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INTRODUCTION.

MAP OF THE WORLD.

ORTELIUS and MERCATOR, in the 16th century, conceived the idea of dividing all known lands into three great divisions; the Old World, comprising Europe, Asia, and Africa; the New World, or America; and the Terra Australis or Magellanica, Austral or Southern World; to which Varenius added the Arctic World. At a later period, when the knowledge of the Pacific became more extensive, but the notion of a Southern or Antarctic continent still prevailed, De Brosses proposed the names of Australia for the island of New Holland and the surrounding groups; Polynesia for the groups scattered over the Pacific; and Magellania for the supposed Southern Continent. Finally, geographers have agreed to consider the Island World of the Pacific Ocean as a third continent under the name of Oceania.

Adopting this classification, Walckenaer divides the land area of the globe into three great continents called worlds, which are completely separated from each other by the circumfluent ocean.

Old World, subdivided into Europe, Asia, and Africa.

New World, subdivided into North America and South America.

Maritime World or Oceania, subdivided into Malaysia, Australia, and Polynesia.

The ocean, with all its inland bays and seas, covers an area of nearly 147,800,000 square miles, or about three-fourths of the surface of the globe. Laplace has calculated from the influence of the sun and moon upon our planet, that the depth of the sea cannot exceed 26,500 feet. If we suppose its mean depth to be about two miles, its cubic contents will be nearly 300,000,000 cubic miles.

The ocean forms in fact a single mass of fluid surrounding the land, and penetrating the continents with numerous indentures. But geographers generally divide it into five great

The Pacific Ocean, 11,000 miles in length from east to west, and 8,000 in breadth, covers

an area of 50,000,000 square miles.

The Atlantic, 8,600 miles in length from north to south, and from 1,800 to 5,400 in breadth,

covers about 25,000,000 square miles.

The Indian Ocean, lying between 40 degrees S. and 25 degrees N. lat. is about 4,500 miles in length, and as many in breadth, covering a surface of 17,000,000 square miles.

The Antarctic Ocean, lying round the South Pole, and joining the Indian Ocean in the latitude of 40 degrees S. and the Pacific in 50 degrees, embraces an area of about 30,000,000 square miles.

The Arctic Ocean surrounds the North Pole, lying to the North of Asia and America, and

having a circuit of about 8,400.

The whole land area of the globe has been differently estimated; the most recent and accurate calculations make it 50,200,000 square miles, distributed as follows:—

EUROPE.

EUROPE forms the north-western portion of the Eastern Hemisphere, or Old World, and is situate between 34° and 82° N. lat. if Spitzbergen be included, and between 24° W. and 71° E. long., including Iceland and Novaiya Zemlia. But the extremities of the continental portion are comprised within narrower limits; Cape Nord Kyn, the most northern point, being in lat. 71° 6′ N.; the two most southern points, Punta de Tarifa in Spain, in lat. 36°, and Cape Matapan in the Morea, in lat. 36° 17′ N.; the most western point, Cape St Vincent, in 9° W. long.; and the most eastern point in the Ural Mountains, near lekaterinburg, in 60° 20′ E. long. The greatest length of the Continent is in the direction of north-east and south-west, from the mouth of the river Kara, on the Arctic Ocean, and to St Vincent, in Spain, and is estimated at 3490

British miles. The greatest breadth, from Cape Matapan to Nord Kyn, is about 2420 miles. The superficial area is estimated to contain about 3,900,000 square miles.

Europe is at present divided into eighty-six sovereign states; but of these a great proportion belong to the Germanic or the Swiss confederation, and can scarcely be considered as really independent. The following table exhibits, at one view, the manes of the principal political divisions—the numes and the religious of their population—and the names of their capital cities; the smaller German states being all classed as one under the name of "German states," and the Swiss cantons under that of Switzerland.

England and Wales occupy the southern, and by much the larger portion of the island of Great Britain, and are situate between 50° and 55° 50′ N. lat., and 2° E. and 5° 40′ W. long. They form an extensive triangular peninsula, bounded on three sides by the sea, and separated at the northern angle from Scotland by a line which extends from the north-eastern corner of the Solway Firth to the mouth of the river Tweed.

SCOTLAND.

SCOTLAND occupies the northern portion of Great Britain, and has numberless islands along its western and northern coasts. The longest line which can be drawn on the mainland is 280 miles, from the Mull of Galloway to Dunnet Head. The greatest length, measured along the meridian, is 274 miles, from the Mull of Galloway to Cape Wrath. The breadth is very variable the greatest being 146 miles, from Buchan-ness in Aberdeenshire, to the most westerly point of Ross-shire, but the country is so penetrated by inlets of the sea, that there is actually no place which is more than 40 miles inland. The area has been estimated at 32,164 square miles, or 20,586,930 imperial acres.

Scotland is divided into thirty-three shires or sheriffdoms, subdivided into parishes; which are at once ecclesiastical and civil divisions. The following table contains the names and extent of the shires in square miles and acres, the area of the arable, pasture, and meadow land, the population in 1841, and the names of the ancient districts or provinces which make up the modern shires, names which are still in popular use, and also employed in legal documents.

IRELAND.

IRELAND is situate to the west of Great Britain, from which it is separated by the Irish Sea and St George's Channel. It is of a rhomboidal form, having its longer side nearly in the direction of the meridian, and its shorter from north-east to south-west. In the direction of its greatest diagonal, from Browhead to Fairhead, Ireland measures 306 miles, but its greatest length on a meridian, is only 235. Its greatest breadth, from the extremity of the Mullet peninsula, in Mayo, to the mouth of Lough Strangford, is 182 miles; but from Dublin to Galway, the narrowest part, it is only 110. The island contains an area of 32,035 square miles, or 20,499,550 imperial acres; whereof 14,603,415 acres are cultivated, or capable of cultivation, the remainder being covered with mountains, bogs, and lakes. The sea which separates Ireland from Great Britain varies considerably in breadth. The shortest distance between the two islands is from Fair Head in Antrim, to the Mull of Cantire in Argyllshire, which is 12 miles; from Port-Patrick in Galloway, to the nearest point of Antrim, it is 22 miles; from Holy Head, to Howth Head, it is 60 miles; and from Carnsore Point in Wexford, to St David's Head in South Wales, about 50 miles. The greatest width of the Irish Sea is 130 miles.

