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EPOCHS.

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ECLIPSES.

In the year 1851 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 17, invisible at Montreal. The meantime of opposition in Right Ascension will be at 3 minutes past noon. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter, = 1) 0.465 on the Northern Limb.

II.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, February 1, invisible at Montreal. Meantime of conjunction in Right Ascension will be at 46 minutes past 12 in the morning. This Eclipse will be visible from Australia, the Cape of Good Hope, and the Southern Ocean.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 13, visible at Montreal, as follows :—

Explanations of Weather Table.

It will be seen from the table, 1st. That the nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter, is to *Midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following; the space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—That the nearer to *Mid-day*, or *Noon*, these phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the next seven days; the space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to summer, though they affect spring and autumn to a considerable extent.

3.—That the Moon's Change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, *i. e.* from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as it is noted in the table.

Though the weather is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring; yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

WEATHER TABLE.

The following Table (ascribed to Dr. HERSCHEL, and revised by Dr. ADAM CLARKE, constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years actual observation, furnishes the observer, without farther trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail.

United States, via Laprairie and St. Johns, &c.—Ar-
rive every day, except Monday; depart every day,
except Sunday, at Noon.

United Kingdom—The Mails for England are forward-
ed by Steamships which leave New York and Bos-
ton alternately, every Wednesday, until the 27th
December. From the 27th December, till the 16th
May, they leave fortnightly, on every alternate
Wednesday.

Regulations and Rates.

All letters sent by post in Canada and other Provinces of British N. America, are charged by weight. The scale of weight for charging postage is the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom are charged, viz. :—

For a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.....1 Rate
Ditto ditto 1 ounce.....2 Rates
Ditto ditto 2 ounces.....4 Rates
Ditto ditto 3 ounces.....6 Rates

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed; thus, if a letter exceed one ounce, it becomes liable to four rates, and if it exceed two ounces, six rates.

The Rates of Postage on Letters are—For a Letter not exceeding half an ounce, (without regard to the number of pieces of which it is composed)

Conveyed 60 miles or under.....0s. 4½d. Cy.
Ditto 60 miles to 100 miles...0 7
Ditto 100 miles to 200 miles....0 9
Ditto 200 miles to 300 miles...0 11½
Ditto 300 miles to 400 miles....1 1½
Ditto 400 miles to 500 miles....1 4

And so on. Letters re-directed are rated afresh for the further distance.

Between the Province and the United Kingdom, a uniform charge of 1s. 2d. sterling, or 1s. 4d. currency per half ounce. English letters re-directed, 2½d. currency additional per half ounce.

Letters may be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

The Inland Postage, on all Letters, Papers, &c., for the U. States, must be pre-paid, otherwise they will not be forwarded, but sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Newspapers.

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding two ounces, to or from any part of the British North American Provinces, pay one half-penny, pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom) or to any foreign country, except the United States, one half-penny, to be pre-paid.

If sent to any part of the United States—one penny—to be pre-paid.

Newspapers from the United States pay, on delivery, one penny Provincial, in addition to the United States postage.

United States Newspapers if re-posted in Canada, are liable to letter rates of postage.

Newspapers from or to the United Kingdom, sent by closed Mails through the United States, are liable to a postage of one penny each—payable on delivery.

With exception of these last, (which are not limited as to weight) a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed two ounces, otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage,—i. e. one penny per ounce.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half-penny postage.

Supplements charged as distinct newspapers.

Votes and Proceedings in Parliament.

If sent to the United Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the United Kingdom by private ship,—double the above rates.

No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings, permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

Pamphlets and other Publications.

If printed in the United Kingdom, British N. America or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce, in addition to sea postage, provided they do not exceed sixteen ounces.

Pamphlets mailed to any part of the United Kingdom are subject to letter postage.

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate, one penny per ounce; but if re-posted in Canada, they are charged with full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications, and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

EXEMPTIONS.

Arms, Clothing, Cattle, Provisions and Stores of every description, which any Commissary or Commissaries, Contractor or Contractors shall import or bring, or which may be imported or brought by the Principal

or other Officer or Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province; provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Donations of Clothing specially imported for the use of or to be distributed gratuitously by any Charitable Society in this Province.

Seeds of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry, when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of agriculture.

Salt for the use of the Fisheries, and Wine for the use of Regimental Messes.

The following articles in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein, viz.:

Wearing Apparel in actual use, and other personal effects not Merchandise; Horses and Cattle; Implements and Tools of Trade of handymen.

The personal Household Effects, not Merchandise, of inhabitants of this Province, being subjects of Her Majesty, and dying abroad.

And the following articles when imported directly from the United Kingdom, and being the growth, produce or manufacture of the said United Kingdom, viz.:

Animals, Beef, Pork, Biscuit, Bread, Butter, Cocoa-paste, Corn or Grain of all kinds; Flour; Fish, fresh or salted, dried or pickled; Fish Oil; Furs or Skins, the produce of fish or creatures living in the sea; Gypsum, Horns, Meat, Poultry, Plants, Shrubs & Trees, Potatoes and Vegetables of all kinds. Seeds of all kinds, Skins, Pelts, Furs or Tails, undressed. Wood, viz., Boards, Planks, Staves, Timber and Firewood.

And the following Articles when imported direct from the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, and being the growth, produce, or manufacture of said Provinces respectively, viz:

Grain and Breadstuffs of all kinds, Vegetables, Fruits, Seeds, Hay and Straw, Hops, Animals, salted and fresh meats, Butter, Cheese, Chocolate and other preparations of Cocoa, Lard, Tallow, Hides, Horns, Wool, undressed Skins, and Furs of all kinds, Oxen of all kinds, Iron in pigs and blooms, Copper, Lead in pigs, Grindstones and Stones of all kinds; Earth, Coals, Lime, Ochres, Gypsum ground or unground; Rock-salt, Wood, Bark, Timber and Lumber of all kinds, Firewood, Ashes, Fish, Fish Oil, viz: Train Oil, Spermaceti Oil, Head matter and blubber, Fins and Skins, the produce of fish or creatures living in the sea.

Regulations regarding Chimney Sweeping.

The Tariff of Rates which Licensed Sweeps within the City of Montreal are allowed to charge, is as follows :—

For each Chimney in a one story house.....0s. 3d,

Do. do. do. two story do0 4½

Do. do. do. four or more stories...0 7½

Each chimney in use is required to be swept by licensed sweeps at least three times in the year—once between 1st May and 1st November, and twice at intervals of at least two months apart, between 1st November and 1st May,—under a penalty of 25s. to 50s. In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to the above penalty.
