Much has been said and written about the fruit belt which is contiguous to the shores on both sides of Lake Ontario, towards the western end. Each locality thru the district has had associated with its name one or more varieties of fruit, which the natural conditions have developed to a state of perfection. Not the least of these is Clarkson's, 16 miles west of Toronto, between Port Credit and Oakville, which to-day is without a peer in the production of the earliest of the sea-

production of the earliest of the sea-son's fruits—the strawberry—which de-lights all palates, most of all ordinary citizens, man and woman.

The change in weather of the past two days may indeed be said to be welcome. Not only has the straw-berry crop been delayed from a week to ten days beyond the usual time but the peach trees are affected with a blight that can only be dissipated by a higher temperature, and the growers will be fortunate if a large

Deputation of Dentists Wait on the Management Committee-Two Medical Inspectors New.

A deputation representing the Ontario Dental Association waited on the management committee of the board of education yesterday urging that more instruction be given the children in the public schools along the line of prevention of decaying teeth. Dr. Wallace Seccomb urged that something should be done to impress upon children the necessity of better mastication of the

Inspector Hughes said that hygiene was taught to the children in the public schools and that the study of that subject embraced all the points which Dr. Seccomb was endeavoring to so

emphatically express.

"We have made investigations and know just how much hygiene is being taught in the schools," retorted Dr.

Inspector Hughes reminded the board that many years ago he had advised the appointment of a dental inspector.

Dr. A. E. Webster urged the appointment of a dentist to instruct the teachers, and a communication was read from Nurse Rogers suggesting that as a great number of the children were unable to procure tooth brushes, the board, as an experiment, should purchase six gross and give them to the children at cost, five cents. The matter was referred to the Canadian Oral Prophylactic Association, who are doing considerable philanthropic work along this line.

Dr. Bryans moved that Dr. Embree prepare a report on the co-relation of the high school work, and insert any suggestions which would improve the present situation.

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## HAVE EXAMINING BOAR

Prof. Bowles of Victoria Asks Toronto Methodist Conference to FOR SOLD'ERS IN CAMP Appoint Seven Clergymen.

That a commission of seven clergymen be appointed to examine and deprobationers in the Methodist Church, was the opinion of Rev. Prof. R. P. Bowles of Victoria University, in an NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, June 9. address he gave at the Toronto Methodist conference yesterday afternoon in Elm-street Church.

"Not without sincere regrets would any one of us raise objections to earnest young men being received on probation," said he, "but if a nigh standard is to be maintained in the ministry, a more rigid test of efficiency and be instituted." A comm should be instituted." A commission of the nature suggested by Prof. Bowles was, he explained, already appointed by the Methodist Church in England, and to this commission was entrusted entirely the work of examining, both as to their educational and natural abilities, young men aspiring to the ministry. Thus the general conference would be relieved of this re-sponsibility. Prof. Bowles stated that the number of university students pre-paring for the Methodist ministry was, year by year, increasing so rapidly that no fears need be entertained of any dearth of men in either the home foreign field.

Dr. Hincks is President. At the opening of the session Rev.Dr.W H. Hincks, LL.B., of Broadway Tabernacle, was elected president on the first ballot. He received 178 votes, a clear majority over the necessary number for election. The two nearest competi-tors to Dr. Hincks for the presidency were Rev. John Locke and Rev. Joseph Ferguson. Rev. C. J. Dobson was elect-ed secretary. He made the following appointments, which were ratified: First assistant, Rev. R. J. D. Simp-son; second assistant, Rev. J. E. Wil-son; journal secretary, Rev. John J. Ferguson: statistical secretary. Rev. Ferguson; statistical secretary, Rev G. Sherlock Faircloth.



### FORT FRANCES AND ELECTRIC POWER.

Fort Frances is considerably exercised over the settlement made by the provincial government with the Minnesota and Ontario Power Company. The concession which was given in the first place in 1904 by Hon. Mr. Davis, and enlarged in January, 1905, by Hon. 





The tariff law provides that if any country imposes an export duty of any kind whatsoever on wood in the manufacture of wood pulp, such duty shall be added by the United States on

PARDONED BY ONTARIO GOVT. Niagara Falls Hotelman the First to changed. Be So Freed.

The Ontario Government has pardoned William R. Dashney of Niagara Falls, who on April 7 was sentenced to four months' imprisonment for a sec-ond offence of selling liuor without a license. The cause of Dashney's par-don is ill-health and a dargely signed petition asking for pardon. This is probably the first case in which the province has exercised the prerogative in a case of this kind.