Ireland is divided popularly, but not officially, into four provinces,—Leinster, Ulster, Connaught, and Munster. The real administrative division is into thirty-two counties, which are subdivided into 252 baronies. Parishes likewise form both civil and ecclesiastical divisions; but their limits do not always correspond to those of the counties and baronies; some of them extending not only into different baronies, but even into different counties. The following Table contains the names of the counties arranged into provinces, their extent in square miles

and imperial acres, and the name of the county town.

FRANCE

Before the Revolution of 1789, France was divided into thirty-three Governments, or Provinces, of very unequal extent, which were sub-divided into generalities, and sub-delegations. It is now divided into eighty-six Departments, or Prefectures, named mostly after their principal river, mountain, or some other natural feature. These Departments are divided into 363 Sub-Prefectures, or Arrondissements; these into 2845 Cantons, and these into 38,623 Communes. Each Department is under the charge of a Prefect; each Arrondissement of a Sub-Prefect; and each Commune of a Maire; besides other officers of various ranks and duties.

FRANCE.

France is situate nearly in the middle of the northern temperate zone, between 42° 20′, and 51° 5′ N. lat., and 8° 25′ E., and 4° 48′ W. longitude. Its greatest length, from the most westerly point of Finistere to Antibes in the Department of the Var, is about 665 British miles; and the greatest breadth, from Givet in Ardennes to Mont Horumba, near Saint Jean Pied de Port in the Lower Pyrenees, 576. The superficial area, as stated in the Statistique de la France, is 52,768,618 hectares—equal to 185,515 English square miles, or 118,729,600 English acres

EMPIRE OF AUSTRIA.

The empire of Austria is situate in the centre of Europe, between 42° and 51° N. lat., and 9° and 27° E. long. Its greatest length, from Sesto Calende on the Ticino, in the Duchy of Milan, to the confluence of the Podhorze and the Dniester, at the eastern extremity of Galicia, is 750 geographical miles; and its breadth, from Trau, on the Adriatic Sea, in Dalmatia, to the northern extremity of Bohemia, 442 miles. It is formed by the union of different countries, inhabited by people, differing in race, language, religion, form of government, manners, customs, and institutions, who have no natural connection with each other, and are held together by the single tie of a common sovereign and a central government.

The German geographers agree in dividing into four great portions all the countries of which the Empire is composed, viz.:—1. The German provinces; 2. The Polish provinces; 3. The Hungarian provinces, among which they reckon not only Hungary, Transylvania, and the Military borders, but also the kingdom of Dalmatia; 4. The Italian provinces, in which they include only the Lombardo-Venetian kingdom. But the Empire is actually divided into fifteen governments, which are sub-divided into circles, provinces, counties, districts, &c.

KINGDOM OF PRUSSIA.

The kingdom of Prussia is situate, like Austria, nearly in the centre of Europe, and, like it, is composed of various countries, provinces, and districts, inhabited by people of different races and languages, and who have no other bond of union than that of being placed under a common sovereign. Exclusive of Neufchatel, and some small isolated districts in Saxony, the kingdom is formed of two large, unequal, and perfectly distinct, tracts of country, separated from each other by the German States of Hanover and Brunswick, Hesse, Nassau, and the kingdom and duchies of Saxé. The outline is extremely irregular, and it would be difficult to guess with any degree of certainty at the length and breadth. We may, however, mention that the dis-

tance between the north-eastern and south-western extremities of the kingdom is upwards of 700 miles. The area of the kingdom is reckoned at about 5077 German, or 81,232 geographical square miles.

The kingdom is now divided into eight provinces, which are subdivided into twenty-five Regierungs bezirke, (governments or arrondissements,) and again portioned out into 328 circles. The canton of Neufchatel is not comprised in any of these divisions, nor in the following Table, but will be found in the illustration of the Map of Switzerland.

This immense extent of country is divided by Behring's Straits into two perfectly distinct portions, the smaller of which forms the north-western extremity of America. Of the larger, or European and Asiatic portion, the breadth varies from 1900 English miles in long. 45° E., to 460 in long. 160°; giving a superficial area of 3,409,000 square geographical miles, or about 4,740,000 square English miles, with an average population of less than 15 to the square mile.

SWEDEN AND NORWAY.

THESE two countries form together a large peninsula, lying between the Atlantic Ocean on the west, and the Baltic Sea and Gulf of Bothnia on the east. The greatest length, from Falsterbo, in the province of Malmo, to Cape Nordkun in Finmark, exceeds 1000 geographical miles, and the superficial area is about 292,700 square English miles, of which 170,150 are in Sweden, the remainder in Norway.

Though forming only one geographical region, and subject to the same sovereign, Sweden and Norway are, nevertheless, two perfectly distinct states, with separate governments, legislatures, and financial and judicial establishments. Sweden is divided into twenty-four lan or shires, each of which is subdivided into fogderier or districts. Norway is divided into seventeen amts or bailiwicks, according to the following table : -

Sweden Proper contains the lans of Stockholm, Upsala, Westeras, Nykoping, Oerebro, Carlstad, Stora-kopparberg, Gesteborg; corresponding to the ancient provinces of Upland, Sodermanland, Westmanland, Nerike, Warmeland, Delarne, Gestrikland, and Helsingland.

