highest advantages that the institution affords at a moderate cost, are willing to grant "YEARLY SCHOLARSHIPS" at a reduced rate, viz., \$400, WHICH MUST BE PAID STRICTLY IN ADVANCE.

This Scholarship includes Board, Laundry, and Private Room ; Instruction in all the English Branches, Classics, Mathematics, Ancient and Modern Languages, Vocal and Instrumental Music, Drawing and Painting in Oils and Water Colors. It also includes the fee of \$12 for the use of plate, linen, etc., and Medical Attendance and Medicine.

The use of Books and Organ Lessons are not included in the Yearly Scholarship.

BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, ETC.

The College is situated within a mile of the city, in the most prominent and healthy locality on the banks of the River Thames.

The GROUNDS comprise about FORTY ACRES, part of which is laid out and planted with a view to ornament, with ample PLAY-GROUND, etc.

The Main Building is 118 feet in length by 60 feet in depth, with spacious CORRIDORS on each floor the full length of the building, and a VERANDAH in front of the building 10 feet in width.

The building contains a *Lecture Room, spacious Class Rooms, Studio and Library, Dining-Hall, Drawing-Rooms, Parlors, Private Bed Rooms, Dormitories, Sanitorium, Baths (hot and cold)*, and all other appurtenances of a College.

The whole premises have been expressly planned and arranged so as to secure every possible facility for the Educational and Domestic requirements of the pupils. The Ventilation, Heating, and Drainage are on the most modern and approved plans.

Divine Service is held in St. Anne's Chapel, situated in the College Grounds.

The object of this Institution, as contemplated by its founder, is to provide a thorough, liberal and useful education for young ladies, adapted to their wants in life, and based upon the soundest PROTESTANT CHRISTIAN PRINCIPLES, as the only solid basis for the right formation of character.

No pains or means have been spared to afford the highest and best education in every branch.

The DISCIPLINE of the College, its DOMESTIC, SOCIAL and EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENTS, are under the most careful supervision. The Lady Principal, Mrs. English, will pay special attention to the comfort and health of the pupils, and will be happy to correspond with parents or guardians in regard to their daughters.

Everything is done to make the College an attractive Christian home, and the material provision for the health and comfort of the pupils is perfect.

French is spoken in the College, and a French service is held in the chapel every Sunday afternoon.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

PREPARATORY CLASS.—For Elementary Instruction.

FIRST CLASS.—Biblical History and Literature, Reading, Writing, Mental and Practical Arithmetic, Spelling, Grammar and Composition, Geography and Map Drawing, English, Canadian and American History, Natural History, Elocution.

SECOND CLASS.—Biblical History and Literature, Reading, Writing, Mental and Practical Arithmetic, Spelling, Synonyms, Grammar, Composition, Political Geography, Map Drawing, English and Grecian History, English Literature, Chemistry, Mythology, Elocution.

THIRD CLASS.—Biblical History and Literature, Reading, Writing, Mental and Practical Arithmetic, Spelling, Etymology, Grammar and Analysis, Composition, Rhetoric, Physical Geography, Roman and Modern History, English Literature, Botany, Domestic Economy, Elocution.

GRADUATING CLASS.—Biblical History, and Literature, Moral Philosophy, Ecclesiastical History, Composition, Rhetoric, Etymology, Logic, Classical and Modern Geography, Universal History, Universal Literature with critical readings, Political Economy, Physiology, Geology, Astronomy, Natural Philosophy, Mathematics, Elocution.

LANGUAGES.—*Ancient*: Latin and Greek. *Modern*: French, German, Italian and Spanish.

DRAWING.—From Models, including the Principles of Perspective, upon the modern plan adopted in European Schools.

PAINTING.—In Water Colors and Oil. Ornamental Free Hand Drawing.

MUSIC.—Piano/orte, Organ, Part Singing, Theory and History of Music, Harmony, Counterpoint, etc.

CALISTHENICS.

NEEDLEWORK.—Plain and Ornamental.

N. B.—It is desirable that Parents should leave the choice of studies, as far as possible, in the hands of the faculty, who carefully study the capacity and requirements of each pupil.

PRIZES.

A Silver Medal is given by His Excellency the Governor-General for General Proficiency. Medals and a number of Prizes are presented by His Lordship Bishop Hellmuth. A Gold Medal will be presented by the Rev. Professor Seaborne, for Sciences. Four valuable prizes will be presented by the Musical Director, W. Waugh Lauder, Esq.

DIPLOMAS.—These are the highest honors of the Institution, and are awarded to pupils who have satisfied the Examiners under the following regulations: The subjects are divided into three groups; candidates must pass in 9 subjects in group A, 12 optional subjects in group B, and in two languages in group C.

CERTIFICATES.—Pupils who pursue only a partial course of study at the Institution, receive, after passing the necessary examination, Special Certificates of qualifications and attainments.

A report of the progress and conduct of each pupil is sent to the Parents or Guardians at the end of each term.

VACATIONS.

The vacations are from the 21st of December to the 20th of January, and from the 1st of July to the 20th of September. The Easter vacation is only from Good Friday to Easter Monday inclusive. To prevent any delay in the formation of classes, or irregularity at the end of the term, all pupils should keep strictly to the above dates. The attention of parents or guardians is urgently requested to this notice. Fifty extra marks are awarded to pupils who obey this rule.

Young ladies are admitted who have graduated in this or any other institution, and who may specially desire to devote their time to the higher branches of general literature, the sciences, modern languages, vocal and instrumental music, drawing and painting.

NOTE.—It is specially desired that the dress of the pupil shall be simple and inexpensive, and every article of clothing distinctly marked with the owner's name, and an inventory of the same enclosed in each trunk.

The only persons allowed to visit pupils are parents, guardians, and friends introduced by them, who bring a **WRITTEN REQUEST** from such parents or guardians, to be permitted to visit their children or wards.

Pupils are admitted from the age of seven.
