## GOOD REASONS TO PASS BILL

Daylight Saving Bill Means Go to Bed  
Earlier and Get up Earlier Thus  
Wasting No Daylight.

BETTER FOR ALL CLASSES.

OTTAWA, Mar. 20.—It is said that the members of the Dominion Parliament do not seem to regard very seriously Mr. Lewis' bill to save daylight. Perhaps they have not realized what it means. It will appear a measure of folly if attention is concentrated on the mere moving forward of the hands of the clock, but when one realizes that not merely the hands of the clock, but the whole business of the country is to be moved forward, so that men who get out of bed at 7 o'clock in the morning will rise at 6, and quit work at 5 in the evening, instead of 6, the merits of the daylight saving bill become clearer. In England, it is almost a certainty that the bill will pass, and there would seem to be equally good reasons for trying the experiment here.

**Early to Rise**  
A bill to make people get up earlier in the morning and go to bed earlier at night, and depriving them of that virtuous feeling at present inseparable from these performances. This would be a cumbersome but explanatory name for Mr. Lewis' bill, and such a description should ensure its triumph. The bill, however, is not so simple. The originator of the daylight saving idea must be recognized in Mr. Wm. Willett, of Slough, London. Although no doubt there will be other claimants for the honor over the scheme proves a success. It was Mr. T. F. Fenn, M. P., who brought the bill before the British House, but let us salute Mr. Willett as the true father of the plan, and hear what he has to say about it. In a very interesting pamphlet, entitled "A Waste of Daylight," he says: "For nearly half the year, the sun is upon the land each day while we are asleep, and is rapidly nearing the horizon, having already passed its western limit, when we are wakened by the work of the day is over."

**Wasted Light**  
Now, he says, if some of the hours of wasted daylight in Spring, Summer and Autumn could be withdrawn from the beginning and added to the end of the day, how many advantages would be gained by all and in particular by those who spend in the open air, when light permits them to do so.

## MR. HAZEN HAVING UNPLEASANT TIME IN LEGISLATURE

Hon. Mr. Robinson and Hon. Mr. McKeowan Rub it into  
the Premier Who Already Shows Signs of  
Losing His Temper.

FORESHADOWED COMING LEGISLATION.

FREDERICTON, Mar. 19.—The debate on the address took up the whole day of the legislature this afternoon, and session and threats to drag along another whole day. Premier Hazen took up most of the time with a lengthy and somewhat labored defence of the government from Mr. Robinson's criticisms. His remarks being punctuated at times by sharp display of temper. In conclusion he gave brief outline of some of the more important government legislation for the session, promising further reduction in school books, a medical commission to study the best methods of combating tuberculosis and announcing the government's intention of guaranteeing the bonds of the Drummonds to assist in the construction of a road to the Gloucester iron mines. He intimated that the proposed amendment to the Liquor License Act would consist of a clause allowing a community to reject license by a majority of the voters cast instead of a majority of the whole number of voters as at present. Speaking of the agricultural policy he referred vaguely to projected improvements but gave no hint of their nature.

**Evening Baseball**  
It is a regrettable fact that in Canada we hardly ever have time for any sort of athletic games or contests in the evening, except of the "scrub" or practice variety. Saturday afternoon is dedicated to them, or the time is stolen from the middle of some other afternoon. Those who would prefer to employ the end of the day in gardening, or in some other outdoor occupation in mere pleasant gossip with friends or in sheer bodily quiescence, would greatly prefer that all these recreations should be carried out in the daylight, rather than in black darkness. If they could begin work an hour earlier and finish an hour earlier, the extra evening hour would be found for them. It can all be done by shifting the hands of the country's clock.

**Saving Money, Too**  
The more daylight we save, the more gas, electricity and coal oil we save. We will gain an extra hour of darkness in bed, and thus save the artificial light necessary for the illumination of seven hours a week. This should work as a reduction of one-third for the summer months, and we would not have to make it up again when clocks are set back an hour in September. It is to be hoped that Parliament will take Mr. Lewis' bill seriously, for it deserves intelligent consideration, at least.

## ITALIAN DREW KNIFE IN FIGHT

SENT UP FOR TRIAL.