Gothia contains the lans of Linkoping, Calmar, Jonkoping, Kronoberg, Blekinge, Skaraborg, Elfsborg, Gotheborg and Bohus, Halmstad, Christianstad, Malmohus, Gottland; corresponding to the ancient provinces of Ostergothland, Smaland, Blekinge, Westergothland, Dasland, Halland, Skane, and the islands of Gottland and Osland.

Nordland contains the lans of Nordbotten, Westerbotten, Westernorrland, Jamtland; corresponding to the ancient provinces of Wester Bothnia and Lapmark, Medelpadia and Angermanland, Jamtland and Herjeadalen.

In 1751, the population of Sweden amounted to 1,785,727; in 1800, to 2,347,303; and in 1830, to 2,888,082. Norway, in 1825, contained 1,051,318 inhabitants; and in 1836, the population was 1,200,000, shewing an increase of nearly 150,000 during the preceding ten years. In Sweden, the annual number of births is 1 in 28 of the population; in Norway, 1 to 34. In Sweden, the marriages are 1 in 112; in Norway, 1 in 130; but in Sweden the mortality is 1 in 34½, in Norway, only 1 in 48. The standing army amounts to 33,000 men, but in time of war it may be raised by conscription to 240,000.

In 1825, the inhabitants of the towns of Sweden amounted to 279,645, or about one-tenth of the reproduction. Steelebola had then a reproduction of 70,182; Getbeakurg, 26,702; Guller

ITALY.

ITALY is situate in the middle of the southern region of Europe, and consists chiefly of a long narrow peninsula, projected into the Mediterranean Sea, and separated on the north-west and north from France, Switzerland, and Germany, by the Alps, which form, in most places, an almost impassable barrier. Including Sardinia and Sicily, but without Corsica, which belongs to France, the superficial extent of Italy exceeds 120,000 square English miles.

Since the downfall of the Roman Empire, Italy has never formed one state. It has always been parcelled out among numerous Princes and Lords, and now contains nine Sovereign States, one of which indeed forms an integral part of the Austrian Empire, while the others are all politically subject to the domineering influence of Austria

DENMARK.

DENMARK is situate at the mouth of the Baltic Sea, between 53° and 58° N. Lat., and 7° and 13° E. Long., and is composed of a large peninsula and a number of islands, the total superficial area of which is supposed to amount to about 21,000 square English miles. The Kingdom of Denmark, properly so called, comprises only the peninsula of North Jutland, the islands between Jutland and Sweden, and the island of Bornholm. To these possessions have been added at different times the duchy of Schleswick, or South Jutland, the Farde Islands in the Atlantic Ocean, the duchies of Holstein and Lauenburg, with the lordship of Pinneberg, the county of Ransau, and the city of Altona, which originally formed part of the German empire; and as sovereign of which the king now ranks as a member of the Germanic confederation. confederation.

The Kingdom of Denmark has been for a long time divided into bailiwicks, the administration of which is entirely separated from the judicial department; but in the duchies, which are also divided into bailiwicks, the bailies are at once ministerial and judicial officers. In the following table, the first column contains the names of the bailiwicks, and the second, the countries or islands in which they are situate.

SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.

THESE two countries, though politically independent, form one geographical region, and cannot well be described separately. They form together a large and compact peninsula, situate at the south-western extremity of Europe, and containing about 167,000 square geographical miles; of which the Kingdom of Spain contains 187,400, and the Kingdom of Portugal 29 600 Portugal, 29,600.

KINGDOM OF SPAIN.

By a royal decree, dated 30th November, 1833, the Spanish territory in the Peninsula and adjacent islands, was divided into forty-nine provinces, taking their names from their respective capitals, except Navarre, Biscay, Alava, and Guipuscoa, which retain their ancient denominations; but for military purposes, these are arranged into twelve Captain-generalships.

TURKEY, OR OTTOMAN EMPIRE.

THE OTTOMAN EMPIRE, in its present diminished state, still comprehends a portion of the three divisions of the old world. In Europe, it includes Rumelia, or the countries lying between the Danube and the frontier of Greece; in Asia, it includes Asia-Minor, a portion of Armenia, and the countries watered by the Euphrates and Tigris; and in Africa, Tripoli and Barca,—all countries under the absolute sovereignty of the Padishah, or Emperor. Besides these, Syria, Hedjas, and Egypt, though possessed by an independent Pasha, are still considered as parts of the Empire. Of the superficial area of this wide spread Empire, no proper estimate can be made; inasmuch as the African and Asiatic portions of it extend into sandy deserts, where they have no determinate boundaries. Its extreme limits, however, the north-western, and the

south-eastern, are nearly 2000 miles asunder; and the breadth of the Empire stretches through 25° of lat., or about 1700 miles. It is scarcely possible to form an estimate of the population; if known to the officers of Government, they do not think proper to publish it; and all that can be affirmed of it is, that it is very thinly scattered, and that the bulk of the inhabitants are everywhere in the lowest state of poverty and moral degradation. The Ottoman Turks are a branch of the great Toorkee family from Central Asia; but their proper designation is OSMANLEE or OTHMANLEE, so called from Osman or Othman, the founder of the Empire, and the ancestor of the Imperial Family. Their total number is believed not to exceed 4,000,000; the rest of the population of the Empire consisting of Greeks, Arabs, Armenians, Turkomans, Kurdes, Druses, Maronites, Jews, &c.

The Turkish dominions in Europe and Asia were, till lately, divided into two great portions, each of which was under the charge of a *Beghlerbegh*, (Lord of Lords.) The one of these officers resided either at Monastir or Sophia, in Rumelia; the other sometimes at Angora, sometimes at Kutahya. Besides this general division, there were smaller governments called eyalet, or principalities, which were subdivided into livas and sanjaks, (banners.) The eyalets were under the superintendence of viziers or pashas of three tails, and the livas of mirmirans, or pashas of two tails. At the commencement of the seventeenth century, the Empire contained 44 eyalets, and 220 livas: but, at present, scarcely more than the half of these remain; and, besides, the limits of the provinces have been and are continually changing.

