Steps the Mile in 1.39 1-5, Only a Fraction Behind the Track Record.

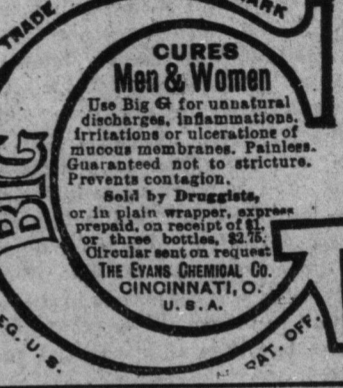

We do not need to commend the policy of the Ontario Government in the latest move of the department of lands, forests and mines. Such action commands itself.

The clearing of the land was the great obstacle in the way of settlement, the comparatively small timber, especially in the Cochrane district, being a liability rather than an asset.

At Fort Frances the benefits to the settler will be similar, altho apparently not so urgently needed as in the Cochrane district.

In this connection it is reported that negotiations are pending by which the G. T. P. Railway expects to secure running rights over the T. & N. O. Railway from North Bay to Cochrane.

But the government should provide for the protection of its settlers and manufacturers by securing an independent outlet for the products of the north country of the railway will be nullified.

Moreover, the T. & N. O. Railway must be extended to James Bay or even further up the west shore of Hudson Bay. In that case the running rights will be a valuable privilege to the G. T. P. and the G. T. P. Railway.

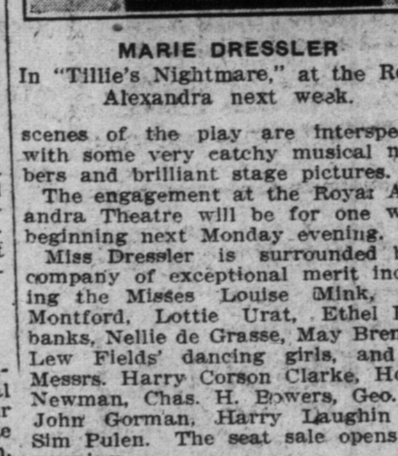

IN AN ISLAND WHERE THE FISHES CLIMB TREES

Not a Fairy Story But an Actual Fact—Wonderful Place is Called Ceram.

In far-off eastern seas there is a wonderful island, called Ceram, where the sea-beach is alive and crawls, where the trees have roots that grow out of the air, and where the fishes come out of the ocean to climb the trees of the jungle along shore, writes Rene Bache in Technical World Magazine.

This "three," says Mr. Fairchild, "grows so near the seashore that a species of climbing fish crawls up the species of tree to a distance of thirty rods, sometimes to a distance of fifty rods. When we landed on the island, there were hundreds of these fish jumping around on the sand as if climbing the roots of such trees as this, hunting for insects."

"The moving sands, with a background of trees whose roots were apparently all above ground, and which were covered by tree-climbing fish, formed the most fantastic picture that I have ever been so fortunate to look upon."

By great good luck, Mr. Fairchild's photographs came out in excellent shape. Satisfactory pictures were only obtained in the fact that the moist and miasmatic atmosphere is likely to ruin the films.

As for the fish in question, it is known to science as Perlophthalma, of the family of the gobies, and is one of the curiosities of nature. Its expanded ventral fins serve the purpose of pectoral fins—the latter being utilized as arms. The fish, of course, lives in water, but its gill openings are so small that it breathes air.
