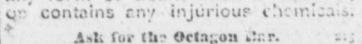

Editor's Mail.

Newcastle, N. B.
March, 28th, 1903

Editor of the Advocate,
Believing that many of the residents and rate-payers of Newcastle, are exponents of fair play and justice, and not being able to contradict personally the many false stories that are now in circulation, over my resignation, as engineer and foreman of the water and sewerage systems of the Corporation of Newcastle, I, being a public servant in justice to myself and to the general public, I deem it my duty and only proper and right that I should make a statement of the facts, having acted in a perfectly honest manner in everything appertaining to my duties, having nothing to hide, nothing to be ashamed of, unable to get a chance to present a defence of my actions before the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, the public press is my only alternative.

On the evening of March 12th I received a polite invitation from the Town Clerk requesting my presence at a meeting of the council to be held at his office at 8 p. m.

I appeared at the appointment, and without any knowledge of the object of the meeting, I was politely invited by the Town Clerk, acting as messenger from the Council to take a ramble for my health about the park, or wherever my fancy led me and return at the expiration of twenty minutes. I complied and upon my return was whisked into the presence of this august body. I was very kindly supplied with a chair, thanks to the efforts of Mr. Fish.

Questioned by his Worship as to whether I had accepted a commission on fixtures sold to the Corporation by W. A. Hickson, Park, Hennessy, R. H. Armstrong, and C. Mitchell, without hesitancy I replied that I had, I was immediately requested to resign without any chance for an explanation. After some small talk during which Aldermen Hickson and his violent, abusive and well known manner proceeded for the edification of the Council to relate some petty gossip and to indulge in generalities and personalities which were nothing but a tissue of falsehood; and of such small moment that it was a matter of great surprise to me that an astute and intelligent body of men such as the common council of the Corporation of Newcastle ought to be composed of should deem worthy of notice.

Please note copy of resolution passed by council at their January meeting.

On motion of Ald. Phinney seconded by Ald. Hennessy, it was resolved that the Town Clerk be directed to such time as the plant is ready for operation all necessary material to be supplied at cost and charges exclusive of fixtures. You will notice the wording of this resolution claim under the wording of this resolution a transaction of an entirely private nature; one that in no way concerned my duties as a public servant and one that in no way concerned the council as a body and one that they had nothing whatever to do with.

During the following few days after due deliberation and conversation with a number of members of Council, I found the matter had been misunderstood and requested a chance to make an explanation and enter a defence.

This was granted by Aldermen Fish, Phinney and Pelolin, signing a request to the Mayor to call a special meeting for that purpose, delivered by me personally to Mayor Morrison. I first requested Thursday evening, March 26th, on account of Mr. Ritchie's absence from town his return not being expected until that day. The Mayor replied that Tuesday evening March 24th was the latest evening that he could attend meeting, his duties as Mayor being pressing on that day. Under the circumstances I told him Tuesday would be satisfactory and left him with the understanding that meeting would be called for that night. It was however called Monday evening, I received no verbal or written notice and consequently was not present to enter my defence.

I came to Newcastle however on Tuesday and heard rumors that meeting had been held previous night. The Council was held to believe that I knew of the change. It is quite evident to me there is some trickery somewhere perhaps the gentleman who acted as prosecutor at last meeting did not want true facts known. In due justice to majority of Aldermen I desire to state that I think they were intentionally misled and misunderstood the case from the start.

Mr. Hickson stated he could have purchased fixtures personally at a discount the same as allowed me as commissioner. I would call your attention to the following correspondence.

The Country. An Epitome of Events Gathered by ADVOCATE Reporters

BATHURST.