In Africa. Egypt has been possessed for several years by Mehemet Ali, an Albanian, who, after having massacred or expelled the Mameluke Beys, who so long domineered over the country, has resisted all the open or secret attempts of his master to supplant him, and now rules the whole region of the lower Nile, and the adjoining districts of Arabia, as an independent sovereign, with a merely nominal acknowldgement of the Emperor's supremacy. He possesses, likewise, Syria, Adana, and Crete or Candia. Tripoli and Barca were possessed for more than a century by a family of hereditary Beys or Bashaws,* who were entirely independent of the Sultan; but at last, in 1835, they were restored to the empire, and the beys supplanted by the Capitan Pasha; so that Tripoli is again a province of Turkey. province of Turkey.

* This is the old English spelling of Pasha, or, as the French call it, Pacha.

KINGDOM OF HELLAS, OR GREECE.

This kingdom forms the south-eastern extremity of Europe, and is nearly peninsular, being bounded on three sides by the Archipelago and the Mediterranean Sea. Its greatest length, from north to south, is about 172 miles, and the greatest breadth of its continental portion about 150; comprising an area of about 14,000 square geographical miles. It comprises the ancient Peloponnesus or Morea; the Turkish province of Livadia, and part of those of Carlilli and Lepanto, or Eastern and Western Hellas; Eubea, or Negropont; the Cyclades, and a part of the Sporades.

The kingdom is divided into 10 nomos or shires, which are subdivided into 46 eparchies. The following table contains the names of the nomos, and their chief towns; of which those in Italics are also the chief towns of the eparchies.

ASIA.

ASIA is situate entirely in the Northern Hemisphere, between 1° and 77° N. lat., and 26° ASIA is situate entirely in the Northern Hemisphere, between 1° and 77° N. lat., and 26° and 170° E. long.; and forms one continuous mass of land, the greatest length of which, from Suez to Behring's Strait, is about 7370 geographical miles; and the breadth from Cape Comorin, in India, to Cape Taimura, in Siberia, about 4320. The superficial area is estimated at upwards of 12,000,000 square geographical, or 16,000,000 square English, miles. Asia is bounded on the north by the Arctic Ocean; on the east and south-east, by the Pacific; on the south, by the Indian Ocean; and on the west, by the Ourals, Caspian Sea, Caucasus, Black Sea, Archipelago, Mediterranean Sea, Isthmus of Suez, and Red Sea.

We intended, in compliance with the usual practice, to give a political and statistical table of Asia; but we have not been able to find materials for constructing it, and we are inclined to believe that none exist. We have, therefore, deemed it better to omit it than to impose upon our readers.

We have, therefore, deemed it better to omit it than to impose upon our readers with a formal arrangement of figures, which would have presented nothing but a mass of conjectures, without the least approximation to accuracy. We shall merely give the names and a brief outline of the political divisions.

TURKESTAN, possessed by numerous independent khans, the principal of whom are the khans of Bokhara, Khiva, Kokand, &c. Chief towns: Bokhara, Khiva, Samarkand, Khojand, Tashkend, Balkh.

AFGHANISTAN, possessed by the tribes of Afghans, who were lately subject to the kingdom of Cabul, which has been recently restored by the British government, in the person of Shah Shuja, or Sooja-ul-Mulk, the dethroned king, who had been resident for many years at Loodheeana, as a pensioner of the East India Company. Chief towns: Cabul, Candahar, Ghizni, Peshawar. Herat and a small adjoining district form an independent kingdom.

THE PRINCIPALITIES.

WALLACHIA and MOLDAVIA extend along the north side of the Danube, from the Pruth to the borders of Hungary and Transylvania; the former containing an area of 21,600 square the borders of Hungary and Transylvania; the former containing an area of 21,600 square geographical miles, with a population of less than 1,000,000; the latter an area of 11,600 miles, with a population of about 450,000. These countries were formerly provinces of the Turkish Empire, governed by princes called Hospodars, who were chosen by the Sultan from among the Greeks of Constantinople, and invested with regal authority—the attainment of the office being dependent upon the price offered for it. By the treaty of Buckharest, in 1812, the Czar acquired the right of interfering in matters connected with the religion of the people; and by the treaty of Adrianople, in 1829, this power of interference was so greatly extended, that they may now be considered as virtually provinces of Russia. To the Sultan, indeed, they still pay a small annual tribute, as an acknowledgment of his sovereignty; and he continues to appoint the Hospodar, selecting him from a list presented by the boyars (nobles,) a class who are completely subject to the domineering influence of Russia. The Hospodar, when once elected, holds his office for life. The government, however, is of the worst possible kind; every thing is in the most wretched disorder; and the people are divided into the two classes of tyrants and slaves.

Servia is a small province of about 9000 square geographical miles, with a population of about 380,000. In the early part of the present century it was governed by Czerni Georges, a native, who had served in the Austrian army, and who, enraged at the atrocities committed on his countrymen by the Turks, had rebelled, and expelled them. The Sultan, deeming it hopeless his countrymen by the Turks, had rebelled, and expelled them. The Sultan, deeming it hopeless to recover the absolute dominion of the province, resolved to resign it to a native governor, who should have the entire management of the internal administration, on payment of a certain tribute; while the fortresses should be garrisoned by Turks, and the external relations remain under the Imperial control. Georges being dead before this arrangement took place, Milotsch Obrenovich, a person who had risen to distinction during the troubles, was chosen Prince, and the dignity was guaranteed to him and his heirs by Turkey and Russia. Though Semendria has been considered the capital of the principality, yet that town, it seems, now scarcely exists; and the actual seat of government is sometimes at *Kragojevacz*, and sometimes at *Belgrade*.

