This planet is always easily distinguished by his light, which, though inferior to that of Venus, is by far more brilliant than that of any other Planet or Star. SATURN will be in opposition on the 21st of June, and in conjunction on the 27th of December. Throughout the year this Planet will be a few degrees east of Jupiter, and consequently, easily distinguishable. URANUS, or HERSCHEL, will be in conjunction on the 10th of March, and in opposition on the 14th of September. MERCURY, the least of the old Planets, is but seldom seen by the naked eye, and it is not, even under favourable circumstances, seen more than two hours before the rising, or after the setting of the sun. The following will be the most favorable time for viewing this Planet in Nova-Scotia in 1841: Mercury generally appears like a red Star of the first magnitude.

MORNING AND EVENING PLANETS.

VENUS will be visible after sunset, in the West, until the 14th of May, the day of her inferior conjunction, and afterwards in the East, in the morning before sunrise, the remainder of the year. She will be most brilliant on the 7th of April, and on the 19th June; about which time, she may be seen by the naked eye, without difficulty, even amidst the brightest sunshine. Venus will be eclipsed by the Moon in forenoon of the 26th of March, and at about 3 o'clock in the morning of the 12th September; both of these occultations will probably be visible in Nova-Scotia. MARS will be in quadrature on the 9th of January, in opposition on the 17th April, and again in quadrature on the 30th of July. Mars rises on the 1st of January, about half an hour after midnight; on the 17th of April he rises at sunset, and in December he sets about 8 P. M. At the time of his opposition in April, his distance from us being less than one quarter of what it was in May, 1840. Mars will shine with great splendour, and will easily be distinguished, in the East, shortly after sunset, by his brilliant red light. JUPITER will be in opposition on the 5th June, and in conjunction on the 22d of December.— This planet is always easily distinguished by his beautiful white light, which, though inferior to that of Venus, is by far, more brilliant than that of any other Planet or Star. SATURN will be in opposition on the 21st of June, and in conjunction on the 27th of December. Throughout the year this Planet will be a few degrees east of Jupiter, and consequently, easily distinguishable. URANUS, or HERSCHEL, will be in conjunction on the 10th of March, and in opposition on the 14th of September. ECLIPSES IN 1841.

There will happen this year **SIX** Eclipses, *four* of the Sun, and *two* of the Moon, as follows, viz :

I. Friday, January 22d, a partial eclipse of the Sun, visible only in a small part of the Southern Ocean, but not in Nova-Scotia, or in any inhabited region.

II. Friday, Feby. 5th, a total eclipse of the Moon, visible in Nova-Scotia, and throughout America, Europe, Africa, &c.

Although, on this occasion, the Moon will be immersed in the shadow of the Earth for the space of 1h. 50m it is not probable that she will altogether disappear, but will remain visible, of the colour of tarnished copper. Total eclipses of the Moon have, however, (as is asserted) occurred, during which she became quite invisible.

III. Sunday, Feby. 21st, a partial eclipse of the Sun, visible in the North-eastern part of North America, in Iceland, Greenland, and perhaps also in the Northern part of Scotland. At Halifax the eclipse will end a few minutes before Sunrise; the distance of the centres at Sunrise being 33', and the sum of the semi-diameter 31 $\frac{1}{4}$ '; so that in Newfoundland, and probably in Cape-Breton, a small part of the end of the eclipse will be visible.

IV. Sunday, July 18th, a partial eclipse of the Sun, visible in the high latitudes of North America, the northern part of Europe, in Scotland, and the western part of Asia, but not in Nova-Scotia.

V. Monday, August 2d, a total eclipse of the Moon, partly visible in Nova-Scotia, New Brunswick, &c. as follows, viz :

At Halifax, Sydney, C. B., Windsor, Charlotte Town, P. E. I. &c. it appears that the Moon will set a few minutes before the beginning of the total Eclipse, and at St. John and Fredericton, N. B. she will set totally immersed in the shadow of the Earth.—No part of this Eclipse will be visible in Europe or Africa.