Frosty nights and warm sunshine in the day time, special March weather, and the snow disappearing in the open very rapidly. At the same time there seems to be considerable snow yet remaining in the woods and the lumbermen who are getting ready for stream driving are confident of good doings when that anxious time arrives. As far as we can learn all the large operators in Gloucester, with perhaps the exception of the Tracadie Lumber Company, have completed their yard hauling. The latter firm having had such a splendid winter for logging found that they had to make a "big push" at the last to get all their logs to the streams. It is reported that some of the finest logs seen in Gloucester county for a number of years will be sawn by the fine brand saws of the Tracadie Mill at Shesha next summer, and with prizes as they are. This encouraging concern should make big money this year.

Besides the concerns, such as the Sumner Co., Adams Bros. & Co., The Tracadie Lumber Co., and John Robertson's of Carleton Place, who have all had most successful winter logging operations, the smaller firms such as Wm. O'Brien and Archibald Chapman, who are cutting for Mr. Matoney of Melrose, Westmorland County between Bathurst and New Bedford, Freeman Goodwin who has a rotary on the old Miramichi road near Bathurst, and the syndicate whose operations are managed by Messrs. Rogers & White near Middle river, have all had perfect success this winter. Then we hear no grumbling from Messrs. O. F. Stacy & Co. and other cedar men so we may safely conclude that the logging season just closing in Gloucester has been one of the best the operators have had since they began business. If, as is expected, the drives come in all right in due time it will mean a good thing not only for those actively engaged and interested financially in the lumber business but for the whole community.

It is reported that Doctor McNiel of Bathurst has purchased the corner lot known as the James Smith property and that he will commence at once to erect a residence for his own occupation on it.

Directly opposite the property mentioned is the lot rendered vacant by the disastrous fire last autumn, and on this the owners, Messrs. Holdengraber & Rosenberg are already laying the foundation of a large store which they hope to have ready for occupation in the early summer. Mr. Joseph Roy has the contract for the cellar and foundation and we hear that Mr. Joseph O. Blanchard has contracted for the carpenter work and building.

On the opposite corner directly across the street, Mr. James Howell is making preparations for either one or two buildings, possibly a large building for stores or offices, and a dwelling-house, so that the crossing of St. George and King

streets, Bathurst, will be a rather busy locality for several months. On the other corner of St. George street, opposite the brick residence of George Gilbert, Esq., we hear that Mr. O. F. Stacy is about commencing a spacious residence for his own use, having recently purchased the lot mentioned from the Flannery Estate.

There are rumors of other building operations in other parts of the town, and generally speaking carpenters and masons should not be idle during the summer.

It is reported that Mr. John Payne has leased or purchased the property known as the Foley House and after refitting it will, during the next few months, engage in the hotel business.

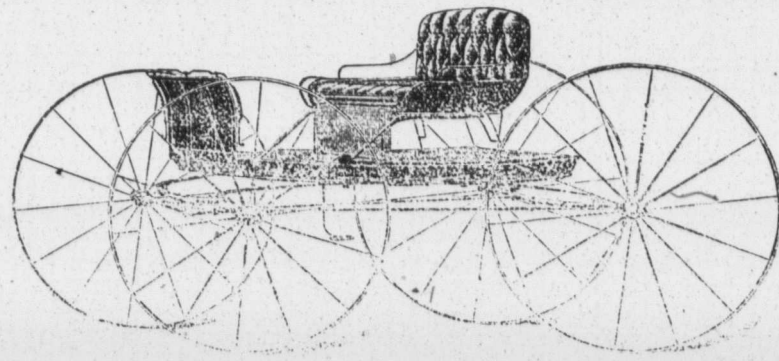

DOMINION PARLIAMENT. NINTH PARLIAMENT--- THIRD SESSION.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Ottawa, March 24.—In regard to the redistribution bill there are only two alternatives in New Brunswick, Restigouche and Gloucester, will be united, or Kings and Albert. Mr. Fielding announced today that the redistribution bill would be ready shortly.

In supply Col. Sam Hughes asked the minister of public works to consider the idea of preserving Fort LaTour at the mouth of the St. John River as a public park, on account of its historical value. Mr. Sutherland said he would look into this.

Mr. Geoffrion introduced a bill to increase guaranteed stock of the Grand Trunk on approval of the shareholders.

