### SPEEDY TRAVEL IN OLD DAYS AND NOW:

Twenty Miles an Hour Was Limit Fixed by Dr. Johnson—Now Two Miles a Minute

The next big speed achievement for the motor engineer to aim at is to be the first to produce a car to travel at two miles a minute for an hour at a spell. This may be done, tyres permitting, in a matter of weeks, as instance the building of the 12-cylinder Sunbeam engine. In the meantime, and despite the fact that no aeroplane has yet been proved to have achieved in a sprint, independent of wind, a speed surpassing the fastest done by a car over a short the fastest done by a car over a short distance, in April a French aviator Guillaux flew a distance of 119 miles in an hour, so that it is already a mere question of luck as to when any aeroplane may add the one mile to that accomplishment and travel at two miles a

It is therefore most probable that the flying machine will be the first vehicle to convey a man that distance in that time. One hopes it will be soon, since the moment it does so the general public will begin to realize a fresh use for flying at least in its bearings on national defence, namely, that not only will the aeroplane be the speediest vehicle in the world, but also one that shares with the dirigible in speed as well as in quickness of rising. 



In Prussia, where it is estimated that two million youths between the ages of fourteen and eighteen are at work, they manage it differently, and about three-fifths of the working boys in that country attend continuation schools. These schools have heen most successful, and are looked upon as a big national asset. By arrangement with employers working youths attend these schools a few hours each week-not at night, when they are tired from a day's work in the shop, but in the daytime. In some cases they attend one whole day or two half days a week. They receive vocational training in the craft or calling that employs them, and are better fitted all round for their bread-winning occupation. If a boy works in a machine shop he

is taught machine-shop arithmetic. The idea is to blend education and workto link the school with the youth's actual daily breadwinning experiences. Munich, for example, maintains more than fifty continuation schools, and the yearly cost to the city is said to be not more than \$16 a pupil.

# CORRUPTION

Lobbyist Tells Story of Wholesale Bribery

### AT WASHINGTON

Gives Names of Those Who Were Bought and of Others Who Could be Influenced Otherwise -Puts Taft Among the Latter

New York, June 80—Col. Martin M. Mulhall, a Republican politician of Baltimore, has made a statement, attested to before a notary public, that for ten years, while he was chief lobbyist and underground corruptionist for the Naunderground corruptionist for the Na-tional Association of Massachusetts, that body restrained the labor unions and moulded business legislation by bribing, intimidating or influencing representa-tives in congress, United States sena-tors and the chief officers of govern-

ment.

Mulhall has been subpoenaed to appear on July 7 to repeat his charges before the senate's lobby investigating He names ex-President William H Taft as one of the men whom the lobby-ists for the National Association of Manufactures had no difficulty in reach-ing and influencing for business, political or sympathetic reasons during recent

years."

He does not charge that Mr. Taft got money. He puts the ex-President in the "business, political and sympathetic" category along with the late Vice-President James S. Sherman, Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, ex-Senators Foraker of Ohio, Hemenway of Indiana, Aldrich of Rhode Island, Scott of West Virginia; Senators Nelson of Minnesota, Stephenson of Wisconsin, Townsend of Michigan and Gallinger og New Hampshire; ex-Speaker Joseph G. Cannon, Representatives Bartholdt of Missouri, Fairchild of New York and Burke of Pennsylvania; ex-Representatives William S. child of New York and Burke of Pennsylvania; ex-Representatives William S. Bennet, J. Cloat Fassett, Vreeland, Southwick and M. E. Driscoll of New York; Representative Calder of New York, Tawney and J. Adam Bede of Minnesota, Overstreet of Indiana, Fowler of New Jersey; Curtis Guild of Massachusetts, the present Ambassador to Russia; Myron T. Herrick of Ohio, the present Ambassador to France, and some other of less note. the representatives (most of whom are now out of office) who took cash from the National Association of Manufacturers for controlling the House Labor and Judiciary Committees or for other subserviencies were James E. Watson of Indiana, an influential Republican Congressman for years and the floor leader for the Taft forces at the Republican national convention in 1912; Charles E. Mulhall sold the statement to the New York World for cash—\$10,000—and then broke an agreement to give Barry half the amount for making the deal. Barry has sued Mulhall in the Su-preme court of this State, and last Wednesday Supreme Court Justice Glegerich issued an attachment for \$5,000 against any property of Mulhall's that could be found here.





Rolled Oats and Corn Meal Mill
Would Employ 75 Hands

(Special To Times)

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 2—One of the most recent propositions brought before the people of P. E. Island is that of the Colonial Corporations Ltd. of Hali fax. Of late years, there has been a marked advance in the quality of island oats and investigation has shown that they are richer in meal than any other oats grown in Canada. The crop last year, was seven millions of bushels, whilst that of Nova Scotia was only two millions and New Brunswick one million. This company has been considering the advisability of locating in this province to be near the source of supply and to put up a plant with a 200 barrel a day capacity for manufacturing rolled oats and corn—meal. They expect to employ seventy-five hands, all local labor with the exception of the head miller and the chief engineer.