VI. Monday, August 16th, a partial Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Nova-Scotia, and visible only in the Great Southern Ocean.

OCCULTATIONS.

The most important Occultations probably visible in Nova-Scotia in 1841, are those of the Planet Venus, on the 26th of March and 12th of September—of the Pleiades on the 4th of January, 27th February, 17th June, 7th September, and 27th November; and of the following Stars of the *third* magnitude, viz: of “pi m” June 2—of “epsilon □” July 17 and October 7—and of “sigma †” on August 26.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

- Column* 1st and 2d, contain the days of the month and of the week.
 3d and 4th. The rising and setting in mean time of highest point, or of the *upper limb* of the Sun, corrected for refraction.
 5th. Days length in hours and minutes.
 6th. The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is *slow* or *fast* of the clock), at noon, *apparent* time (not mean) at Greenwich, or at a quarter before eight in the morning at Halifax.
 7th. The Sun's Declination.
 8th. The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and her rising from Full to New Moon.
 9th. The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.
 10th. Contains the time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian.
 11th. Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.
 The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun.
 The *Farmer's Calendar* is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

1. Contains the days of the month.
2. Sundays, Phenomena, Anniversaries, &c.

of that which immediately precedes the southing of the Moon. These four columns being computed on the supposition, that the time of High-water on the days of New and Full Moon, (*L'establissement du port*) is at Halifax, 7h. 15m.—at Annapolis, 10h. 45m.—at Charlotte Town, 10h. 15m.—and at Windsor and St. John, N. B. 11h. 45m. The tides of February 6, March 7, August 16, and September 16, will be the highest of all this year, uninfluenced by wind. And in like manner the tides of January 22, May 5, June 3, July 3, August 2, and December 12, will be very low for spring tides.

The time of High Water at the following places may be found by adding or subtracting the hours opposite each respectively, to, or from, that at Halifax.

* * It will be particularly noticed that all the calculations in this Almanack have been adapted to *mean* solar time; a mode of computation which has recently come into very general use, and which will probably soon entirely supersede the old mode of reckoning, as a clock regulated to *apparent* solar time, must, in consequence of the inequality of the solar days, be frequently adjusted. To those persons, however, who may prefer to use *apparent* time, the calculations will be equally useful, as *mean* time is easily converted into *apparent* by subtracting the quantity in the *sixth* column of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is slow of clock, and adding it when fast of clock.—Thus, on 1st February the Sun rises in mean time at 7h. 19m. and sets at 5h. 9m. from which (if we subtract 14m. the quantity by which the Sun is that day too slow,) we obtain 7h. 5m. and 4h. 55m. the apparent time.

The rising and setting of the ☉'s upper limb having been computed with great care, will afford a very easy method to those who may have a good horizon to the east or west, of determining time within one or two minutes, and thus to draw a meridian line. In the months of March and September, a difference of one degree in the latitude of the observer, and of Halifax, will not cause any sensible change in the time of the Sun's

rising or setting; but in June and December it will cause a difference of about *four* minutes, which should not be neglected when accuracy is desired. For example—suppose that at a place one degree *north* of Halifax, and not much elevated above the sea, the Sun's *upper limb* on the 20th of June should be observed to rise out of the Ocean, by a clock, at 4h. 12m.; what is the error of the clock, and at what time by the clock must a meridian or noon mark, be drawn on that day—the Sun being slow *one* minute? By the Almanack it appears that the Sun's upper limb rises at Halifax on the 20th June at 4h. 14m. and consequently, at the place in question, at 4h. 10m. The clock therefore is *two* minutes fast of *mean* and *three* minutes fast of apparent time, and consequently the meridian mark must be drawn at *three* minutes after 12. Had the place in question been one degree *south* of Halifax, the clock would be *six* minutes slow of mean, and *five* slow of apparent time, and the meridian mark must be drawn at *five* minutes *before* 12. At Halifax the clock would be *two* minutes slow of mean, and *one* minute slow of apparent time, and the meridian mark must be drawn at *one* minute *before* 12.

