**THE OLD APPEAL.**

Sir Wilfrid Laurier owes his leader-  
ship in the party, and whatever position  
that leadership has given him to the  
success of the agitation in Quebec,  
following the execution of Louis Riel.  
This agitation, which was certainly  
sincere on the part of many followers,  
was managed for their own political  
purpose by a group of adventurers.  
These politicians offered the late Sir  
Adolphe Chapleau not only office and  
power, but a sum of money equal, as  
he said himself, to five years salary as  
a federal minister, if he would place  
himself at the head of a Nationalist  
party. The eloquent French-Canadian  
rejected the offer and set himself bold-  
ly and loyally against the movement.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the late Mr.  
Merrier were ready to take up the  
campaign, and the premier's Saskatche-  
wan musket speech is a matter of his-  
tory. This was nearly twenty years  
ago, but at each election since then the  
old story of the execution of Riel is  
made to do duty in the province in  
the interest of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It  
is a sign that the campaign is on when  
Le Soleil, home organ of the premier  
himself, publishes a sketch of Mr. Fitz-  
patrick, minister of justice, in which  
is the following paragraph:  
"Who does not recall the far-famed  
trial of Louis Riel, accused of high  
treason? There was a question of  
raising subscriptions to send to Riel  
to employ counsel, when Messrs. Fitz-  
patrick, Lemieux and Greenshield, re-  
solved to proceed at their own expense  
to the assistance of the unfortunate  
fellow-citizen. Despite their forensic  
skill and their eloquence, Riel was  
ruthlessly condemned to death, to sat-  
isfy the vengeance of the Orangemen.  
What could they do in the face of  
violent fanaticism so cunningly organ-  
ized? Riel was sacrificed. The name of  
Jameson, of the Transvaal, and many  
such like, have been found guilty of the  
same crime, and were never executed.  
The one was French and Catholic, the  
other English. This difference alone  
sufficed to obtain a different sentence."

This is a perfectly grotesque misre-  
presentation. It does not mention the  
cold-blooded murders committed by  
Riel, nor the fact that he was the  
second rebel whom he had organized  
after he had been spared the first  
time. The comparison with the Jame-  
son case is maliciously false. What-  
ever offence Dr. Jameson committed it  
was not high treason. He was not a  
subject of the Transvaal government,  
and was not even accused of the  
offences committed by Louis Riel.  
Everybody knows that Louis Riel  
would have met the same fate had  
he been an Englishman or a Scot. This  
old race appeal, which done duty in  
four Dominion elections and in five  
provincial elections in Quebec, ought  
now to be dropped.

If the government organs in the pre-  
mier's own city can give us no better  
reasons why he should be continued in  
office than the fact that Louis Riel was  
executed and Dr. Jameson was not,  
the case must be desperate.

**A PEACE RECIPE.**

A new prophet has arisen among the  
Little Englanders. He signs himself  
"A Lover of Justice," and his proposal  
finds a place in the Westminster Review.  
He wants England to give a great ex-  
ample to all the world, and to become  
the peace maker of the nations. To be-  
gin with, England must get clear of  
her colonies. "We must simply cast  
them adrift and let them do as they  
like." This would "show the way."  
And the rhapsodist continues:  
"Then the name of England would  
"ring through the wide earth, and  
"would be as music in men's ears. She  
"would be the darling of the nations,  
"and all men would bless her name,  
"for she would have done the greatest  
"thing ever achieved by mortal man."  
This man is really a sort of grim  
joker. If the British colonies in all  
parts of the world were turned loose to  
be the prey of the nations there would  
be a fine carnival among the powers  
in gathering them in. The United  
States would go after the late British  
possessions in North America. Russia  
would proceed to the annexation of  
India. There would be another Boer  
propaganda in South Africa. Australia  
and New Zealand would run the  
gauntlet. There cast off colonies which  
desired autonomy would have to fight  
for it. The powers would fight among  
themselves for some of the rest. In  
short Britain would have given all the  
rest of the world the occasion for a  
new thirty year war, and would be  
more extensively cursed by the people  
of the world than any nation has been  
since the time of the Crusades.

This Lover of Justice is simply  
carrying to a logical conclusion the  
doctrine of fiscal and military non-  
resistance taught by certain British

politicians. These constantly proclaim  
that Britain must not pursue a policy  
which appears to be for her own in-  
terest, lest in doing so she should give  
offence to other countries. For the  
purpose of standing well with other  
countries Britain has kept open her  
market. Her shipping laws are  
equally generous to subject and for-  
eigners. When she controls a port over-  
seas she throws it open to the world.  
All the while her own ships are met  
with national restrictions in foreign  
ports, her goods are met at foreign  
ports with protective tariffs, and every  
new territory acquired by her competi-  
tors becomes a trade barrier. These  
make Britain the "darling" of other  
countries. She is absolutely the most  
friendly of all the powers. They all  
take what she gives, and they all  
sympathize with her enemies when  
she is in trouble. British statesmen  
are learning in a rather hard school  
that other powers respect other qual-  
ities in a nation more than they do the  
spirit of abnegation.

**THE ELECTION IS AT HAND.**

It is certain that the government  
party leaders in St. John have been  
informed that the general election for  
the House of Commons will take  
place early in November. Even if


