CLOSING EXERCISES OF TRINITY COLLEGE SCHOOL

Dr. Symonds, the Retiring Head, Presented by the Boys With a Handsome Gold Watch.

Port Hope, June 26.—(Special).—Speech Day, the great festival of the year at Trinity College School, when past and present Trinity College school boys meet in one great fraternity, was celebrated today. The special train from Toronto and other points brought down crowds of enthusiastic old boys and many mamma and sisters anxious to see the young hopefuls of the family, and calculating on the number of prizes he would win by the hard work he had taken of in his letters home.

Around the grounds were eager and excited groups of boys speculating on the awarding of the prizes and looking with eyes full of envy at the "old boys" receiving their prizes and smoking pipes with impunity, as some of them did occasionally say as they passed the boys' group of a master just from town of some. Many tumbled down to the "black shop" where many of the happy boys said all the pocket money of their school days had been spent in detouring the dainties provided by the good natured old proprietress, Mrs. Philip.

The only clouds on the gateway of the boys were the medals and the drawing of "Duggy" Plumb, who had brought so much credit on his old school days at the Junior College, and the resignation of Dr. Symonds, who after doubling the attendance of the school during his short two years' administration, was leaving to become Dean of the Cathedral at Montreal. But this last regret was counterbalanced by the delight of the boys in knowing that he was to be succeeded by Dean Rigby, who has always been their friend, and whose frequent visits to the school have always been hailed with the greatest pleasure.

The opening proceeding was the speech day service in the chapel, where Rev. Professor Clark preached his usual lesson and quotation on the text, "What do ye here?" The preacher spoke of the admirable opportunities which are afforded for the formation of character and friendship in a school of the kind, and paid a high tribute to Dr. Symonds, the retiring headmaster, who had been his pupil in divinity 20 years ago. His words shook as he congratulated them on having secured Dean Rigby as his successor, and as he expressed his deep regret to leave his old home from Trinity College.

The music of the service, conducted by Mr. Green, the choirmaster, was especially beautiful. Miss Bertha Symonds contributing a solo.

After chapel the guests adjourned to the gymnasium to witness the prize giving and hear the speeches of the dignitaries. The dais was occupied by His Lordship the Bishop of Toronto, Rev. Prof. Clark, Dean Rigby, Dr. Symonds, Provost Mackenzie and Dr. Arthur Johnson, the oldest "old boy" of the school.

Record of the Year.

Dr. Symonds opened the speeches with his report of the year. Since he came to the school two years ago the attendance had increased from 57 to 105, and over one hundred were enrolled for next year, in honor of which increase there would be a whole holiday next term. (Applauds.) There was a full equipment of masters, his staff now consisting of eight. They had given him the heartiest cooperation and they were probably best described by the words of a boy's essay: "We have eight masters here, very nice men, out of school." A physical instructor, Sergeant Davidson of the 4th Regiment, Ottawa, had been employed, and he was very successful, and he is recommended to the new headmaster to do likewise.

Dr. Symonds paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of Douglas Plumb, who died recently, and to the two Farmcum boys, who had perished similarly two years ago. Among the numerous recent improvements in the school, he mentioned the new chapel memorial windows on the left side, given by the boys of the school, another to the Rev. Scott Howard boys, given by their father, and one to Robert Heavry, who died in his Master's service in British Columbia. During the cricket season Trinity College School had risen almost to the top of the cricket career.

Before closing his remarks with a farewell to the school, and congratulating the school on the acquisition of Dean Rigby, Dr. Symonds announced that James Dwyer, arrested some days ago, on a charge of having stolen silverware in his possession, may be able to explain when he came up to court he was remanded for a week, and the C.P.R. will see if they can identify the silver.

THE MAN FROM GLENGARY

Will still be Jacob T. Schell, The He's Not Seated.

Ottawa, June 26.—(Special).—Jacob T. Schell will continue to represent Glengary, the Committee on Privileges and Elections having decided that he is not guilty of an infringement of the act respecting the independence of parliament. Mr. Sutherland presented the report of the committee to the House today. The report sets forth that the goods sold by McPherson & Schell to W. D. Scott was a personal transaction, and that there was no contract as between the firm and the Dominion government. No motion was made. The report of the committee was merely laid on the table of the House. Mr. Schell had taken his seat in the House, but when Mr. Fielding walked over to his seat and whispered a few words to him the member for Glengary was notified to hastily leave the House. His cooperation, while practically settled, is not yet officially complete.

Death of Member.

Feeling reference was made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the death of Donald Farquharson, member for Queen's, who died on June 25. Mr. Farquharson came to the House while in his health, and was respected and esteemed of those members of parliament to whom he was intimately known. Mr. Fielding joined in these expressions of regret. He spoke of the distinction Mr. Farquharson had achieved in his native province, and regretted that owing to ill-health the member for Queen's had not been able to display his ability in the Dominion parliament.

Bill Introduced.

Mr. Russell of Hants introduced a bill to incorporate the Insurance Bank of Halifax.

Mr. Gallinger moved the first reading of the bill introducing the Ontario Kamloops and Similkameen Railway Company, Maclean and Telephones.

Mayor Hopes His "Commendable Zeal" Will Find the Solution.

