Farwell to Oil Production.
The petroleum oil production of Canada will be entirely stopped by the adoption of the proposed so-called reciprocity treaty, thus putting an end to an industry that employs a great many men and women, and yields to the Government a net, yearly revenue of \$237,776.53 a year. A great proportion of this capital will not be available for use in any other industry, as it is invested in works that will be useless when the oil production ceases to be profitable. Canada's oil production is the largest in the world. It is estimated that the oil fields of the United States and Canada together contain a total of 1,000,000,000 gallons of oil.

where will the money come from? The St. John and Halifax journals who endeavor to earn the subsidies they receive from Alex. Mackenzie & Co. should explain how the revenue is to be raised after the duties have been removed from all the articles enumerated in the schedules attached to the humble petition filed before the Washington authorities by the Hon. George Brown. The revenue will be increased considerably, and the obligations imposed by the treaty will largely increase the expenditure. How will the revenue be raised? Several branches of trade have good reasons for asking these questions.

Academy of Music Theatre.
