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



One of the trained nurses in the American service, a Boston graduate, writes to an old fellow-worker of this experience: "I wish you could see our hospital where I was for two or three weeks before being sent back here. The town had been heavily shelled so that hardly a building was untouched. It was impossible to get any French women to help us as the place was deserted, but a lot of our own enlisted men worked with us until now we have a nice comfortable hospital. "One evening since I have been back here I wandered down to the little cemetery where the boys we lost in the few short weeks we were here are laid to rest. I was so surprised to find their graves bright with flowers and so nicely taken care of. I enquired about it from a dear old French lady in the village, and she told me each family had been given a certain number of the American soldiers' graves to take care of and they were doing it for the American mothers,

Amsterdam, Oct. 25-(Friday)-The Dutch newspapers today published a despatch from Budapest which says that in collisions between Croatian and Hungarian troops in Fiume there were many casualties, hundreds of person being wounded. The Croatian tri-color was hoisted on the public buildings. Troops from Otocac, fifty miles southeast of Fiume, disarmed a stryian battalion which resisted them and took possession of the barbor. All state buildings, including the post office were occupied by troops. The railway station was destroyed and the mobs and troops plundered it. The Hungarian and Italian populations fled.

The Budapest newspaper Az Ujsag reports demonstrations at Karlowitz in Croatia-Slavonia, where two infantry regiments mutinied. The railway store