EXPLANATION OF TERMS.

APHELION, is that part of a planet's orbit furthest from the sun.
APOGEE. the moon is said to be in Apogee when furthest from the Earth.

DECLINATION, is the distance of a heavenly body from the equinoxial line.

ECLIPTIC, is the plane of the Earth's orbit extended to the starry sphere; or the annual path which the sun apparently describes among the stars.

ELONGATION of a planet, is its distance from the Sun, as seen from the Earth.

EQUINOXIAL, or **EQUINOXIAL LINE**, is an imaginary line, or circle of the heavens corresponding with the Equator of the Earth.

EQUINOX. (See Right Ascension.)

NODES are those points in the orbits of the moon or planets which intersect the plane of the ecliptic.

PERIHELION is that part of a planets orbit nearest the Sun.

PERIGEE. The moon is said to be in perigee when nearest the Earth.

RIGHT ASCENSION is the distance, eastward, reckoned on the equinoxial from the first point of Aries; and is generally estimated in time: fifteen degrees of the arc being equal to one minute of time, and so on. The Zero point, or first of Aries, is called the Equinox.

to your cattle before the spring opens—prepare plenty of fencing stuff—cut scions for grafting. A farmer never should depend on his neighbour for what he can, by care and good management, produce on his own farm—nor be so immersed in political matters, as to forget to sow his wheat, dig his potatoes, and bank up his cellar. In order not to be behind your work, write down the duties, and plan out all the work for every month this year, which will facilitate all the work, and the business of the farm will go on nicely. This month must be devoted to sorting out the fruit and the potatoes; let your men learn to use proper economy in feeding, by giving little hay at a time, but often; let your cattle be as comfortable as yourself, if you wish them to thrive; see that the pigs have warm food three times a day—it is a good rule to use the small potatoes first, and after they are gone, use the larger sort. Most of our old farms have been worn out, or greatly impoverished, by bad management; and many of them are in the process of expensive renovation. As prevention is cheaper than cure, those who are upon new farms should be admonished not to “kill the goose which lays the golden egg.”

to learn that the man who burns green wood has not mastered the A B C of domestic economy. A farmer should never allow windows to be filled with red cloaks, tattered coats, and old hats; if he does, he will most assuredly acquire the reputation of a man who tarries long at the tavern, leaving his wife and children to freeze or starve, or both, at home. There are three things of which the man who aims at the character of a prosperous farmer will never be niggardly—manure, tillage, and seed; and there are three things of which he will never be too liberal—promises, time, and credit. Pigs that come in March, and are intended to be killed in December, should be well fed from the time of weaning, and have a run in good clover where there is plenty of water—and as soon as the harvesting of potatoes commences should be confined and fed with boiled potatoes, with a few pumpkins, beets, or carrots—grain or roots, for fattening neat stock or swine, will go about a third further if steamed or boiled, than if used raw.

Farmer's Calendar.—If you have not finished sowing your spring grain, delay it no longer : In planting Indian corn, never drop it on much depth of strong manure ; if you have the means of dressing it bountifully in hill, spread the dressing when the seed is dropped. On dry ground, furrow deep, five or six inches at least ; and when the corn is covered, raise the hill even with, or a little above the surface of the ground. Plant more peas, potatoes, &c. ther by many ties. We are bound by duty, and we are prompted by interest, to give mutual assistance, and to perform friendly offices to each other. But those friendly offices are performed to the most advantage, when we avoid to interfere, unnecessarily, in the concerns of our neighbour. Every man has his own part to act, his own interest to consult, affairs of his own to manage, which his neighbour has no call to scrutinize. The Swedish turnip, or ruta бага, has a manifest advantage over all other varieties of turnips, as cattle food, being the most nutritive in their properties, and retaining their soundness and richness much the longest—and it possesses one quality not known, in any other root—that of increasing its nutritious matter with increase of size—the largest roots being specifically heaviest and richest. Carrots are found to be valuable for feeding not only swine, but horses and cattle, and for fattening them—they are easily cultivated, and so hardy that they may be raised in the fields—they should be confined to light soils only, and ploughed very deep.

