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HE ST. LAWRENCE HALL in Montreal has for years ranked as one of the foremost hostelries in the Dominion of Canada. On the first or office floor, a new and elegant Grill Room is now in operation and is open from 7 A . M. until midnight. This is one of the best departments of its kind in Canada and a meal may be had at almost any figure.

On the second floor two new and elegant Dining Rooms have been built and the service in same is insurpassed.

## INTERESTING SHORT WALKS

West from the Hotel to Victoria Square, at the south end of which is placed a bronze statue of the late Queen Victoria (from the studio of Mr. Marshall Wood), up Beaver Hall to Dorchester Street: along Dorchester West, past Fraser Institute, Public Library, St. James' Cluiv, Mr. G. W. Stephens' Residence, St. Paul's, Canada Presbyterian Church, St. James Cathedral (fac-simile of St. Peter's at Rome, and is one third of its size. It was begun in 1870 and completed in 1900, and is the most magnificent ecclesiastical building on the American Continent). Young Men's Christian Association building,-Dominion Square west of St. James Church contains the monument of Sir John McDonald, former prime minister of Canada, and one erected to the memory of the Canadian soldiers and sailors who died during the South African War,-St. George's Episcopal Church (very fashionable church), Windsor Hotel, Amcrican Presbyterian church, to "LaCreche" Grey Nunnery on Guy Street, founded in 1692, during the reign of Louis XIV of France; up Guy Street to St. Catherine Street, the principal retail and shopping district; east on St. Catherine Street, passing such well-known dry goods establishments is Ogilvys, Scroggies, Murphys, Carsleys, Morgans, etc., Cochenthalers for souvenirs and jewelry; also Birks, the largest jewelry house in Canada, and second only to Tiffanys of New York; Christ Church Cathedral, Episcopal parish church of Montreal, a fine specimen of decorated Gothic Architecture, its spire is 211 feet high, is built entirely of stone and is the only one of its kind in Canada; past Phillips Square, with many veautfful buildings grouped about it, Art Gallery on the South side of the square is well worth a visit (incorporated in 1860 under the presidency of the late Bishop Fulford), Jenkins Art Establishment, antique mahogany and rosewood goods, St. James Methodist Church one of the largest Protestant Churches in Montreal and a magnificent building; to Bleury Street, down Bleury, south past the Church of the Gesu which is the exact counterpart of the celebrated Gesu at Rome; St. Mary's College, Roman Catholic Institution under the direction of the Jesuit Fathers; to St. James Street, turn east to Hotel. This trip can be easily done in one hour but to allow time to visit interior of places of interest allow two hours.

## WALK No. 2

St. James East past Post Office on opposite corner to hotel, to Bank of Montreal the next building, the oldest paking institution in Canada, establisher in 1817, and one of the tinst specimens of Corinthian Architectuc in America, crossing Place d'Armes Square adorned by a statue of Maisonncuve, he founder of Montreal, visit the Notre Dame Church on Notre Dame Street the style is of a composite Gothic order, its auditorium holds 15,000 people-The towers are 228 feet high. In the west tower is the bell "Le Gros Bourdon" the largest bell in America, weighing ' 4,780 pounds. Don't forget to visit the chapel, back of the main altar which is a gem of artistic architecture. Special Grand Service heid on Sundays at 10 a. m.; onl leaving Notre Dame cinurch continue east to Jacques Cartier Square and Bonsecours Market with Nelson's Monument on the square to the right and the Court House and City Hall on left. past the market square, on the right is the ancient Historic Residence Chateau de Ramesay, at present used by the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society, a visit in the interiorwill be found very interesting, we continue on Notre Dame to Bonsecours Street, turning to the right we face the Church of Bonsecours which is the oldest stone church in Montreal-Its foundation was laid in 1657, has been recently restored - the tourist should not forget to visit the chapel in the tower where is the first Organ used by the church, and some other precious relics: from the Dome the view of the Harbour with its seven miles of wharfage accommodation and magnificent specimen of granite masonry revetment wall, is splendid. While in the vicinity a visit to Bonsecours Market will repay, on Tuesdays and Fridays, it is well worth visiting, presenting as it does a unique feature of Canadian Country life-Then come up the Notre Dame Street and across the Champ de Mars where a view of the Drill Hall can be cbtained, up St. Denis past Viger Square, and Desjardins Furriers' Show Rooms where visitors are always welcome, past Laval University to St. Catherine Street, church of Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes on corner, along St. Catherine the retail shopping district, West St. Catherine to Bleury St., South Bl ury to St. James, East St. James to Hotel. This trip can be easily done in one hour but to allow time to visit interior of places of interest allow two hours.

Parties wishing to come down Lachine Rapids can leave on G. T. R. at five in the afternoon, or the Lachine electric cars at four and be back in Montreal at $6.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.

The zig zag roads to the top of Mount Royal and the view of the City and River St. Lawrence from there is something delightful; time about three hours-Price $\$ 3.00$ for one or two persons- $\$ 4.00$ for three or four persons.
