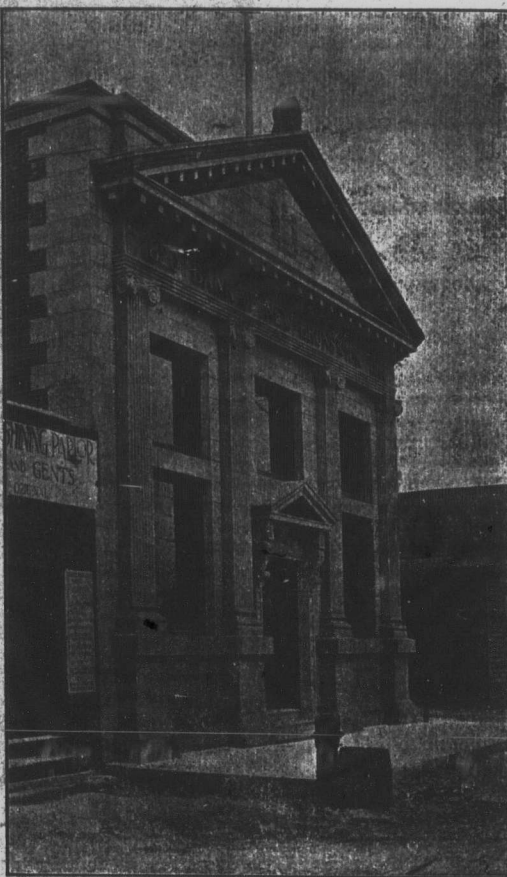

The Directors beg to present to the Shareholders the following Report and
Statements for the year ending 31st December, 1911.

The Net Profits for the year, after making full provision for Interest on
Deposits, Rebate on Current Discounts, and for all bad and doubtful debts,
amount to \$147,622.72. Out of this Quarterly Dividends at the rate of 13 per
cent, per annum have been declared, amounting in all to \$113,543.25. To
the Rest Account has been added \$20,000, and to the Officers Pension Fund
has been contributed \$5,000. The balance of \$2,080.47 has been added to the
Profit and Loss Account.

The Rest Account has been further increased by the addition of \$337,985,
being the premium on new Capital Stock, sold and issued during the year.

The whole of the Bank's authorized Capital has now been taken up, and
the Bank has acquired a large number of new Shareholders.

Branches of the Bank have been opened at Haymarket Square, St. John;
at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, and at Montreal, A Branch will be opened at
Clark's Harbour, Nova Scotia, in the near future.

All the branches have been inspected during the year, and independent
Chartered Accountants have certified to the correctness of the Balance Sheet.

LABOR CO-PARTNERSHIP

The Labor Co-partnership Association now embraces 111 societies in Great Britain. The aggregate capital of these workmen's societies is approximately \$10,000,000 and their trade amounts to nearly \$22,000,000 a year. The last return shows that \$131,395 was divided among the workers as their share of the profits.—Fredericton Mail.

PROFITS IN APPLE GROWING

Before the St. John Board of Trade on the 9th inst., A. G. Turney showed what profits can be made in apple growing in New Brunswick and at the close of his lecture ten members subscribed \$1,000 to start an experimental orchard for illustration purposes near the city. The Department of Agriculture decided last spring to take hold of three orchards under average conditions and show what could be done. The orchard in Sunbury county, containing 11-3 acres, showed a net profit of \$96.15, or \$57.69 per acre. On a valuation of \$400 per acre this would be 14 per cent. Next year the profits should be one-third greater. On 14 acres at Douglas, York Co., there was a profit of \$136, or \$89 per acre. The largest of their orchards, including eight acres, was located in Albert county. On three acres they showed a profit of \$545, or \$181 per acre. He regarded this as the maximum for this orchard and the average would be about \$125 per acre. On the balance of the orchard, five acres produced a profit of \$725, or \$145 per acre.

New Brunswick Girl Is Missing.

Scrimville, Mass., Jan. 13.—Jennie B. MacKuzie has disappeared from her home, 60 Somerville avenue. She left her place of employment at the L. M. Starr & Co., candy manufacturers, on Holland street, Scrimville, telling some of her shopmates that she was going to Bangor. While only twelve years of age, the girl is "extremely large." Her father is dead and her mother is in New Brunswick. She originally came from New Brunswick. The girl received \$4.50 a week and this is the only money she is known to have when she left the factory. She carried away two or three extra dresses she had. She is of medium complexion and has light hair. All Greater Boston police have been notified.

