SPAIN WILL FIGHT WITH THE CATHOLICS

The Dominguez Government Will Cross Swords With Papal Authorities as Soon as Cortes Reassembles--Church Issues the Matters in Dispute.

MADRID, Oct. 11.—Upon the reassembling of the Cortes, Oct. 20, the Vatican and the liberal government of Marshal Lopez Dominguez will cross swords over the church issue. While the actual question of the separation of church and state in Spain, the stronghold of Catholicism, is not to be immediately raised, as in France, the programme of the liberals is distinctly anti-clerical, and if it progresses successfully, is sure, ultimately, to lead to an open fight for the severance of the ties which bind the Vatican and the Bourbon dynasty.

THE SUMMERSIDE FIRE HAS BURIED ITSELF OUT; LOSS REACHED \$200,000

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Oct. 11.—(Special)—The Summerside fire is out. The loss is \$200,000 and the insurance \$50,000. The electric light station, court house, and jail, over 50 buildings, mainly residences are burned. The fire started in the railway freight shed at 10 p. m. and was fanned by a heavy south-easterly gale. The fire cut a path three hundred yards wide and a mile long, burning itself out at a large space.

EARL GREY IN THE WEST The suggestion made by Earl Grey to the people of British Columbia, relative to the development of their fruit industry, by an organized scheme to settle a desirable class of English people on orchard lands, shows that his excellency goes about with a keen interest in what he sees, and a desire to be of service.

A FEW REMINDERS A New York Journal is moved to ironical protest by the outcry about the "course of wealth in politics" and the attacks made upon public men who have been engaged as corporation counsel or have become owners of stock in railroads.

After pointing out that several gentlemen have felt it necessary for them to deny that they are very rich, this journal proceeds:

"In an older and more settled day wealth was less of a stigma in public life than now. The fathers of the Republic were thrifty souls who would have sent thrills of horror up the spines of the young patriots of the Gilesey House, in proportion to the wealth of the country."

"A later generation of statesmen was even worse than the fathers. It was Webster who won the Dartmouth College case, the very ark of corporation vested rights in the nation. For more than half a century the Supreme Court has been slowly undoing this mischief, whittling the decision away in order to protect the people from the folly of their servants and the greed of their creatures."

The prompt action of the authorities in connection with the strike-riot at Buckingham, Quebec, which had resulted in the death of two men and the wounding of several others, has enabled the milling company to resume work, but there are rumors of further trouble when the soldiers are withdrawn.

The postponed forestry convention in this province is to be held in December. The timber areas of New Brunswick are increasing in value from year to year, and if this convention is able to formulate an educative campaign and protective policy it will do great good.

Ontario derives much revenue from succession duties. The Toronto Globe says: "The treasury department received in succession duties in the month of September \$23,032, an increase over the corresponding month of 1905 of \$13,345."