UNITED STATES OF THE IONIAN ISLANDS.

THESE States consist of the islands of Corfu, Paxo, Antipaxo, Fano, Santa Maura, Theaki, Cephalonia, Zante, Cerigo, and Cerigotto, with several other islets and rocks, lying along the western and southern coasts of Turkey and Greece. They were formerly a portion of the foreign possessions of Venice; but, after the downfall of that ancient republic, they came into the possession of the French, who were, in turn, expelled by the British; and by the peace of Paris, in 1814, the Ionian Islands were left in possession of the latter. They form a sort of Republic, or rather what has been called a Constitutional Monarchy, the supreme authority being vested in a Senate, and a Lord High Commissioner, appointed by the Queen of Great Britain, and representing her as Sovereign. The fortresses are garrisoned by British troops; and the city of Corfu, in the island of that name, is the seat of government. island of that name, is the seat of government.

INDIA.

INDIA, is situate in the Northern Hemisphere, between 7° 57' and 35° N. lat., and between 66° 58' and 95° E. long., measuring 1870 English miles in its greatest length from north to south, and nearly as much in its greatest breadth, in lat. 26° north, from the western border of Sinde to the eastern border of Assam. The natural boundaries of India are clearly defined. On the north it is bounded by the long range of the Himalayas; on the south by the Indian Ocean; on the east and south-east by the range of mountains which separates Assam and Arracan from the Birman Empire, and terminates at Cape Negrais; and on the west by the Suleiman mountains, which extend from the Suffeid Kho, near Cabool, to Ras Moaree, and are connected, at their northern extremity with the protruding spurs of the Himalayas. The whole country within these extensive limits is, with partial exceptions, either directly governed by the British East India Company, or more or less connected with it as tributary or allied. The superficial area exceeds 1,200,000 square miles.

India has never formed one empire, and has therefore not been subjected to any general system of administrative divisions. Different parts of the country, however, have obtained certain popular and geographical names, which are of frequent occurrence, and must therefore be mentioned as a necessary illustration of the geography of the country. 1. The mountainous region between the Sub-Himalayas and the great chain, has been called NORTHERN INDIA, and the British portion is known familiarly as and the great chain, has been called Northern India, and the British portion is known familiarly as The Hills. Northern India comprises the beautiful valley of Cashmere, drained by the River Jylum; the districts of Kunnawar, Gurwal, Kumaoon; the kingdom of Nepaul; the territory of Sikim; and Bootan, or the country of the Deb Rajah. 2. The Punjab or Punjaub, (the country of the Five waters,) is the region watered by the Indus and its great tributaries, the Jylum, Chenab, Ravee, Gurrah, Beeas, and Sutlege. It is divided into two portions by the Salt Range, a chain of hills extending across the bed of the Indus, and forming a table-land of considerable elevation on its northern side. 3. Rajpootana, called also Rajwara and Rajahstan, (the country of the Rajpoots,) occupies the middle space between the Indus and the Ganges, on both sides of the Aravulli mountains, and extends southwards to the Runn. 4. Hindoostan is the popular name of the whole country which extends from the Hills, the Punjaub, and Rajwara, to the frontiers of Bengal, and comprises the Mogul subahs or provinces of Delhi, Agra, Allahabad, Oude, and Bahar; and the districts or regions of Hurrianee, Rohilcund, Doab, and Bundelcund. 5. Bengal, the alluvial plain at the mouths of the Ganges and Brahmapootra, intersected in all directions by their innumerable branches. 6. Malwah, of Hurrianee, Rohilcund, Doab, and Bundelcund. 5. The Deccan, Derkhan, or Dukkhun, extending from the Nerbuddah on the north, to the Kistnah and Tumbudrah rivers on the south; comprising the old Mogul provinces of Khandeish, Berar, Aurungabad, Bejapoor or Visiapoor, Beder, Nandere, and Hydrabad. The name, however, is now generally restricted to that province of the Bombay Presidency of which Poonah is the capital, and which lies between the Ghauts and the western border of the Nizam's territories. 11. The Carnatic divided into two regions, styled respectively Payen-ghaut and Bala-ghaut, or the Lower and the Upper; the former comprehending the low maritime plains along the coast of Coromandel, from the Kistnah to Cape Comorin; the latter comprehending the elevated table-land between the Eastern and the Western Ghauts, including Mysore. 12. The political divisions of India may be arranged into eight classes:—1. Territories directly subject to the officers of the British East India Company; 2. Princes, with whom the British government have treaties of alliance, offensive and defensive, who have a right on their part to claim protection, external and internal, from the British government, and grant to the latter the right of interference in their internal affairs; 3. Princes with whom the British government have treaties of alliance, offensive and defensive, but without the right of internal interference, except when required by the princes themselves; 4. Princes mostly tributary, who acknowledge the supremacy of the British government, and are bound to co-operate with them, but who are supreme rulers in their own dominions; 5. Princes, with promise of guarantee and protection from the British government, but supreme in their own dominions; 6. Princes with whom the British government have relations of amity and friendship; Princes protected by the British government, with right to the latter to control their internal affairs; 7. Independent native states; 8. Possessions of foreign powers. The following table exhibits the estimated extent and population of these various territories : -

DEPENDENCIES OF BRITISH INDIA.

