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The House of Commons Committee on Privileges and Elections, after hearing the testimony relating to the charges made by Mr. Tarbo, M. P., against Messrs. McGreery, Langvin and others, in connection with certain contracts under the Public Works Department, referred the work of preparing a report to three Conservatives and two Liberals. The Conservatives thus honored were Sir John Thompson, Hon. M. Adams and D. G. Smith, and the Liberals, Messrs. David Mills and I. Davies. It is said that these gentlemen have not been able to agree upon a report, and that two reports will be submitted, that by the Conservatives declaring Sir Hector Langvin guilty of the charges made by Mr. Tarbo, and another report by the Liberals, who will declare that the Liberals will take an opposite view. The Committee on Privileges and Elections will, as a whole, have to consider these two reports and either adopt one of them, some modification of both, or an entirely new one for presentation to the House of Commons, as its finding upon the charges submitted. Some of the papers are anticipating the Committee's decision as well as that of the House. We prefer to wait, however, in the hope that the unpleasant duty devolving upon the public men will not be shirked.

Majority for Legere.

These returns will not be a subject of which Mr. Phinney or his sympathizers can gather much of either congratulation or credit. Majorities have, for a good many years, been won in Kent by the Conservatives. It is not surprising that this election has brought about a change in that respect. In the election of 1889 the greatest disparity of ballots was between Mr. Phinney and his colleague, Mr. Goggin. Mr. Goggin—the same gentleman who had been elected in Kent in 1887—was assisted in Tuesday's election, Mr. Phinney, on that occasion, received 1618 votes, while he left Mr. Goggin with only 1203. He declares, to this day—and he always tells people he wants to be candid about it—that he was not in the contest. It was a surprise to his friends that Mr. Phinney and his friends, in parishes where he was strong, simply left Goggin to look out for himself. On the other hand, Messrs. LeBlanc and McGreery, who ran together against Phinney and Goggin, respectively, Phinney's majority over his friend Goggin, on that occasion, was, therefore, 315, while it was only 33 over LeBlanc and 172 over McGreery. Mr. Phinney has, therefore, on the present occasion, lost his majority of 797 votes. We warned Mr. Goggin of the danger of getting under Mr. Phinney's wing, but he was not to be deterred. He suffered accordingly. As to Mr. Phinney, he is what is known as a "dead duck" in politics, and may, therefore, be dropped out of sight. Mr. Goggin, however, ought not to be entirely condemned, for he was not in the contest, and he was under bad advice, he was led to sacrifice himself in the general election as a makeshift for the convenience and advantage of a less honest man, who stepped up to the head of the poll with the aid of Goggin's wing. The effect of Mr. Goggin's first mistake was to provide Kent with a useless representative and that of his second, to sustain a greater defeat, personally, than any Kent candidate ever before received in its political history. We understand that Mr. Goggin pleads illness as an excuse for his defeat in the matter. He is doubtless now sorry that he did so. Hereafter, should he aspire to the representation of the County, we hope it will be as something better than the catapaw of those whose ambitious schemes have placed him where he now is.

Temperance by Legislation.

The Scott Act Inspector for the County has gone away for a month or two of holiday-time, which, will, doubtless, make people reflect a little on the Scott Act as a measure for promoting temperance.