Ohio To Have New Constitution

Taxation and Liquor Laws to be Provided for And Direct Legislation Adopted.

Columbus Ohio, Jan. 9.—The one hundred and nineteen delegates selected at the November election to frame a new Constitution for the State of Ohio assembled today to organize in preparation for the important task before them. It is expected that four or five months, will be required to complete the Constitution.

Three big issues will occupy much of the attention of the convention. These are liquor legislation, taxation and the initiative and referendum. The last mentioned probably will be subjected to an even more severe fire than either of the other two owing to the feeling that has already been manifested by both sides.

Sixty-one of the 119 delegates are pledged in writing for the initiative and referendum, with the following percentages: not more than 12 per cent of the electors for the submission of constitutional amendment; not more than 10 per cent for the submission of other initiative measures, and not more than 8 per cent for referendum petitions. Several of the delegates are pledged to the principles of the initiative and referendum without specific percentages.

AUSTRALIA WILL BE CONSULTED MORE IN FUTURE

Earl Dudley Speaks of Commonwealth's Future Place in British Empire

London, January 10.—The Earl of Dudley, late Governor-General of Australia, speaking at the Royal Colonial Institute, said that the Federation had enormously facilitated and improved the scheme for Imperial defence, adding that there was little doubt that in future years the Imperial Government would consult Australia more regarding foreign affairs.

He denied that he had ever thought Australian politics corrupt, and said that, on the contrary, he thought it one of Australia's proudest boasts that she had so completely maintained the purity of her service.

For her own safety, Earl Dudley concluded, it was desirable that the Commonwealth have a larger population.

All Donkshobors May Leave Canada

Los Angeles, January 12.—The entire colony of Donkshobors, consisting of about 12,000 professedly philosophic anarchists, soon will be moved to Southern California from Saskatchewan, according to Russians here.

Mr. A. P. Cherkov, editor of a Russian paper, who made a report of the Donkshobors for the late Count Tolstoy, who aided them in leaving Russia, is the leading spirit of the movement.

CHANGE IN NUMBERING

I. O. R. ENGINES

A most important change has been made in the numbering of all engines owned by the I. O. R., and in future the relative merits of an engine can be told by its number. The changing of the numbers was started last week and this will be kept up until they are all finished. All consolidated freight engines will run from 100 to 400. Engines of the Pacific type will run from 400 to 600. Large ten wheeled passenger engines will run from 600 to 800, while shuttle engines of the large type will run from 800 to 1000. Old engines that are used in the different yards along the road for shunting will be numbered from 1000 upwards. Engineers consider this a wise move and by looking at the number on the different engines one can readily tell as to their value.

SEED GRAIN AND POTATOES

Distribution From the Dominion Experimental Farms in 1912.

By instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution will be made during the coming winter and spring of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers. The samples for general distribution will consist of spring wheat (5 lbs.), white oats (4 lbs.), barley (5 lbs.), and field peas (3 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free, by mail.

Applicants should give particular regard to the soil on their farms, and should also state what varieties they have already tested and in what way these have been found unsatisfactory, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be sent. Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample can be sent to each farm. Applications on any kind of printed or written form cannot be accepted.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappointment. No applications can be accepted after Feb. 15th.

All applications for grain (and applications from the provinces of Ontario and Quebec for potatoes) should be addressed to: the Dominion Cereals, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no postage.

Applications for potatoes, from farmers in any other province should be addressed (postage prepaid) to the Superintendent of the nearest Branch Experimental Farm in that province.

EATING MACHINES Will Be Great Factors in Future Wars

There is no doubt that in the next great war, the eating machine will be as well on hand and as important a factor in the outcome of the conflict as the modern tank or the aeroplane. The modern tank is a creature of huge and costly machines rather than of men. Victory depends more upon the skill of the men in the cockpit than upon the prowess of the men on the ship.

In the air fight, the flying machine will be as important a factor as the tank. The flying machine can carry only a few men. It is not costly, probably a thousand machines could be built and equipped for war at considerably less cost than one Dreadnought. Much will depend upon whether the guns of the great warship on the water can reach the small and cheap rival in the air.

