Indians and Trappers Are Their Enemie and It Is Fast Disappearing.

Canadian beaver have been only partially successful. To a great extent the woods have been stripped of their native animals, and the beaver has suffered more than most animals Its pelt is of sufficient value to make it a great prize. It is highly valued by the Indians as an article of iood. Its habits are such that it is easy for the trapper well-nigh to exter minate a whole colony in a single

day.

The Canadian law for the protection of the canadian law for the protection of the canadian law for the protection. tion of the beaver does not seem able to reach the Indians. The lat-ter remain for so long a time in the woods and are then so far from civilization that no official can keep watch over their movements. So the officials watch the dealers and at-tempt to prosecute them for buying

Beavers are good to eat, and if a hungry man kills one he goes free. The Indians of the far north go to the woods every winter with small rations, and if they eat the beaver they kill it would be hard to get any man who had ever faced starva-tion in the north to stand for their

One fur buyer, for instance, has a store where he keeps his f s. ## EQUALITY OF RACES

MAY BE SO THEORETICALLY, BUT NOT REALIZED PRACTICALLY.

n Article From the London Express Which Will Cause Many Unprejudiced Canadians to Open Their Eyes Wide-The Color Line Problem Under the Free

Throughout the whole British Empire, wherever the white man is confronted by the black man en masse,

the prejudice against the latter is bitter in the extreme. The theory of equality, the "man and brother" doctrine, however beauand brother" doctrine, however beau-tiful it may appear on paper is ab-solutely unworkable in the practice of every-day life. We rule our de-pendencies—India, South Africa, the West Indies, Ceylon, Australia, the Straits Settlements—by a rigid en-forcement of the superiority of the white man. And this is inevitable: white man. And this is inevitable; and it is as necessary as it is inevit-

able.
We should not hold India for a day did we not realize and act up to the well-proved and absolutely undeni-able fact that the white man, in all essentials, is immesurably the super-ior of the black.

Of course, to the ignorant, untraveled sentimentalist this is appalling: and he will indignantly deny the truth of my assertion. To many an untraveled cockney the black man is as good as, if, indeed, he is not better than, the white man.

A Stern Duty.

But to the initiate, to the minority who know, as opposed to the unthinking majority who do not know, the suppression of the black man is a stern duty. Nothing, surely, is more remarkable than the dislike and distrust of the black which is invariably felt by the white when he encounters the former mass. There must be a reason for this,

Carlyle and Froude—the latter to

me personally—both pronounced the emancipation of the slaves in America a very mixed blessing indeed. And certain it is that in the old days the condition of things between white and black was infinitely happier and more desirable, safer and more nat-

ral, than it is to-day.

For one Legree there were a hundred owners who treated their slaves as friends more than servants; to-day there is nothing but hatred between the two.

In India, of course the line of demarkation is necessarily very rigid.

We are in a minority, and if we are to keep the upper hand it is absolute-ly essential that white supremacy should be enforced, even at the sword's point.




