PROHIBITION RESULTS IN IDAHO James Leitch, parole officer of the Idaho state penitentiary, gives figures showing that the number of men paroled from that institution in the last two years, in which time this state and surrounding states have been largely under prohibition, who do not make good is extremely small. But 1 1/2 per cent of the paroled men in 1917 went wrong, Mr. Leitch said, and of all those paroled from the penitentiary there has not been one man who has asked to go into a wet state. He says the men realize that in most cases it has been while under the influence of liquor that they have met their downfall and that it is a distinct advantage to go out facing the world where this for will not be met. The courts generally over the state have had a decrease in the number of cases in the past year, including the supreme court. Not only is there a decrease in the number of criminal cases but in the civil cases. The diminution of crime is directly traceable to the inauguration of a prohibition regime.

#### PICTURE EXECUTIVE IN TOWN

R. J. Macdonald, of Halifax; Witter O. Penney, of Fredericton; A. A. Gaudet, of Summerside; E. L. W. C. McKay, and W. H. Golding of this city, are meeting today in executive session at the Motion Picture Exhibitors' League of the Maritime Provinces. J. M. Franklin and Meyer Herschorn of Halifax, are also in town for the general discussion. The executive officers held a short preliminary session this morning in the Opera House offices and with other lunch at the Dufferin. This afternoon they were to meet the film exchange managers and tonight another session of the executive will be held. Many matters of importance are being brought upon and settled.

#### DIED IN BOSTON

#### PERFORMING DOG LOST

Trainer Edwette, belonging to The Ac Beautiful, one of the splendid specialties of the Harry Lauder show seen here last week, sustained a serious loss in the disappearance of one of his trained hunting dogs while in Bangor just previous to coming here. The dog was taken out for an airing in the streets and one of the pack—there were five of them—was run over by an automobile. After lying on the ground as if stunned for a minute or so the canine jumped up and ran away for dear life. All efforts to locate it failed and even up to the time the company left St. John there were no answers to advertisements. It is thought the dog was thoroughly frightened and after his taste with the auto became temporarily mad with the scene it received. The act to which the dog belonged is an English one and exceptionally valuable because of the proficiency of the dogs in horse in their pouncing.

### ARRANGEMENTS FOR A BIG SUPPLY OF LUMBER FROM CANADA

Means Business of \$40,000,000 With Great Britain in Year

London, Jan. 5.—(Special Cable from John W. Dace)—As the outcome of negotiations carried on by the Canadian trade commission the timber controller of Great Britain will purchase in Canada half a million standards of lumber, equivalent in the Dominion to one billion square feet. The lumber, of all grades, will be bought under the direction of the timber controller through from London brokerage houses and Canadian timber agents in London, who will deal direct with the Canadian lumber producers.

It is understood that every Canadian producer registered on the lists of the trade board at Ottawa will be given the equal opportunity to sell. There is also to be an allocation of purchases upon a territorial basis.

This lumber is to be bought within the next twelve months. It will represent a total transaction of about \$40,000,000.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 5.—The necessary Canadian credit which rendered possible the large lumber transaction announced from London was arranged some weeks ago between the Dominion government and the imperial government. The British government is to supply the shipping to carry this lumber.

Local lumber dealers already have been advised of this arrangement and expect to provide their share of the purchase in due season. They are also advised that the imperial government has been doing all the buying for the last three years. Private shipments could not be made to Great Britain as the shipping board would not permit the entry of any importations except those made through government agency. For the last three years all the lumber for overseas use has been purchased directly by the British government the buyer in this district being Montague L. Meyer. Under the later arrangement the purchases will be made through the Canadian branches of the Imperial Munitions Board.

### THE PROPOSED NEW THEATRE IN ST. JOHN

Would be One of Canadian Chain of Messrs. Allen—Reported Offer Was Made for Imperial

It is said that the theatre situation in St. John may take on a new complexion if the plans of Messrs. Allen of Toronto mature as outlined. They are the Canadian shareholders of Paramount pictures on agency basis and in proposing to erect theatres in St. John, they are a move to protect their own agency and to market their own films, a business which is not only profitable and important to the city as to the nature of the contract they were asked to accept.

Already Messrs. Allen control a string of theatres across Canada, starting in the west and extending in Quebec city, where they have recently acquired a lease of the Auditorium. They have two new theatres in Toronto, two in Ottawa and one new one in Westmount, Montreal. Their proposal to come into this territory is therefore an extension of their continental plans.

Mr. Rothenberg, financial representative of Allen interests, has been in the maritime provinces for several days arranging for sites to build and making reasonable arrangements for additional houses in New Glasgow, Moncton and Sydney. This scheme would give a chain of five houses in the maritime territory, two of which would be new buildings—Halifax and St. John.

The Halifax house is declared definitely in the air and appointments in St. John, another in Halifax and linked houses between these points and beyond, the entertainment situation in this section of Canada is apt to be greatly transformed as an after effect of the war. At the present time nearly all the houses operating in this territory are privately owned, or belong to close syndicates and the advent of a circuit may make things somewhat different.

### AMERICAN CONSUL SPEAKS OF ROOSEVELT

Mr. Cuiver Refers to Him as One of Greatest and Truest Sons of United States—Loves of Home Outstanding Trait

H. H. Cuiver, American consul here, was much distressed when a Times man informed him of the death of Colonel Roosevelt this morning. He said: "It was with profound sorrow that I received the news of Col. Roosevelt's death; it came as a great shock, for I was not aware of his illness."

"In his death the United States has lost one of her greatest and truest sons. His career was a most marvellous one, but what he achieved was through merit and force of character alone. While he has been more or less of a storm centre for years, yet no man ever stood truer to his convictions than Theodore Roosevelt, and, whether in office or as a private citizen, he wielded an influence for good that extended far beyond the boundaries of his own country."

"Numerous of a reactionary in politics, he was nevertheless, progressive, and always had the best interests of his country at heart. Perhaps no man of his time had a greater or more comprehensive grasp of world conditions than he, and he was in all respects in expressing his opinions."

"A most admirable trait in his character was his love of home and family. It was in his home life that he found his rest and his life. In his struggle and battle of life. In his death, a great man has fallen in the prime of life, and he will be missed, not only by his own people, but by the world at large, as few men are missed."

### SCANDINAVIAN HERE ON WEDNESDAY WITH MORE THAN THOUSAND

The next freight ship, the Scandinavian, is due to arrive here on Jan. 8 according to the latest advices received. The steamer has 193 officers, 168 other ranks and 746 civilians on board in addition to mails and general cargo.