The Mayor and Corporation Counsel Fullerton returned from Ottawa yesterday, where they had been to see Mr. Hays in regard to an arrangement of the Esplanade differences with the G. T.R. With the usual result that Mr. Hays is looking into the matter more fully, he says.

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MOON, WEATHER, CROPS SOMETHING ABOUT EACH

Continuance of Clouds and Rain Causes Breezy Speculation and Brings Out Some Facts.

We know not if the moon is full, or if it's in the quarter. But if it's full, we know full well, it must be full of water.

—Musings of a Meteorologist.

The unravellers of portents do not consult the sun when they want to be weather wise; no, the moon for them. Does she not control the tides? Even when a man has a "tide on" he is said to be like the moon—when she is full.

And yet Mr. Stupart, of our Meteorological Bureau, declares his disbelief in ability of the moon to direct the periods of drought and deluge. The sun-spots for him. But whatever the cause, Ontario is getting more rain than is just proper.

Speaking Wednesday regarding the condition of the crops and the result upon them which this rainy spell would have, C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, said: "Two weeks ago we thought the crops would be a total failure, but they seem to be coming along all right. This rain may do harm, as we are getting a little too much. Still we feared the same thing last year, and the crop had been in twenty years. The crop is rather poor, but this is on account of the former drought, not the fault of the latter rains."

J. M. Clark, a delegate from Ontario to the Farmers Institute Convention, said the hay crop would be short, owing to the drought, and that the corn crop would be very heavy, the heads were filling up well, and every inch of grain would be a bushel.

Another delegate, J. L. Warren, from Acton, said crops were looking first-class in his section, with the exception of corn. This grain which was cut in the field, indications were for a splendid harvest.

New Moon Gives Hopes. One with faith in hidden things—a disciple of occultism—said yesterday: "I care not for high gradients or low barometrical barometres. I believe in the moon. Now, when the moon waxes, the crops are better. According to the almanac, we had a new moon early Thursday morning. That was the day the crops were better. As Bloodgood Cutter might remark: 'No more we'll look blue round the hills; we'll have up the quinine pill; the sun will kill the wintry chill; the birds will trill and coo and bill; the smiling world will slide down hill.'"

Contracts Awarded for New Hospital Wing—City Hall Notes.

A deputation of yachtmen waited on the Board of Control to ask for a grant of \$1000 toward the regatta expenses when the races for the Canada Cup are held. Aug. 5-10 will be the days of the regatta, and during that time, Commodore Jarvis and his thousands of visitors, Canadian and American, will be present, and the city should give something toward their entertainment. The club were spending some \$3000 on the Home Comers' Festival in a water fête and this drain was responsible largely for the present request.

Controller Burns was in favor of granting \$500 and Council yesterday evening passed \$1000. He carried his point and the club gets the \$1000.

Considerable discussion was held. Ald. Stewart asked the board to consider the east end nuisance when considering the complaints of the west end citizens against noxious odors arising from factories. Ald. Stewart said there was a certain factory in the east end, near the Don, where refuse was barrowed out and left lying in the sun to cause all kinds of smells and danger of disease.

The board voted \$300 for decorating the fire halls on the days of the Festival.

Fire Department Contracts. The contract for the supply of fire hose was awarded as follows: 700 feet Keystone brand, from the Canada Rubber Company at \$84, and 1750 feet of Parallels brand from the Gatta Pouch Company at \$85. Firemen's straw hats will be supplied by J. A. Perry, 24 East Queen-street, at 90c each. He will also supply the peaked caps at \$1.35 each.

New Hospital Wing. The contracts for the new Isolation Hospital were awarded as follows: brick work, M. Laroche & Sons, \$8716; carpentering, George Henry & Son, \$8874; painting and glazing, F. E. Phillips, \$1157; plumbing and wiring, K. J. Allison, \$2077; heating and ventilating, Fiddes & Hogarth, \$3727; galvanizing from work, W. D. Davidson & Son, \$1069; plastering, W. & D. Duckworth, \$1170; steel structural work, Dominion Bridge Company, \$1703. The last mentioned tender carried a provision against signing a contract with a time limit. They will have to do so, or lose the work.

Alabama Press Association. W. J. Douglas, J. E. Atkinson, C. T. Pearce, representing the Toronto Press Association, asked the Legislature and Reception Committee yesterday to increase the grant previously voted for the entertainment of the Alabama Press Association which arrived here on July 15. The committee had granted \$75 at their last meeting. Mr. Atkinson suggested the chartering of a steamer to take the party for a sail on the lake around the island, stopping, perhaps, at Island Park and partaking of refreshments. The committee decided to double the former grant, making \$150 altogether.

The committee also decided to entertain the Kentucky Press Association with a car ride and luncheon at Mrs. Meyers' on July 25. The association will be in the city only from 4 to 9 p.m. The ladies' bazaar will be entertained on Aug 4 to the extent of \$25.

To Decorate the Hall. Several schemes for decorating the City Hall during the Home Comers' Festival were discussed. The plan to have flags flying from all the windows on the front of the building was not favorably received, and the committee finally left in the hands of the Commissioner of Assessment and Property.

The musical program billed for this afternoon's outing, on the steamer Mojaska will consist of thirty numbers embracing all the latest operatic melodies and popular marches.
