WANTED, AN ELECTRIC RAILWAY POLICY.

When the steam railway was first introduced a great mistake was committed in allowing private corporations to become the absolute owners of the new roads that were from time to time opened up. The railway is a highway and nothing else, and it should never have been allowed to pass into absolute private control.

But the people and the Governments of the various countries at that time failed to grasp the significance of the new transportation system. As there is no monopoly in the waterway between Montreal and Toronto, so there should be no monopoly in the railway connecting the two cities.

**INOCCULATION FOR TYPHOID.**  
**KING TO BE EXTRADITED.**

The Scientific Experiment of Prof. Wright on 250 Men in an Indian Regiment.

London, Jan. 23.—Prof. Wright of the Netley Hospital inoculated at Bangalore in South India, 250 men of the 2nd West Riding Regiment against enteric or typhoid fever.

Dr. Wright is one of the very greatest living authorities on this disease. He is now in India and acting as the Plague Commissioner, and it is evident that he does not intend his special knowledge of enteric fever to be wasted.

With good cause, India is the hotbed of enteric fever. So far as the European is concerned, this disease has long been deadly than either cholera or bubonic plague.

All attempts made by the Government of India to eradicate it have so far proved futile, and not a week passes but one or more deaths are reported among the small British population of the East Indies from this cause.

It is felt that it is to be hoped, conduct a thorough enquiry into the disease while he is in the East.

**WILL MEET BRITISH DESIRES.**  
**Unless the U. S. House Interfers Too Much, Clayton-Bulwer Treaty Will be Killed.**

New York, Jan. 23.—The Commercial-Advertiser's London special (to-day says) The neutrality and abrogation provisions of the Senate's Nicaragua Canal Bill will meet British desires, official and unofficial, according to substantially recent exchanges of opinion between London and Washington. Unless the House of Representatives actually changes the provisions, the war is practically over for the Clayton-Bulwer treaty.

The family and friends were gathered, the clergyman, Rev. Mr. McNeil, was about to begin the service, when Mr. Secord passed quietly away. He had been in feeble health some time, owing to his advanced age, and since his wife's death was unable to sleep or take his accustomed rest, and prepared the family he would accompany to the grave his beloved partner, with whom he spent so many happy years. On Sunday morning, when a bad turn, the family physician was called, and he pronounced it a critical case, as his heart was weak, and prepared the family for the final result—that death might take place at any time.

Five sons and three daughters, who were all present at the bedside, came home to attend the funeral of the mother on Sunday. Today they will follow father and mother to the grave.

The deceased was in his 80th year, and was born in Grantham.

**LORD BERSFORD AT TOKYO.**  
**His Wish for Anglo-American-Japanese Alliance Res-Spoken.**

Yokohama, Jan. 23.—Rear-Admiral Lord Beresford, former commander-in-chief of the British fleet in the Pacific, has been making a tour of Chinese ports in the interest of the Associated Chamber of Commerce of the East Indies, and on his way home by way of Japan and the United States, speaking at Tokyo on Saturday afternoon at the Japanese Oriental Association, repeated his wish to see an alliance between Japan, Germany, the United States and Great Britain to protect the trade interests in China, and to combine any they based upon "spheres of influence" that a country could take.

**ANGLO-FRENCH DISPUTES.**  
 Radical Republicans Spoke in a Conciliatory Tone and Advocated Peaceful Measures.

**EX-PREMIER RIBOT WAS CRITICAL.**  
 And Intimated That There Were Other Considerations Which Had to be Taken Into Account.

Paris, Jan. 23.—In the Chamber of Deputies to-day, MM. Denis, Radical Republican, and Cochis spoke in a conciliatory strain, urging friendly negotiations for a peaceful settlement of the disputes with Great Britain.

Former Premier Ribot made a speech criticising many of Great Britain's pretensions, especially in regard to Egypt and Madagascar, but at the same time upholding the necessity of an understanding between France and Great Britain. In so doing, he pointed out that the Dreibund had been weakened by the Franco-Italian rapprochement and the Russo-Austrian entente. France only desired the peace of Europe, and to that end Frenchmen ought to forget their internal dissensions and think more of France.

**Foreign Minister Speaks.**  
 The Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, said his policy had been directed towards conserving the permanent general interests of France. He recalled the role of France during the Spanish-American war, and said the appeal addressed to France "by one of the nations which we had equally critical relations" was all to the honor of France, and the Government could not refuse its assistance, knowing "that it would not be misunderstood by our friends in America. This was a moral advantage for France, which no one failed to understand."

Referring to the Carr's dismemberment proposals, the Minister said France wholeheartedly sympathized them for two reasons—the good of humanity and respect for the nation with which her friendship was never more complete than now. France was aware that nothing would be asked of her in the nature of a concession in return. Relative to the protection of Eastern Christians, France's historic position had not been weakened by the slightest degree. Unfortunately, there was a reverse side to the picture. The great spirit of conciliation, it was in the spirit that the French Republic had been created. M. Delcasse praised General Lord Kitchener's treatment of Major Marchand, the French officer who occupied Fachoda. The honor of France had been in no way tarnished.

The Foreign Minister said in conclusion: "France is always ready to negotiate, being conscious of her rights. Great changes are preparing throughout the world, and, therefore, it is not unwise to walk unprepared. To complete our task in an organized manner, the full support of the Chambers is necessary."

The House then adjourned.

**ONTARIO CABINET AT WORK**  
 At Page Four of Estimates—Reduction in Public Works Department Meeted.

The Ontario Cabinet Council have received page 4 of the estimates, and are hard at it. It will be remembered that at the last report session a motion was introduced, subsequently withdrawn, to reduce the expenses of the Department of Public Works by \$4000. This matter is now being again discussed by the Ministers, and it is considered that changes will be made providing for this decrease in the amount. It will be several days yet before the printing contract is awarded.