months in the year this is the most extolled by the poets, and doubtless, the gay and the youthful find it more congenial to their taste than the sombre autumn or the frowning winter. The husbandman is always up and drest with the morning, whose dawning light, at the same instant of time, breaks over all the fields, and chases away the darkness from every valley. "The introduction and cultivation of green crops," says the London Farmers' Magazine, "constitutes an era in the history of agriculture, not less important, or less valuable than any of the splendid discoveries which have added so much to the value of other arts, and though somewhat, or rather supposed causes, have retarded a more extensive and easily practicable cultivation, the progress hitherto made, has doubled our agricultural produce, has afforded a better and more regular supply of food, and has added to the general comforts of every class of society." Composts, composed in part of loam or rich earth, are supposed to be better for manuring grass land than unmixed barn yard, or stable manure, because such composts are less liable to be deprived of their qualities.

of a farmer. No one here is thrown into distraction because his note has been protested; no one here is startled at the sight of a constable approaching his premises. Pity that farmer's sons should be so weak as to imagine their father's occupation degrading, and that it is unfitting their delicate hands should wield the hoe or flail! As soon as the kernel of your rye or wheat has become so hard that you cannot mash it between your thumb and finger, lose no time in cutting it. Grain cut early will yield more and whiter flour, will waste far less by shelling, and the straw will be worth more than double of that cut late. *Don't put the plough into your corn*, if you have, as you may have for a trifle, a cultivator or horse hoe—it severs the roots, which are the mouths of the plants, turns up and wastes the manure, which should always be applied to this crop.

Farmer's Calendar.—Not only clover, but all hay in which clover, or any of the succulent grasses, are constituents, should be cured in small grass cocks, not rolled, but formed of layers with the fork. The objections to the old mode of curing wholly in the sun, are, that the leaves and finer parts of grasses, dry, crumble, and are lost, ere the stems and succulent portions are fit to carry to the barn—that an intense hot sun is hurtful to the quality of the hay, that cured in the shade being always the most

fragrant and nutritious—that it is liable to be seriously injured by the dew, sudden showers, or continued rains—and that it demands more labor than the new mode. We believe it may be safely asserted, that the farmer in a course of years sustains as much loss, or is put to as much expense in procuring tools, by their decay in consequence of needless exposure, as from their actual wear on the farm. As a general rule, it may be remarked that no implement, tool or carriage, of any kind should be exposed when not in use—those not wanted in the winter should be secured from the weather during that time; and so with those not required during the summer season, as sleighs, sleds, &c.—the skilful, thrifty farmer is known by his attention to the minor points of agriculture, by his care to save, as well as to acquire.

stroy it—Who would cut down and destroy his orchard to keep from drinking cider? Away with the violence of rum and the violence of passion and folly—have *temperance* in all things. One might as well say he will have no potatoes or rye growing upon his farm, as have no orchard; for that gin and brandy, those liquids that cause so much misery, are distilled from those materials. The toil of the spring and summer is repaid, the farmer sees the travail of his soul and is satisfied with the abundance that rewards his industry. The nights begin to lengthen—the sultry evenings no longer banish sleep from the weary labourer's eyes—the winds rustle through the branches and the forest trembles and complains, apprehensive of the approaching storms which will soon strip it of its leaves. Gather seeds as they ripen; earth up celery as it advances in growth, but be careful to avoid covering the hearts of the plants—this work should be done in a dry day.

