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FOUL TRAGEDY OVER A TRIFLE
AS ENACTED BY TWO FAMILIES

Boys Quarrel and Fathers Back Them Up—Miniature Battle With
Winchesters Handled by Both Sides—Another
Feud Out in Colorado.

Memphis, Tenn., July 28.—Edwin Blacklock, dead with a bullet in his head; N. P. Blalock, leg broken by a bullet; Robert Wright, sr., leg broken by a bullet; Robert Wright, jr., a fugitive from justice. Such is the not result of a desperate duel with Winchester rifles, which occurred last night south of the city, near Forest Hill Cemetery. The tragedy grew out of a dispute between Robert Wright, jr., and Edwin Blacklock.

The fathers backed the boys up, and the two families lined up with rifles on neutral ground. When within a few yards of each other, the first shot was fired. The sharp and quick resounding reports of firearms were heard by the neighbors. Almost with the first shot from the side of the Wrights, young Blacklock fell with a rifle ball thru his brain. His brother Fred picked up the rifle and took the brunt of the battle on his shoulders. Finally the elder Wright had to be carried away with a bullet in his leg, and Blacklock, injured in almost identically the same way, was carried into his house. The two young men took a few shots at each other, as they retreated each toward his own home.

Robert Wright, jr., and Edwin Blacklock, the dead boy, had a slight quarrel. Wright is said to have told it around that he had given Blacklock a black eye. The two families, on account of this little difference between the young fellows, became estranged, and last night's tragedy resulted.

Another Wild West Fight.
Friday, July 28.—Paul McWilliams, a ranchman living a few miles below town, shot and killed Saladore Perce and his son, Charles Perce. In the fight that occurred at least a dozen or more shots were exchanged, the Perces shooting McWilliams' horse from under him. The shooting is the outcome of an old feud.

Exit By Gas.
New York, July 28.—The bodies of three men, two dead and one dying, have been found in the rear room of a saloon in Brooklyn. The men slept in the room. When the door was opened, it was found that the room was full of gas. It is supposed it was accidentally turned on. One of the dead men was named Paul Butchell and the other was known only as William. Both were employed at the saloon. The identity of the third man is not known.

Three Drowned.
Tacoma, Wash., July 28.—Earl Jenkins of Seattle, Florence Nevins and Miss Anne Cole of Puyallup were drowned by the capsizing of a row boat on Spanaway Lake.

Retired Minister Dead.
Newburgh, N.Y., July 28.—Rev. James N. Shafer, retired Methodist minister, died here last night. He was 90 years old, and was the oldest clergyman in the New York M. E. Conference. He entered the ministry in 1835.

WHY IN PLAIN CLOTHES?
REFORMS IN RAILWAY TRAVEL.

General O'Grady, Italy Explains That Soldiers' Uniforms Are Shabby.
Ottawa, July 28.—Major-General O'Grady, Italy was seen this morning respecting the expressions of opinion on the subject of the order that members of the Canadian contingents serving in South Africa are to be in private clothes when the Duke of York presents to them their medals. The general said the order was the same as was issued in London on the occasion of the presentation by the King himself. It must be borne in mind that whilst some of the gallant Canadians who served so bravely in Africa had returned home in uniforms not much the worse for wear beyond the ordinary hard usage of warfare, others were not so fortunate and would not care to present themselves to the Duke before a large assemblage of the people in such habiliments. In any case the matter is one among many which may be brought before the minister with the view of considering from all points the expressions of opinion that have been published.

TREASURE FROM ALASKA.
Two Vessels Reach Vancouver, But Miners Leave No Gold Behind.

Vancouver, B.C., July 28.—The steamer Islander arrived from Skagway to-day, the first treasure ship to reach a Canadian port this season. There were six boxes of dust on board, consigned to the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Individual miners had between them \$100,000, making in all nearly a quarter of a million dollars. The steamer Islander was chartered at the same time with \$100,000 in gold dust. In suits of the man at the Government Assay Office of Canada is established here and is offering a rebate of 1 per cent. on the royalty toll miners, casting of waste gold here, the lodes of the precious metal from the Canadian coast. The steamer Islander is quick as possible with their gold. Miners interviewed said that all attempts to induce American miners to cash their gold in Canada would be unavailing. Canadian authorities now allow the gambling dens to be reopened. In Dawson, business men said the closing of gambling halls and dance halls very seriously interfered with the economy.

ASKS ENGLISH PROTECTION.
International Aspect Given to Recent Attacks on Coloradoan.

Denver, Col., July 28.—William Radcliffe, owner of the lease on the Grand Mesa Lakes, in Delta county, has been summoned to Washington for consultation with the State Department. This gives an international aspect to the recent shooting of two men by a deputy game warden, the burning of Radcliffe's hotel and the threatened lynching of Mr. Radcliffe by a mob of Delta county citizens. In Dawson, Mr. Radcliffe declares he is a subject of King Edward and has appealed to his government to protect him from the lawless return for the loss of his property.

BECAME DISCOURAGED.
Alone in New York, Without Employment, She Took a Fatal Drug.

MONEY AGREEMENT RULES

China Will be Allowed Three Years to Make First Payment on Indemnity Principal.

FREE LIST, EXCEPT CEREALS, KILLED

"Committee of Enmeshment" Composed of Heads of Foreign Banks to Receive Cash.

Washington, July 29.—Despatches received by cable from Mr. Rockhill, the United States special commissioner at Peking, set out some of the details of the financial arrangement respecting the indemnity not heretofore disclosed. He reports that the interest on the indemnity began to run on July 1 of this year, and the payments will become due semi-annually, the first to be met Jan. 1 next.

China will be allowed three years before making the first payment, on account of the principal of the indemnity. The moneys, both on account of principal and interest, will be received by a financial committee, located at Shanghai, to be known as the "Committee of Enmeshment." This will be composed of the heads of foreign banks at Shanghai, selected by the government interested in the payments. The committee is to distribute the funds turned in by the Chinese government among the various powers in proportion to the interest payments due them.

RE-OPENS THE SERVICE.

Washington, July 29.—The Postmaster-General has issued an order formally placing the American postal service in China on the same basis as before the outbreak. The order directs that the United States military postal service, established Aug. 21, 1900, be discontinued, to take effect Sept. 1, and also that the United States military station No. 1, China, upon the same date. The practical operation of the postal service has passed some time ago, and all the postal franchises have either returned here or to other ports.

THERE TO STAY.

London, July 29.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Globe cables to-day say: The assurances given by the House of Commons (July 23) by Lord Cranborne, the Under Secretary, that the French and German troops are only temporarily here, are refuted by the fact that both nationalities are erecting massive permanent barracks, which will take two years to complete, indicating that many years' occupation is contemplated.

CHURCHES FOR NEW ONTARIO.

W. B. Norton, superintendent of the Baptist Home Mission Board, will leave this afternoon for New Ontario for the purpose of selecting sites for churches in that locality. He will be accompanied by Rev. E. T. Fox, treasurer of the board, and will be away for four weeks.

Montreal, July 29.—(Special).—On the request of Capt. Hiss of the New York police force, the local detectives have arrested a man named Max Goodwin, alias Kaufman. The information received here stated that Goodwin is wanted in New York on a charge of stealing \$400 from the rooms of a man named Julius Witkoff. He was taken on a train and held in the city until Judge Choquet and was remanded, pending the arrival of officers from New York.