What might have terminated in a serious row, and probably murder, was happily averted when Chief Crawford arrested two Italians at the St. Onge Hotel early Saturday afternoon. As it was, one man, Peter DeGrace, was stabbed on the arm and received a nasty cut. The trouble arose in the bar. One of the Italians and a young man named Wm. Landon got into an altercation in reference to the merits of an Italian or a Frenchman, and soon both were in fighting trim. There were a number of men in the bar, friends of both the scrappers. The stabbing took place after the men had been ordered out of the house. It appears from the evidence that Vincenzo Ulisse was the name of the son of Italy which did the stabbing, and that Peter DeGrace, in endeavoring to separate the contestants was the man to get cut. Another Italian is charged with having drawn his knife, but was prevented from using it. Quite a crowd gathered when attracted Chief Crawford, who went and arrested both Italians and took them to the lockup. They appeared before acting Police Magistrate A. E. G. McKenzie, and the one who was accused of doing the stabbing was sent up for trial. The other man was allowed to go as nothing was proved against him. Witnesses stated that the Italian made a savage thrust at DeGrace and but for a quick action on his part by guarding his breast with his arm, he would undoubtedly have received a bad wound. The Italians quartered here have thus far proved to be a quiet lot, and this is the first trouble they have been mixed up in. Citizens should refrain from aggravating them, as they are not bloodied and quick tempered and under violent impulses they might do injury in such scraps.

**BETTER SCHOOLS NEEDED.**

FREDERICTON, Mar. 19.—Dr. J. W.  
Robertson of the McDonald College at  
St. Ann's was the speaker at a largely  
attended meeting under the auspices of  
the Farmers and Dairywomen's Associa-  
tion in the parliament building this  
evening. In the absence of Governor  
Tweedie, Premier Hazen presided and  
many members of the legislature and  
of the city teaching staff were in the  
audience.

Dr. Inch was first called upon and  
told of what he had done in the public  
schools of the province to impart know-  
ledge on subjects pertaining to agri-  
culture.

Charles Jones, who was next called  
upon, strongly advocated the estab-  
lishment of an agricultural department  
at the university.

Premier Hazen, in introducing Dr.  
Robertson, spoke very highly of his  
work in the branch of agriculture and edu-  
cation.

In his opening remarks Dr. Robert-  
son returned thanks for the privilege  
of addressing two parliaments, a polit-  
ical parliament and a farmers' parlia-  
ment, institutions which he regarded  
as both of the first importance. He  
went on to say that New Brunswick  
should have the first claim upon the  
thought of every man in the province.  
and he called were answered in an  
intelligent manner the community and  
the province would be repaid in abun-  
dantly. The cause of the land was of  
great importance, not only to the man  
of today, but to the man of the future.  
All should strive to make New Brun-  
swick a land of happy homes and con-  
tented people.

The Farmer's God's Father  
He reminded that the call of Cana-

ady, he said, meant the call to a great  
land of liberty.  
After an able denunciation of the term  
agriculture the speaker declared that  
the man with the hoe was God's part-  
ner and was making God's earth bet-  
ter for human habitation. Conditions  
which provoke a feeling of hostility be-  
tween residents of the city and the  
country should not be tolerated. There  
should be good will and the one class  
should not infringe upon the rights of  
the other. His advice to all was not  
to be in too great a hurry to get some-  
thing that would not help them, es-  
pecially if they had to move a little of  
their interest to get it. A mixed crop  
of apprehension and toleration will find  
a good return, and it is important that  
all the people of mixed races should  
differ in the right spirit.

Dr. Robertson spoke of the great im-  
portance of the farming industry to  
Canada, and quoted statistics to show  
that in magnitude it surpassed all  
other industries. The value of New  
Brunswick's crops last year, he said,  
was eleven and one half millions, but  
by adopting methods employed on a  
farm at McDonald College the same  
advantage could be made to produce  
crops worth twenty millions. He did  
not know of any easier way for New  
Brunswick to pick up ten million dol-  
lars per year than by improving farm  
methods.

When he first joined the agricultural  
department at Ottawa the total specu-  
lation for the work in which he was  
engaged was \$20,000 and last year it  
was \$25,000.

The Needs of the Farmer  
an impressive manner the speaker  
declared that the call of the land was  
for better schools and better homes.  
Often instead of expending \$150 on a  
new house, a farmer would better be  
first to expend the amount in providing  
a good water supply for his home. Good  
water and plenty of sunlight were es-  
sential for the farmer.
