Massa chusetts checked the sale of Canadian bituminous coal by passing a law forbidding the "emission of smoke," and this regulation practically, for many purposes, prohibits the use of the highly volatile fuel from Nova Scotlas, but the Canadian article cannot enter the republic be-cause of a regulation prohibiting the entry of coal below a fixed carbon standard. 13.
