OTTAWA, June 29.—Reports today are to Arthur Meighen secures the passage of supply in the House he will hold by-elections for the return of his cabinet, rather than general elections. The Prime Minister has not so far made any announcement of his plans, but in Conservative circles it is stated that they will largely depend on developments in the House during the day.

As Mr. Meighen thereby vacates his seat in the House till reelection, it is understood that Sir Henry Drayton will be acting government leader in the Commons, and when the House meets again at two o'clock will make a statement. Several acting minagain at two o clock will make a statement. Several acting ministers are to be appointed to put business through the House. Report has it that both Sir George Perley and R. S. White will likely resign the seats they hold in Quebec province, to make way for the appointment of French speaking ministers. Hon. E. L. Patenaude is mentioned for Mount Royal, Montreal, now represented by Mr. White with a ministerial appointment in the special appointment in the special appointment. by Mr. White, with a ministerial appointment in view.



#### Traffic Increase Makes Fair Vale Viaduct A Dangerous Hazard

WHEN the Fair Vale viaduct was built years ago it was well adapted to, and sufficiently safe for the class of traffic which it then was compelled to accommodate. The road at that time was hardly more than a local country high-way, used chiefly by farmers with horse-drawn vehicles. The approach to the underpass was not made rapidly and hence the hazard was insignificant.

With the advent of the automobile and the improvement of the road to one of the best of its kind in the province, the traffic increased until today, for its length, it is one of the greatest traveled roads in this part of the country.

T IS evident that something must be done—and done immediately to remove this possible source of painful, if not fatal, accident. For the motorist who is compelled to pass through this viaduct daily, and who knows its peculiarities, there is always the possibility of danger. To those not knowing the road, such as the driver who had the misfortune to crash into the abutment recently, there is a still greater hazard. With the tourist season on us and possibility of throngs of automobiles passing over this road for the first time this season, it is argued by those who are alive to the situation, some remedial measure is absolutely necessary.

**U.S.HONOR SYSTEM** 

Harvard Professor Declares
Plan Does Not Always
Work Out

FREDERICTON, June 29.— The local examinations for high school graduation should be dispensed with entirely and graduation should be determined upon the results of the annual departmental examinations in New Brunswick, was the opinion expressed this morning be-fore the Teachers' Institute of New Brunswick, in a paper pre-pared by Principal W. McL. Barker, of Moncton, and read in his absence by W. C. Haines, B. A., of Moncton.

The paper dealt with the subject of examinations in the public schools of the province and the advisability of reducing or increasing the number of written examinations. The recent trend is towards more examinations, said Principal Barker in his paper, while employers are more and more requiring certificates of matriculation from their employes. Examinations were necessary because of the fact that teachers were unable to deal sufficiently with the individual pupil under any

UNIFORM GRADING

Papers should be carefully et and Papers should be carefully et and the pupils made to correct all errors and to check their own rates of progress. Papers should be set by teachers thoroughly familiar with the course for which the candidate is preparing, while all grading should be made as uniform as possible.

Prof. Charles Swain Thomas, of the Graduate School of Education of Harvard University discussed the new type examinations of the United States, which have as their objective the obtaining of results which can be graded with mathematical accuracy. Questions on such papers required short answers and contained false and true statements between which the student was required to distinguish.



MEXICO CITY, June 29—An estimate that the total fatalities in the floods at Leon will exceed 1,000, is given by the special correspondent of EUniversal, who has just returned from the devastated regions. ## Dorothy Dix

Instead of Making Home a Place of No Privacy or Liberty, Why Not Give Things a Moral Housecleaning? -Abolish the Questionnaire, Redecorate With Courtesy and Refurnish Throughout With Consideration for

THERE is no other institution in the world that stands in such great need of reformation as the home.

Oh, I know we all get maudlinly sentimental when we talk and write about home, sweet home, and sing about there being no place like it—and most of us are precious glad there isn't. However, I am not talking about the theoretical home, but the actual, practical home as it really exists.

Dr. Johnson once said that a second marriage was the final triumph of hope over experience. I think that the most wonderful illustration of the incurable optimism of humanity is that men and women are still able to keep their dream of home untarnished, and believe that they will be able to realize their ideal in spite of the homes most of them have come from themselves, and the spectacle of the homes they see all about them.

For, stripped of all the camouflage with which we try to disguise the ugly facts, what is the average home except a place of sacrifice and suffering; a place in which we have no rights or privileges; a place in which we have no vestige of privacy or liberty; a place in which we are treated with contumely, and are treated to endure such insults as we suffer nowhere else on earth.