Doctor Roddick gives notice of motion for establishment of a Dominion board of health to be administered under one of the existing departments of the government.

Mr. Bell (Pictou) moved the following resolution: "That, in the opinion of this House, there is no justification for the application of the diseased animals' act of Great Britain to Canadian cattle. The Canadian cattle at the time of the passing of the said act, and ever since, have been free from all contagious diseases. The House is of the opinion that the application of the said act to Canadian cattle has an injurious effect upon the cattle trade of this country. This House regrets that the representative of Canada at the colonial conference utterly failed to obtain any redress or promise of redress for this grievance. This House further regrets that this government has not succeeded by more vigorous protests or by other effective steps in finding means to obtain the removal of the unjust restrictions of the said of Canadian cattle in Great Britain."

Mr. Fielding said the time was not favorable for such a resolution. In the first place it was a vote of want of confidence in the government and upon these grounds it could not be accepted. In the second place a resolution for papers on the subject was passed by the House a few days ago and until they were produced so that it might be seen what the government had done, it would not be right to pass Mr. Bell's motion.

Dr. Eproule said Mr. Bourassa had introduced a similar resolution last year under precisely similar circumstances, and it had been received without a protest. The government had sought shelter behind ridiculous reasoning.

Mr. MacLean accused the government of utter lack of interest in the rights of Canadians in this matter.

Mr. McGrain declared the resolution was being met in a high handed manner, and demanded some better explanation than that given.

Sir W. Laurier claimed the government had done its best to have the question of the cattle embargo considered at the conference.

ence, but as it was only of interest to Canada it had to be referred to the board of agriculture. He asked to have the question laid over until the papers were brought down. He claimed the resolution was too drastic.

Mr. Tarte supported Mr. Bell's claims that the British authorities were treating Canadians unfairly, but he claimed that the government had done its best in the matter. One lesson to be learned was that Canada should look after her own interests, as John Bull was doing in this case.

Messrs. Sheritt, Cargil, McGowan, Boyd, Clancy, Hughes, Ingraham, Roche and Hackett also spoke against the government's policy.

After further discussion at the suggestion of Mr. Haggart, Mr. Bell withdrew his amendment to supply.

Mr. Fielding stated that the budget would not be taken up on Thursday.

The house went into supply and took up consideration of votes for public buildings. The grant for public buildings in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia caused a lot of discussion. It was ascertained that \$23,874 was already expended on the new custom house at Halifax. Mr. Sutherland asked for a new vote of \$60,000, which passed. A vote of \$1,500 for quarantine station passed.

There was a discussion on the item of \$8,000 for water service, drainage and heating in connection with the quarantine station at St. John. Messrs. Monk and Casgrain opposed the item on the ground that more information was wanted. Mr. Sutherland explained the matter fully, pointed out that the amount was for finishing the works. Mr. Blair showed the necessity for providing water for the quarantine station and the difficulties that had already been experienced in endeavoring to get water. Now it was found necessary to get it from the city. An engagement was made with the city.

Mr. Tarte explained that the proposed arrangement was a good one, but on account of factious opposition to the item it was decided by the minister to hold it over until a detailed statement was got from the government.

The items for \$100,000 for Restigouche public buildings, \$12,000 for St. John immigration building and \$3,000 for Dominion buildings were passed.

The item, St. John Dominion buildings, was also allowed to stand over.

Richibucto got \$10,000 for its new public building.

For Dominion buildings for the Maritime Provinces generally \$12,000 was voted.

The House then took up the Quebec votes, and strong objection was made to the public works department carrying on work without tender. Another feature condemned was the indiscriminate advertising when a small amount of work was to be done.