Perhaps the first battle in the air took place the other day, when a well-known French aviator was attacked by an eagle and escaped with some difficulty. However, before this happened Hubert Latham had started French sportsmen by shooting wild ducks from his monoplane. He was with him for the purpose of shooting from above at a game preserve, but sighting a flock of ducks about a mile over the ocean, he turned his flying machine seaward and started in pursuit. The following description of the "ducks" flew their way, the flock dividing the two parts. Latham, however, was able to outfly them, to fly all around them in fact, and succeeded in bringing down one of the birds. The remarkable part of this feat is that the airplane had to be guided without hands for the moment necessary to aim and fire. It is claimed that the aviator is the only airplane which can be left without control of the aviator's hands for that purpose.

We may yet have to make laws to protect the birds against the airplane.

WISE IN THE FACE OF DEATH

Walter L. Smith was in a town in his district one night when a mob gathered about the jail for the purpose of lynching two colored men. Mr. Smith heard of what was going on, and mounting the jail steps, he made an impassioned plea to the mob to disperse and not bring discredit on the name of their town through "lynching." His plea was effective and the negroes were freed.

A few weeks after that he revisited the town. At that time there was a movement to build an asylum for the blind. In opening his speech, which was the beginning of his joint debate with a Democratic orator, Mr. Smith said that the purpose to build the asylum was so wise and so humane that the Republicans of the county invited the Democrats to join with them in raising enough money to make the "project" feasible.

"I distrust Mr. Smith's remarks about the asylum," said the Democratic fulminator in answering Smith's speech. "He makes political capital out of everything. We Democrats might give our money for that building and wake up to find that the Republicans claimed all the credit for it."

"Why, look what Mr. Smith said in making his speech to save the lives of the two colored men from 'lynching' a few weeks ago. His remarks were eloquent. They were great. They carried his point. But here is how he wound up:

"Shoot—shoot," said this bald head of mine. "I don't care those two colored men for the Republican party!"

An Unconscious Joke

"Mr. Lloyd George was once speaking at a Liberal meeting of the unfulfilled prophecies and promises of a certain statesman, and quite accidentally he stretched his arm right over the head of Sir Jeremiah Colman, one of the local pillars of Liberalism, who was sitting close to him on the platform. "We have had enough of those political jeremiads," he cried out. The audience rose to the joke, and laughed and clapped vociferously.

And, perhaps for the first time in his life, the venerable Welshman stood completely nonplussed, for it was not until the meeting was over that he found out where the humour had come in."

"A man who has once murdered the Queen's English always feels as if he'd got the body under the sofa. It's like homicidal mania; the poor wretch may be cured, but he lives in terror of an attack returning. BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK

As it approaches the centenary of its existence, with a record of which the shareholders and the citizens of St. John generally may well be proud, the Bank of New Brunswick continues to grow more prosperous and to become more valuable to this community, and also to other communities in the Maritime Provinces. A very satisfactory condition of affairs was disclosed at the annual meeting of the shareholders today. Notwithstanding the keen competition in the banking business, the profits of the Bank of New Brunswick last year were \$147,622.32, an increase over the earnings in 1910. The rest is now \$1,790,000, instead of \$1,405,025 the sum of \$384,975 being contributed to the premium on new capital stock. The total deposits are \$7,288,943.73, an increase of \$213,936.17 compared with the previous year. After paying a dividend of thirteen per cent, placing \$26,990 in the rest account, and giving \$5,000 to the officers pension fund, there was a balance of \$2,089,48 to add to profit and loss account. This is a cheerful statement for persons having money invested in this bank.

We shall readily recognize the shoals rocks and quick sands which brought grief last year when our frail craft came in contact with them and we resolve with God's help to avoid them on this way which we have not passed heretofore. Perhaps the scars are still visible from our last year's encounter with the wolf. It may have been in sheep's clothing. We must forget these and fling wide the portals of the soul and let the Christ-man's spirit in resign to be guiding to the sure Pilot who will bring the craft into the sure haven there to rest for evermore.