CEYLON .- This magnificent island, "the gem of the eastern seas," as it has been called, is situate near the southern extremity of the Carnatic, and separated from it by the Strait of Manaar, the navigation of which is completely obstructed by Adam's Bridge, a ridge of rock and sand which extends across it. The greatest length of Ceylon is about 270 miles from north to south; the greatest breadth, across it. The greatest length of Ceylon is about 270 miles from north to south; the greatest breatth, from east to west, about 140; the superficial area about 25,000 square miles. The population, according to the census of 1836, amounted to 1,098,828 souls. The interior of the island is formed of ranges of elevated table-land and lofty mountains, while nearly all round the coast there is a broad belt of rich alluvial soil, well watered by numerous streams. Ceylon is completely under the influence of the monsoons; the north-east prevailing from November to February, and the south-west from April to September, the intervening months having variable winds or calms. The eastern side of the island is generally hot and dry, the western temperate and humid, and the climate of the southern coast is more congenial to Europeans than, perhaps, any part of the continent of India. In Ceylon, as in India, they have taken advantange of the interior highlands to form delightfully cool and invigorating retreats. Ceylon is entirely a crown colony, unnconnected with the East India Company, the governor

and officers of government being appointed directly by the sovereign of Great Britain. The revenue, in 1836, amounted to L.400,533, and the civil and military expenditure to L.325,275. For several years every thing in the island has experienced the most rapid and beneficial improvement; excellent roads, as good as the best in Britain, have been formed to facilitate communication; and Ceylon promises to be, at no distant date, one of the most splendid possessions of any crown.

PULO-PENANO,* or PINANG, (officially PRINCE OF WALES ISLAND.) is situate two miles off the western coast of the Malayan peninsula, between 5° 15′ and 5° 29′ N. lat. and 100° E. long., and forms an irregular four-sided area of 160 square miles, with a group of lofty hills in the centre. Connected with Penang there is, on the opposite mainland, a territory called Wellesley Province, extending 35 miles along the coast and four inland. The total population of the two settlements amounted, in 1828, to 60, 153.

At the southern extremity of the peninsula is the small island of Sincapore, or Singapore, containing an area of 270 square miles, where a settlement was formed in 1818, and has since risen to a considerable degree of importance as an entrepot for the trade of the eastern islands. The provinces of Martaban, Re or Ye, Tavor, and Mergul, to the south-east of the Birman Empire, were acquired from the Birmans in 1826, and comprise an area of about 32,800 square miles, with a very scanty population, scarcely exceeding 50,000 souls. The principal town is Moulmein, Maulmain, Moelmin, or Maulamyaing, a very thriving settlement on the south or left bank of the Saluen River, opposite Martaban, the frontier town of Birmah.

Penang, Malacca, Sincapore, and the Birman provinces, are political dependencies of the Government of British India.

The word Pulo, prefixed to this and many other names in the East Indian Archipelago, is the consistand. Pulo-Penang, in particular, means "Betel-nut Island," the Malays conceiving its form to bear that vegetable production.

AFRICA.

Africa is situate in both the Northern and Southern Hemispheres, between 37° 20' north, and 34° 50' south latitude; and between 51° 22' east, and 17° 32' west longitude. The greatest length from Cape Serrat, in Tunis, to Cape Lagulhas, its southern extremity, exceeds 5000 English miles; and its greatest breadth, from Cape Verde to Cape Gardafui, is about 4800. The superficial area amounts to 8,902,000 square geographical, or nearly 12,000,000 of square

Africa is usually divided by geographers into two great sections, called North Africa and South Africa, separated by the Equator, or rather, perhaps, by a line drawn obliquely from Cape Gardafui to Biafra. North Africa comprehends two great regions, which may be named the Region of the Nile and Moghreb; * the former-comprising Abyssinia, Nubia, and Egypt; and the latter divided by the Arabs into four parts, viz. 1. Beled-ul-Beraber, * the country of the Berabers, or Barbary; which is subdivided into Barka, Afrikiyeh, (Tunis, and Tripoli,) Moghreb-ul-Ausat (the Middle-West, or Algiers,) and Moghreb-ul-Acksa, (the Far west, including Marcco, Fez, Tafilelt, and Sigilmessa.) 2. Beled-ul-Jerid, * (the Date-stick Country,) a long parrow tract between the Atlas mountains and the Desert; 3. Beled-es-Sahara, (the Desert Country;) and 4. Beled-es-Soudan, (the Black Country, or the Country of the Blacks. a long parrow tract between the Atlas mountains and the Desert; 3. Beled-es-Sahara, (the Desert Country;) and, 4. Beled-es-Soudan, (the Black Country, or the Country of the Blacks, called also by Europeans Nigritia or Negroland.) The last of these portions may be farther subdivided into four parts:—1. Eastern Soudan, or the basin of the Tchad, and other great lakes; 2. Western Soudan, or the basin of the Joliba-Quorra; 3. Guinea, the maritime region between the sea and the mountains of Kong; and, 4. Senegambia, the country watered by the rivers Senegal and Gambia, and their branches. None of all these divisions have any well defined boundaries, except where they border upon the sea.

South Africa comprehends Congo, Loango, Angola, and Benguela, on the west coast; Ajen, Zanguebar or Zanzibar, Mozambico, Sofala, and Caffraria or Kafferland, on the east coast; and the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, or South Africa, at the southern extremity. The whole of the interior is unknown, and none of the countries above mentioned, except the last, have definite boundaries. To these divisions may be added the islands, viz. Madagascar, Bourbon, Mauritius, Comoro, Socotra, and others, on the east coast; Madeira and Porto Santo, the Canary Islands, Cape Verd Islands, St Helena, Ascension, Fernando-po, Principé, St Thomas, and Annobon, on the west.

AMERICA.

THE continent of America extends from the 54th degree of south latitude to the 71st degree of north latitude; its extreme length, from the Straits of Magellan to Behring Straits, being 10,500 English miles. Beyond these limits, the islands of Tierra del Fuego extend one degree farther south; and, on the North-east, Greenland and the Arctic Islands, have been traced to 78° of latitude. The extent of the continent, and the islands connected with it, is estimated as

NORTH AMERICA.

