CASE MUST GO TO THE JURY

Judge's Ruling in Trial of Warren Wilson, Charged With Obtaining Money by Threats.

CRIMINAL ASSIZE COURT OPENED

Ticket-of-Leave System Referred to in Address to the Grand Jury.

In the Criminal Sessions yesterday, before Judge McDougall, Warren Wilson, a farmer, living near Richmond Hill, was placed on trial on a charge of attempting to obtain money by threats from Dr. Ralph Lewis Langstaff, also of Richmond Hill.

Dr. Langstaff testified that Wilson called on him on March 17 last, ostensibly to get some medicine. The doctor handed him a bottle of some preparation to tone his system, after which Wilson said he wanted to see the physician privately.

Wilson stepped into the consultation room, and Wilson promptly demanded \$500. The doctor claims Wilson went on to accuse him of performing an operation on his wife, and other things. He denied everything, and after some conversation Wilson moderated his demands, and thought he would accept \$300.

On March 19 the doctor received a letter, which he did not answer. The letter told the doctor the writer had been thinking the matter over, and had decided to accept nothing less than \$500, and asked if he would come up on Monday.

On March 21 the doctor received another letter, which read: "Have decided to meet you at the Canadian Bank of Commerce, at the corner of Jarvis and King streets, on March 22. If you do not appear the same will be off."

The doctor forthwith consulted his lawyer, and by arrangement Wilson and the physician met at the bank, the doctor having employed County Constable McElwain to bring the proceedings.

Wilson then he might be committed to the penitentiary for a long term of years for this attempt at extortion. The doctor examined Dr. Langstaff very closely, but nothing of importance was ascertained.

The Crown's case was concluded just before the hour of adjournment, and Mr. Johnston argued that there was no case to go to the jury. His honor ruled that the trial must go on.

Evidence for the defence will be heard this morning. Criminal Assize Court. Mr. Justice MacMahon opened the fall sittings of the Criminal Assize at 10 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

There are only four cases on the list, three being charges of rape and one of attempted murder. The grand jury is composed of these gentlemen: John L. Baker, Sheriff; A. Foster, Markham; Robert Kellam, Vaughan; C. D. Warren, Toronto; Peter H. Sims, Toronto; Henry Welsh, West York; Robert Smith, Toronto; George W. High, Vaughan; William Wallace, West York; John Isaac, West Markham; A. M. Walton, Toronto; George Warwick, Toronto.

Mr. Justice MacMahon defined the law relating to the cases on the list, he spoke of the ticket-of-leave system. The wrong of the ticket-of-leave system, he said, was that it had no sanction, but only for those who are guilty of a single crime, or who show an honest desire to reform, and who ought to have the opportunity to start a fresh life.

The court then adjourned till 10 o'clock this morning. West Against Pastor. For the alleged alienation of the affections of his wife, Rev. E. J. O'Brien, pastor of the Methodist church at 1000 Dundas street, West York, has been sued by Mrs. O'Brien, who claims \$10,000 in damages.

Patrick Maher, Liverpool, seeks \$2500 damages from the Toronto Railway Company for careless driving by the defendants and their servants.

James Smith, 283 Spadina avenue, seeks \$2000 damages from the city for injuries he received by falling on an unobstructed sidewalk on Dalhousie street. Application was made in the Surrogate Court for power to administer the estate of the late Hannah Maria Woodbridge, who died leaving \$1000 in life insurance and \$900 in household effects.

Police Court Record. In the Police Court, Mrs. Olive Oliver of Church street pleaded guilty of a violation of the Liquor Act, and was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. Louisa Brindley was fined \$50 and costs or three months for a similar offence. Mary Lawrence was remanded for sentence on a charge of stealing some household articles from Dr.