WHAT BECOMES OF OLD BOOTS!
What becomes of old boots and shoes has hitherto been almost as puzzling a problem as what becomes of all the pins. The solution, however, is given in a trade journal. "Old boots and shoes of leather," the journal says, "are cut up into small pieces, and then are put for two days into chloride of lime, the effect of which is to make the leather very hard and brittle. When this is fully effected the material is withdrawn from the action of the chloride of lime, washed with water, dried and ground to powder. It is then mixed with some substance that will cause it to adhere together, such as shellac or other resinous material, or even a good glue, and a thick solution of strong gum. It is afterward pressed into moulds to form combs, buttons and a variety of other useful articles. "Prussiate of potash is also made out of old leather heated with persulfate and old iron hoops in a large pot. The nitrogen and carbon form cyanogen, and then unite with the iron and potassium. The soluble portions are dissolved out, and the resulting salt, added to one of iron, produces the well-known Prussian blue, either for dyeing purposes or for use as a pigment."

MEXICO FOR THE MEXICANS

Under New Government English Language to be Eliminated

One cause of the recent uprisings in Mexico was found in the extent to which the resources of the country had been exploited by foreigners for the benefit of the foreigners. Under the new government an attempt is apparently to be made to secure a share of the profits from these resources for the Mexican people, among other things railways, which have heretofore been operated largely by men from the United States and Canada, are to be operated by natives. As part of this movement a convention of railway men from all parts of Mexico has been called to meet in the City of Mexico next month to devise the most effective plan to abolish the foreign languages on the railways. When it is remembered that on account of the employment of so many American locomotive engineers and conductors on the National lines and other roads, train orders are given in English, this movement has an ominous look. It is further declared that "the convention will have a political side, and railway men will select their presidential candidate and support him in a body."

Police Rather Than Soldiers.
It has been revealed in the British Parliament how the English avoid the stigma of sending troops to quell rioters. Learning that 600 London policemen had been despatched to Hull to fight off seamen strikers there, Mr. Hardie asked the Prime Minister by what right such a thing was done, and further asked why the London taxpayers ought to pay the salaries of policemen doing duty in other parts of the Kingdom. The answer was a confession. It was to the effect that throughout the British Isles there is a mutual exchange of policemen. Whenever there is a strike on the city streets, calls upon one of its neighbors for aid. The Government encourages this and detrays part of the expense. It looks better to send policemen than to send soldiers.

Lord Aberdeen's Share.
Lord Aberdeen, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and a former Governor-General of Canada, is one of the three or four richest Peers in Great Britain. But he lives unostentatiously and when travelling between London and his Scotch estate he always takes a single berth in an ordinary sleeper. One morning, just as the train was rolling into York, a stranger leaned across a seat back and enquired of Lord Aberdeen:
"May I ask whether you are Lord Aberdeen?"
"Yes, I am Lord Aberdeen," was the answer.
"You're one of the wealthiest men in England, aren't you?"
"Why," smiled the Peer, "I am pretty well off."
"Well, your Lordship," said the stranger, "Permit me to inform you that I slept next to you last night, and if I had your money and your snore, I'd take a whole car when I wanted to travel at night."

Mohammedanism in the Sudan.
Dr. Karl Kumm, an adventurous missionary explorer, who has lately returned to Johannesburg after a journey across the Sudan from the Nile to the Nile, has created some sensation by a series of lectures on the inroads which Islam is making in the Sudan. He says that a considerable number of Mohammedan students are being sent into the Sudan from Cairo to Islamize the people, who are regarded as the best negro fighting population in the world.
Illustrating his contention that but little is generally known of Sudan affairs Dr. Kumm mentioned the recent liberation of 200,000 slaves in one district alone as the result of the intrusion of European Powers, stating that it was an event which had hitherto not been published.
Dr. Kumm said that the useless counteracting Christianizing influence were forthcoming all over the Sudan. Islam must become a great menace to southern as well as to northern Africa.

Gaining Experience.
Before one of the present Bishops was elevated to his see a prominent part of his work was that in connection with the missions, in which ambulance lessons were held and the members taught to render "first-aid." One day an elderly woman asked him if he could persuade her husband to join the ambulance classes, to keep him out of the public-house.
The reverend gentleman said he would try, and after some trouble he succeeded in persuading the "hubby" in question to join the ambulance class.
Some weeks after the clergyman met the woman, and asked her how her husband liked the classes.
"Oh, he's taken to it, he's not known since," she said, "he's no class to go to he stays at home and bandages the cat!"