Select your seed corn in the field; take the largest, fairest and ripest ears that have the smallest cob; choosing them from the most thrifty stocks that produce two or more ears each. Gather winter apples by hand from the trees, put them directly into clean, dry casks, head them up and let them remain under the trees, or in the open air, till they are in danger of freezing. Look to your flax and turn it if necessary. Early sinks the sun behind the distant hill; and the lengthened evening, with its grave reflections and melancholy presentiments, heralds the night of winter upon the world. The husbandman hastens home with the gleanings of his fields, and prepares to abide the stern assaults of him of the icy hand and frozen breath.

must fade and die. Feed well what animals you keep—the better you feed them the more profitable they are. Drains that convey wash upon your mowing grounds, are of the utmost importance; by often changing their direction a large portion of your land may be vastly enriched. This is the most suitable time of the year for transplanting fruit trees of all kinds. The best method of preserving beets, carrots, and other garden roots, is to pack them separately in dry earth or sand in a warm cellar. Now look to your buildings, see that they are made tight and warm. Finish fall ploughing. Secure your cellars from frost. For that chilly intruder, *Jack Frost*, now begins to poke his nose through the cracks and broken panes of glass—some endeavour to prevent his entrance by stuffing in old rags: when you see such things, you may conclude that matters do not go exactly right either in or out of the house.

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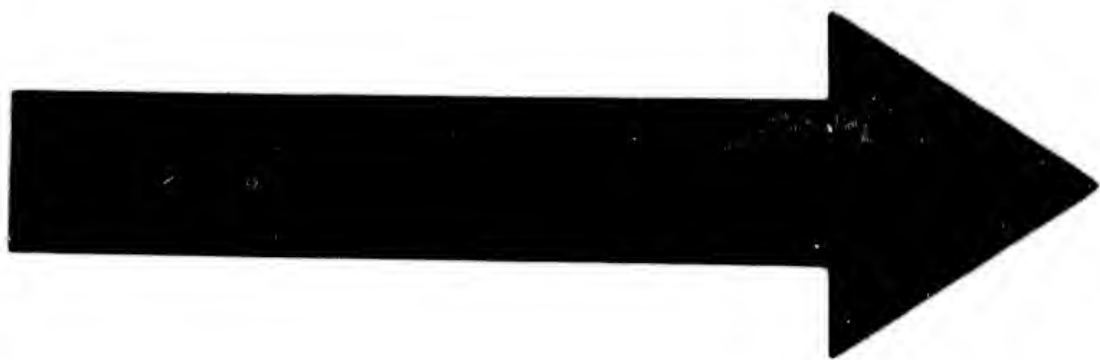
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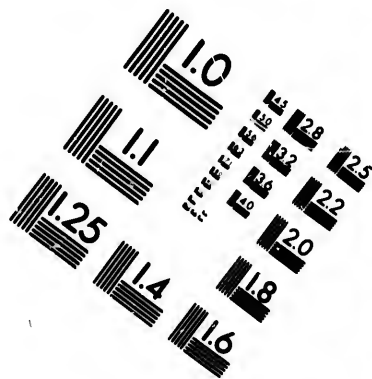
RULES FOR HOUSE-WIVES.

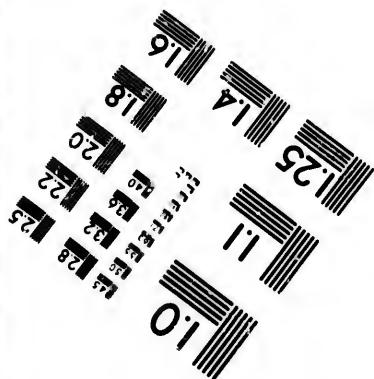
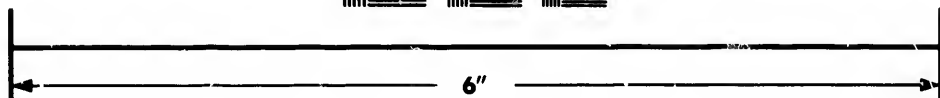