THAT our jailers are our husbands and wives and fathers and n

and that they do not deliberately and with malice aforethought rob us of our happiness, does not mitigate our sufferings. Nor does it ease to situation for us to know that those who make our lives intolerable low us well enough to die for us.

The fact remains that the home of our ideal and the home of reality are as far apart as the Poles. Wherefore we need to do a lot of moral housecleaning in our homes and see if we cannot make them alluring places to live in, instead of being places from which every one flees as soon as he

For consider what an awful indictment of the home it is that when we need rest we go away from home to get it. When we need a screne atmosphere in which to build up our shattered nerves, the doctors send us away from home to find it. And when we want to enjoy ourselves we go away from home to do it.

Now, if I were mapping out a plan for the reformation of the home, I should begin by combating the ancient and time-honored belief that home is a place where you can be yourself, and freely display all the meanness and crankiness and temper and brutaliy that you hide from the balance of the world. There are plenty of men and women whose sole use for a hearthstone is to make it a dumping ground for their cussedness.

ALL of us know men who are suavity and gallantry itself to every other woman, but who swear at their wives and say things to them that they would not dare say to any woman who had an able-bodied brother. We all know women who are so mild and sweet and amiable abroad that butter wouldn't melt in their mouths, but who are vixens and viragos at

I would lay the foundations of a pleasant home by making such men and women realize that it is far more important for them to be decent in the home than it is outside of it, and that the returns in comfort and prosperity will be greater.

ALSO, that it is a debt of honor that they owe to those to whom they are married and their children. For strangers can avoid the society of the boorish and the shrewish, but no wife can escape her husband's surliness; no husband can avoid his wife's nagging; no children can get away from a

Next, I would combat the kindred theory that home is a place where you can dispense with good manners. Over the door of most homes is inscribed the legend: "Abandon politeness, all ye who enter in." At least, that is the motto over the family entrance.

ABROAD, people treat us with consideration. They spare our feelings. They withhold their criticisms. If they are going to stab us, they do it in the back, but at home no such regard is shown for our sensibilities. Our faults, our foibles, our weaknesses, our mistakes are kept ever before us, and we are daily forced to listen to the thing that we would rather die than hear. So peculiarly cruel is this candor of our near relations that it gives a name to the most virulent form of verbal attack upon an individual. We call it "telling home truths."

What a salving of one of our vanity it would be, how many hurts it would save our egos, how much it would make for peace and harmony, if only our nearest and dearest would treat us with the same degree of politeness that they show to chance-mek

the same degree of politeness that they show to chance-thee strangers!

Why should we tell sister that her hat is ten years too young for her, and Aunt Jane that she makes herself a figure of fun dressing like a fiapper, when we would carefully refrain from making such remarks to Mrs. A and Mrs. B? We don't correct Mr. Jones' grammar, or Mr. Smith's pronunciation. Why not keep tongues off brothers and husbands? Why not extend to our own household the little courtesies and attentions that we show to guests? After all, it is a small matter whether we make ourselves agreeable to people we see only once in a blue moon, but it is vitally necessary for us to be persona grata with those with whom we have to pass every day of our lives.

The next reformation I would institute in the home would be canning the questionnaire. There is no other one thing on earth so aggravating as being put through the third degree about every thing you do and don't do. There is no one who does not kn-stinctively resent having to furnish an alibi for every minute of the day, and explain just exactly what he or she did or thought or said.

YET there are very few households in which any one can get a letter, or use a telephone, or receive a call, or pay a visit, or buy a toothbrush, or make any move whatsoever without having to answer a thousand questions about it and tell every detail to those whom it does not concern.

It is this vulgar family curiosity that drives young people, especially, away from home, and makes them go to live among strangers who will not be forever prying into their affairs.

Worn While Commanding 62nd
Saint John Fusiliers About
30 Years Ago

The Natural History Society Museum has been given uniforms worn by Colonel J. J. Tucker, for many years commanding the 62nd Fusiliers. The donor is Mrs. John Ferguson.

TUCKER PARK.

It was Lt.-Col. Tucker who bequeathed to the City of Saint John as a recreation park the extensive property which runs from Rockwood Park to Millidgeville, and is known as Tucker Park. His sister gave a fund of \$10,000 for the park maintenance which has since grown to about \$16,000.

At the time of the Trent affair in 1862 Joseph John Tucker raised a company of 76 men under his own command and offered the services of this company to General Rumley. He was appointed a captain in the Nova Scotia naval brigade in 1865.