Sabbath Description.
Bishop John L. Nielsen, in an address in Omaha, said of intolerance: "These intolerant people make me think of young Parson Brownlow. Parson Brownlow, one Sunday morning, was passing a pond when a young woman went through the ice. The parson, a good swimmer, plunged into the cold black water promptly, and after a deal of diving and floundering and struggling, he managed to rescue the two boys. He held their limp forms on the bank made by him and then he began to work their arms vigorously, as to restore animation, when a deep, respectful voice cried from the road: "Parson! He looked up and beheld the frowning visage of Deacon Jones. "Parson," said the deacon, "this day shall thou labor!"

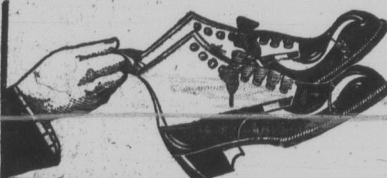

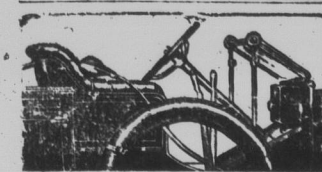

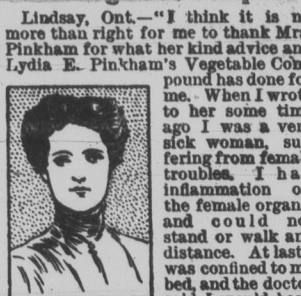

POINCARÉ NEW
PREMIER OF FRANCE

Revelations Regarding Ministerial In-
trigues Follow the Fall of Premier
Caillaux.

Paris, January 13.—M. Poincaré
today, announced his acceptance
of the invitation to form the new
ministry.

Sensational revelations, laying
bare many ministerial intrigues
have followed the fall of Premier
Caillaux. These it is asserted, are
based on official documents, and
therefore presumably emanate
from friends of the ex-foreign
minister, Mr. Deselves.

One story is to the effect that
the newspaper, the Temps or at
least prominent members of its
staff, took part in the conduct of
the negotiations with Germany
and this merely for private finan-
cial reasons.

Over the signature of Andre
Morizet, Mr. Jaures's Socialist
paper, Humanite, prints a particu-
larly direct statement to this effect.
It is headed, "The financial interest
underlying the negotiations."

Mr. Morizet begins by declaring
that the foreign editor of the
Temps, the Paris representative of
the Congo Kamerun Railway, the
Berlin correspondent of the Temps,
and Herr Semir chief of the Ger-
man colonial party, and a deputy
in the Reichstag, "conducted the
negotiations from beginning to
end" adding:

"It is M. Tardieu, who in his
newspapers has constantly put the

screws on successive ministers, and
he, not the shadow of M. Pichon,
the daily inspiration of the mini-
stry until the day when foreign
minister himself had to denounce
him before the Senate. Hunted
from Quai d'Orsay, has he not been
under the Caillaux administration,
the confidant, and the familiar of
the whole ministry? Was it not
in connivance with him that over
the head of minister De Selves, M.
Caillaux has carried on all the
secret manoeuvres of the last
year?"

"Today there is a perfect under-
standing between the patriotic fin-
anciers. They have pulled off
their deal."

The directors of the LaForesters
which include the majority of the
Gongon companies, namely Senator
Fleg, Senator Mongeot, M. Lautier,
editor of the Temps, Albert and
Paul Motte, the Roubaix manufac-
turers and their colleagues have
just voted 70,000 of their com-
pany's shares payable after the
ratification of the agreement to a
group of German financiers. They
have just selected to join them on
the board two German directors,
Dr. Esser and Herr Von Puttkamer,
former governor of Kamerun.
This has been printed by a finan-
cial journal.

COLD WAVE
STRIKES THE NORTH

Northern I. R. C. Blocked 3 Days.

Roofs and Chimneys Blown
Down

A cold wave and heavy wind, which
in Campbellton and Northward
amounted to a blizzard struck the
North Shore and Gaspe peninsula on
the 9th and continued through the
next day. On Wednesday the snow
changed to rain on the Miramichi,
preventing further drifting. North-
ward the wind continued heavy that
day. The chimney of the Ferry
Road School house blew down on
Tuesday.