Mr. Haggart read newspaper summary of the speech delivered by Sir William Mulock at the Young Liberals' banquet in Toronto Monday night, in which he said to have advocated public aid to the Grand Trunk or any line projected to unite eastern and western Canada, and running through the unsettled regions of Northern Ontario. Based on this Mr. Haggart asked what the policy of the government in reference to the transportation problem was: what assistance it would give the Grand Trunk or any other enterprise that proposed to open up the North west, and whether part or portion of any scheme was the building of a road from Quebec to connect with this important enterprise.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that he had not seen the report and did not know whether his colleague had been accurately reported or not, but the postmaster general would be able to speak for himself. "As to the rest of the question," the premier went on to say, "whenever the government has framed its policy it will submit it to parliament for decision. I think, and most of my colleagues do also, that it is their passing duty to have more communication between the east and the west."

EQUALITY OF RACES

MAY BE SO THEORETICALLY, BUT NOT REALIZED PRACTICALLY.

An Article From the London Express Which Will Cause Many Unprejudiced Canadians to Open Their Eyes Wide—The Color Line Problem Under the Free Union Jack.

Throughout the whole British Empire, wherever the white man is confronted by the black man en masse, the prejudice against the latter is bitter in the extreme.

The theory of equality, the "man and brother" doctrine, however beautiful it may appear on paper is absolutely unworkable in the practice of every-day life. We rule our dependencies—India, South Africa, the West Indies, Ceylon, Australia, the Straits Settlements—by a rigid enforcement of the superiority of the white man. And this is inevitable, and it is as necessary as it is inevitable.

We should not hold India for a day did we not realize and act up to the well-proved and absolutely undeniable fact that the white man, in all essentials, is immeasurably the superior of the black.

Of course, to the ignorant, untravelled sentimentalist this is appalling, and he will indignantly deny the truth of my assertion. To many an untravelled cockney the black man is as good as, if, indeed, he is not better than, the white man.

A Stern Duty.

But to the initiate, to the minority who know, as opposed to the unthinking majority who do not know, the suppression of the black man is a stern duty. Nothing, surely, is more remarkable than the dislike and distrust of the black which is invariably felt by the white when he encounters the former mass. There must be a reason for this.

Carlyle and Froude—the latter to me personally—both pronounced the emancipation of the slaves in America a very mixed blessing indeed. And certain it is that in the old days the condition of things between white and black was infinitely happier and more desirable, safer and more natural, than it is to-day.

For one Legree there were a hundred owners who treated their slaves as friends more than servants; to-day there is nothing but hatred between the two.

In India, of course the line of demarcation is necessarily very rigid. We are in a minority, and if we are to keep the upper hand it is absolutely essential that white supremacy should be enforced, even at the sword's point.

THE GROWING TIME.

Immigrants Pouring into Canada by all Steamers

HALIFAX, March 29.—Saturday was the busiest day in the history of the steamship line. The Canadian, Carthagenian and Bavarian arrived and landed 3,282 passengers between sunrise and sunset.

Among those on board were 321 boys for Barnardo's Home, Toronto, and 43 for Stevenson's Home, Hamilton. She also brought two German bands, bound for Montreal.

The second and third class passengers are Irish and Scotch, and nearly all possessed of some means. They are bound to the northwest.

The Allan-Furness liner Carthagenian was 14 days on the passage. She had very rough weather the early part of the voyage, having almost a hurricane the third day out, with tremendous seas dashing over the vessel, and she made slow progress. She came south and passed several icebergs. Her passenger list totalled 638. Two hundred and twenty-five are second and 413 third class. They are mostly all English, with a sprinkling of foreigners.

The big Allan liner Bavarian, from Liverpool with mails arrived at 1 p. m. and took the berth vacated by the Canadian. She had a crowd on board of 125 cabin, 286 second and 1,128 steerage, a total of 1,537.

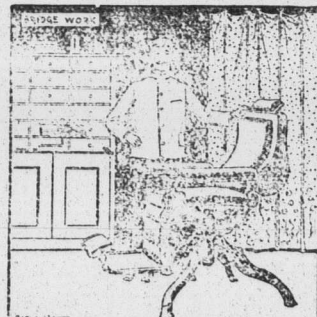