NORTH AMERICA lies between 8° and 72° north latitude, and 55° and 168° west longitude. The greater part of it forms a compact mass, but the outline of its coasts is exceedingly irregular, and nearly one-third of its entire length consists of a long narrow tract between the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans. The longest straight line which can be drawn overland, extends from Cape Lisburn, in Russian America, to Cape Florida, a distance of 4260 miles; but the length of a somewhat winding line, stretching from the Isthmus of Panama, to the Arctic Ocean, west of Mackenzie's river, falls little short of 5900. Its greatest breadth, between 62° and 54° north latitude, is nearly 3000 miles; while to the south of the 30th parallel it becomes gradually narrower, till at Panama it is not more than 30 miles across.

Although a large portion of North America is still occupied by the aboriginal tribes, and there are extensive tracks unfitted for the residence of civilized man, yet the whole continent has been, at least nominally, divided by lines of demarcation among certain European powers, and their colonists.

1. Danish America comprises Iceland, Greenland, and the islands of Santa Cruz, St

Thomas, and St John, in the West Indies. Thomas, and St John, in the West Indies.

2. Russian America consists of the north-western peninsula, with a strip of coast reaching to the most southerly point of Prince of Wales' Island. The only establishments, however, besides the capital, within this vast territory, are a few factories and forts of the Russian American Fur Company. The capital is New Arkhangel, on Sitka Island, a town with 10,000 inhabitants. The company have also a fortified factory at Bodega, on the coast of California.

3. British America comprises all that immense region which lies between the Polar Basin and the United States; but to the westward of the Rocky Mountains the boundary is still a matter of discrete the Policy extending countward to the Columbia River, while, on the

matter of dispute, the British claim extending southward to the Columbia River, while, on the contrary, the United States extend their claims northward to the Russian border on the seacoast. The British territory is divided into Hudson's Bay and North-western territory, Labrador, Upper Canada, Lower Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and the islands of Newfoundland, Cape Breton, Prince Edward, Anticosti, Bermudas, and Bahamas; several West India Islands, and Honduras in Central America.

4. The United States of North America * occupy the middle region of the continent, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

5. The Republic of Texas comprises the north-eastern portion of the Mexican territory, but its limits are still undefined.

6. The Republic of Mexico occupies the peninsular region south-west of Texas and the

United States. 7. The Republic of Guatemala, or United States of Central America, occupies the long narrow tract between the Caribbean Sea and the Pacific Ocean. The greater part of the territory is yet a wilderness.

8. The Republic of Hayti, comprising the island formerly named Hispaniola and San-Domingo.

9. Spanish America, now consisting only of the islands of Cuba and Porto Rico.

10. French North America comprehends the islands of St Pierre and Miquelon in the Gulf of St Lawrence, and Guadalupe and Martinique, with their dependencies in the West Indies. 11. Dutch North America comprehends the islands of St Eustatius, and Saba, and part of St Martin in the West Indies.

12. Swedish America, which is limited to the small island of St Bartholomew in the West

UNITED STATES OF NORTH AMERICA.

Or the territory belonging to this great confederacy, little more than one-half is comprised within the limits of the organized States and territories; the remainder being still occupied by the aboriginal tribes, or the straggling pioneers of civilization. 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BRITISH AMERICA.

THE British dominions in North America are divided into the five provinces of Lower Canada, Upper Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward's Island, and Newfoundland; besides the Hudson's Bay and north-west territory, and the Bermudas or Somers' Islands, in the Atlantic Ocean. To each of these provinces a constitution has been granted, founded on that of the mother country; and each has a governor, or lieutenant-governor, a legislative council appointed by the Crown, and a house of commons or representatives chosen by

TEXAS.*

This new state is situate on the north-west side of the Gulf of Mexico, but its western and southern boundaries are still undefined. It has been formed by a number of citizens of the United States, who obtained grants of land in the province of Texas from the Mexican government, and, in 1835, declared themselves independent. The Mexicans endeavoured to crush ment, and, in 1835, declared themselves independent. The Mexicans endeavoured to crush the rebellion, but the settlers having been joined by a great number of volunteers from all parts of the States, defeated the Mexican army, which was led against them by General Santa-Anna, the President of the Republic, and took the leader prisoner. On the 17th of March, 1836, a convention of delegates unanimously adopted a constitution, which, in its general principles, closely resembles that of the United States; and the first congress held its first session at Houston, the seat of government, on the 1st of October, 1836. The executive authority is vested in a chief magistrate, styled the President of the Republic of Texas, and the first president chosen was General Samuel Houston, the successful leader of the revolt.

WEST INDIES.

THESE islands are divided into four principal groups, as follows :-

1. The GREATER ANTILLES, Cuba, Hayti, Jamaica, Porto-Rico.

2. The Caribre Islands, consisting of Tobago, and all the islands between it and Porto-Rico; subdivided into, 1. The Leeward Islands, consisting of Dominica, and all the islands to the north of it; and, 2. The Windward Islands, consisting of Martinique, with the islands which lie to the south of it. St Thomas, St John, Santa Cruz, Tortola, Virgin-Gorda, and their dependencies, are also called the Virgin Islands.

3. The Bahamas, or Lucayos, consisting of all the low islands to the north of Cuba.

4. The Smaller Antilles, consisting of the islands along the coast of South America, viz. Trinidad, Margarita, Tortuga, Salada, Orchilla, Buen-Aire, Curaçoa, and Oruba.

MEXICO.

THE REPUBLIC OF MEXICO was divided, by the constitution of 1824, into 19 States, 4 Territories, and the Federal District; but a decree of 1835 provided for a new division of the country into departments. Before the declaration of independence, February 24, 1821, Mexico or New Spain, was a viceroyalty of Spain, and was divided into 12 intendencies and 3 provinces, and now contains a population of about 7,687,000.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

This country, which was formerly a province of Spain, and styled the Captain-General-ship of Guatemala, was declared independent by the people on the 15th of December, 1821, and was incorporated with Mexico; but on the fall of Iturbide, it disconnected itself from Mexico, and was formed into a separate independent republic November 22, 1824, under the title of Federal Republic of Central America; and the government was organized in April, 1825. It comprises 5 States, with a population of about 2,000,000.

