Marvelous Cinematograph
A set of moving pictures of a horse race was taken at Sheepshead Bay track, near New York City, and four ago and last years and 15 minutes later the pictures were shown on the screen in a New York theatre. As the race proceeded the photographer kept his eyes on the machine, which rattled away like a mad dog, and, impressing pictures on a sensitized film, the rate of 40 a second. When the horses dashed into the wire he stopped the motor and opened the box and from his hand came a strip of film containing the record of the race on a continuous film strip. This was hurriedly developed and the picture was ready for the eye. An electric motor of a hand crank turned the film along in front of the lens and while the shutter of the camera was opening and closing the shutter at 28, 1/2 intervals, the film in the dark box, which, in rhythm with the rapid whirling of the film, each section of film came to a dead stop while the shutter opened and closed a hundredth of a second. There were 2000 pictures.

All the pictures are developed at once. The film is wound on a reel in a dark room, and the whole reel is dipped into the necessary solutions—the whole process being developed by white-heat. The World's Work.

CHURCHILL'S CONSTITUENTS.

Threaten to Withdraw Their Support, on Strange Grounds.

The following remarkable resolution was recently carried at a special meeting of the members of the St. Peter's (Oldham) Conservative Club:

"That we, the members of the above club, do enter our protest against the recent abuses and scurrilous statements delivered against His Majesty King Edward VII. and ministers of the Crown, believing the same to be in every way unwarrantable, and we consider the time has arrived to withdraw our support from the Conservative party, and to support the Liberal party, as we have been much deceived."

This resolution was forwarded to Mr. Churchill in London, those reply to the secretary was made on Monday in this letter, of which Mr. Churchill has forwarded us a copy:

"I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 17th inst., enclosing a resolution which ensures me for a cent of the party, and I am glad to hear that you were practically unchanged from that of the last year. I am, however, glad to hear that you were added as members of the club, and I am glad to hear that you were appointed clerk of the society."

The indignation of the Conservative Club is expressed in the following words of a resolution which is conveyed to 'Belleville' members (according to The Manchester Guardian), to have arisen from a quite curious interpretation by them of a part of the Halifax speech. The resolution is exclusively of working-class men, who have no political opinions, and are in the speech to the King, Mr. Churchill's 'audacity' in appointing a Conservative to be the speaker to say: 'After the general election has taken place in London, those reply to me by the King—assuming that he would think such a formally necessary—the fair trial by the law of the land. A tame Chancellor of the Exchequer, to be elected by the parliament will be ordered by a triumphant caucus to ratify it, without delay, or the consequences will be such as to ensure the severest lesson to have been taught the words 'the world think' referred to the King."