SOUTH AMERICA.

This extensive continent is a peninsula, connected with North America by the narrow isthmus of Panama or Darien, which in one part is only thirty miles across, and not more than 633 feet above the level of the Pacific Ocean. The greatest length of the peninsula from north to south is 4550 miles, and its greatest breadth 3200. It covers an area of 6,500,000 square miles, about three-fourths of which lie between the tropics, and the other fourth within the southern temperate zone.

DIVISIONS.—New Granada, Venezuela, Equador, or Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, or Upper Peru, Chili, the Argentine Republic, or United States of Rio de la Plata, Paraguay, Uruguay, Brazil, Guyana, Patagonia, and the Archipelago of Tierra del Fuego.

Soon after the invasion of Spain by the French in 1808, a revolutionary spirit began to manifest itself in the Spanish colonies; and, before long, all these colonies, one after another, declared themselves independent, and formed republican constitutions, most of which were modelled, in a great measure, upon the constitution of the United States. The people, however, were little accustomed to free institutions, and were ill prepared, by character, education, and habits, to sustain a republican government; and their condition, since the declarations of independence, has been, for the most part, a state of revolution, disorder, and misrule. OCEANIA.

THE islands to the south-east of Asia have been usually considered as appendages of that continent; but they are now classed by the Continental geographers along with the islands of the Pacific Ocean, as a fifth division of the World, under the name of Oceania or Oceanica. Oceania is divided into Western Oceania, or Malaysia; Central Oceania, or Australasia; and Eastern Oceania, or Polynesia.

MALAYSIA.

This division derives its name from the Malays, a peculiar variety of the human race, to which the principal, if not the dominant people of the Archipelago belong; and is subdivided into the following groups, viz. :-

1. The Sumatran group, comprising Sumatra, Banca, Billiton, Lingan, Panjour, and other islands on the east and west coasts of Sumatra.

2. The Javan group, comprising Java, Madura, Bali, Lombock, &c.
3. The Sumbava-Timor group, comprising Sumbava, Flores, Solor, Sabrao, Lomblem, Panter, Ombay, Timor, Simao, Rotti, Dao, Savou, Sumba, or Sandelwood, &c.

4. The Moluccas, comprising Amboyna, Ceram, Booro, Goram, Banda, Lonthe

portions of Celebes; part of Timor, belong either mediately or immediately to the King of Holland, whose Governor-General resides at the city of BATAVIA, in Java. The Portuguese possess a part of Timor. The Spaniards possess portions of Luçon, Mindinao, and others of the Philippines; and their capital is the city of Manilla, in Luçon. The rest of Malaysia is possessed by numerous independent princes and tribes. The dominant people are chiefly of the tawny or brown variety of mankind; but several of the smaller islands, the interior of Borneo and Sumatra, and all Australasia, except new Zealand, are occupied by people of the Ethiopic of Negro race. Ethiopic or Negro race.

AUSTRALIA is now, in Britain at least, the generally received name of the large island formerly called New Holland, which contains a superficial area of more than 3,000,000 of square miles. Within the last half century, various British colonies, distinguished by the names of New South Wales, and Australia Felix, South Australia, and Western Australia, have been

planted on its shores.

New South Wales was discovered by Cook, who sailed along the whole coast, from Cape Howe to Cape York, in the year 1770. In January, 1788, a convict settlement was established at Port Jackson; but for many years the progress of discovery and improvement was very slow. It was only in 1813, that the first passage across the Blue Mountains, a range which runs parallel to the coast, was effected; but since that time, colonists have flocked to the settlement, and its progress has been unusually rapid. According to a census taken in September, 1836, the population amounted to 77,096, as stated in the following Table; and the number of sheep exceeds /1,000,000.

AUSTRALASIA.

POLYNESIA,

Or the "Many Islands," is the name given to the innumerable islands scattered over the Pacific Ocean to the south of the 40° of north latitude, and west of the 108° meridian west. Many of them are arranged in groups or clusters, while others occur at solitary distances.

They even publish a newspaper under the title of Kumu Hawaii, or Hawaiian Monitor.





The southern part of the island was discovered in 1642, by Abel Tasman, a Dutchman, who gave it its present name in honour of Anthony Van Dieman, the Governor-General of the Dutch East Indies. Its insularity was proved by Messrs Bass and Flinders, who sailed round it in 1799. A small penal settlement for convicts was established in 1803; and early in 1804, Governor Collins arrived in the right Department of the last Indies. in the river Derwent, took formal possession of the country, and founded Hobart Town, now the capital of the island. The population at 31st December, 1836, amounted to 43,895, viz. free males, 15,593; free females, 10,851; male convicts, 15,590; female convicts, 2071.

Norfolk Island, 900 miles E.N.E. of Sydney, is a penal settlement reserved exclusively for convicts.





The insular position of the country, and the lofty mountains which intersect it, insure a perpetual supply of moisture, and hence the country abounds in beautiful forests. The climate is one of the finest and most equable in the world; and, indeed, no other country possesses so many requisites for becoming a more country possesses so many the finest and most equable in the world; and, indeed, no other country possesses so many requisites for becoming a great commercial and naval power. The natives are sub-divided into very small communities or families, without any individual who possesses the slightest political authority, and are excessively jealous of each other. They are thus likely to become an easy prey to the European colonists, who are intruding themselves upon them; and it is not unlikely that this, the finest of the Polynesian races, may ere long become extinct, or at best, the hewers of wood and the drawers of water to their powerful invaders. These islands were discovered in 1642, by Abel Tasman, a Dutch navigator, who bestowed upon them their present barbarous name, in honour of the province of Zealand, in Holland. They were more fully explored by Cook, whose name is attached to the strait which he discovered between the two great islands.