In Campbellton on the night of
the 9th, the wind blew with terrible
velocity, carrying away the roof of
James Alexander's concrete building
at the lower end of Water street and
hurled it eastward to Roxbury street,
a distance of 20 feet, and wrecking
telephone and telegraph wires in its
wild flight. Hugh drifts were every-
where in evidence. The storm tested
the memory of the oldest inhabitant
to furnish a parallel.

The I. R. C. between Campbellton
and Ste. Flavie was blocked by snow
last week from the 8th to the 12th.
No mail arrived here from farther
north than Campbellton on the 9th,
10th, 11th and 12th.

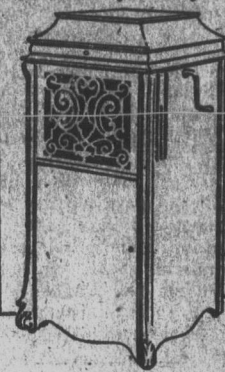
Thursday the Nova Scotia, Moncton

CONSUMPTION NOT DANGEROUS

If Proper Care is Taken it Can be Cured Without Spreading to Others--Directions For Consumptives.

Dr. Townsend of the Jordan Sanatorium at River Glade, Westmorland Co., spoke in Temperance Hall, New castle, Monday night on Tuberculosis. Mayor Pedolin occupied the chair. A wild storm raged outside, and the audience was much smaller than it would otherwise have been.

Dr. Townsend said that while children of consumptives inherited a predisposition to the disease, there was no proof that the disease itself was hereditary. The fact that so many people out of one family so often died in the same house was due rather to lack of care in looking after the patient and to lack of ventilation and fumigation.

The disease was infectious by means of the sputum spit or coughed out by the patient. All this should be gathered on paper handkerchiefs or in paper boxes and burned or in metal cups to be disinfected. A careful consumptive is no danger to anybody else, but a careless one will infect a whole family or neighborhood.

The speaker would not recommend change of climate for consumptives. The treatment needed was perfect ventilation and sunlight. People should sleep with windows open or in

open air. There should be open air schools for consumptive children. Those who follow the rules could be cured of consumption if not in its last stages. There was no need to be alarmed about it.

Consumption was, where care is being taken, not more than half as prevalent now as it was ten years ago.

There should be rigid inspection of factories, workshops, churches and schools etc., to see that rules of health, concerning fresh air, sunlight, fumigation etc., are properly carried out.

The speaker answered many questions. He was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.

Revs. Dr. Cousins, S. J. MacArthur, W. J. Dean and Col. Malby made short addresses.

Col. Malby said that, while the law required doctors to report cases of consumption to the Board of Health, he had not yet been notified of any cases.

The meeting decided to organize an anti-tuberculosis society, and Col. Malby, Dr. Pedolin and Rev. Mr. MacArthur were appointed a committee to further the plan.

\$350,000 Damage--Premier Corcoran's Law Library Burned--Herald Office Destroyed.

On Granville street--the tenants in The Herald building Canada Life Assurance Company, United States Consulate, Mark Fishers Sons & Company, The St. Croix Lumber Company, James F. Tobin, barrister, Confederation Life Assurance Company, Ritchie & Robertson, barristers, Travellers Insurance Company, John E. Albro, manufacturers agent, Miss M. Cunningham, stenographer, George E. Taylor & Company, commission merchants, D. M. Owen, solicitor, Captain S. H. Cardley, Insurance agent. The Halifax Herald and Mail newspapers lost everything but their files, correspondents, etc.

The total loss was about \$350,000, mostly covered by insurance. Premier Borden lost his valuable law library.

An Australian judge has ruled that a wife was justified in breaking the law by opening her husband's correspondence, because the letter she opened proved the correctness of her suspicions. Unfortunately, we are left in doubt as to what would have been the pronouncement had the letter in question proved the suspicion to be unfounded, and yet information of this point would be of far wider interest and importance. Altogether an exceptional proceeding, as we began by saying, and yet it is likely to be widely welcomed and quoted as a precedent for a prevalent habit.

Many wives indeed will deny that the habit needs any legal sanction. In all good faith they hold that it is a right bestowed upon them by marriage; that a husband's letters, or rather their contents, are part of the worldly goods with which he endows his spouse on their wedding day.

It is, after all, not a question of law or of right, but of private agreement, mostly tacit — at least after more or less argument. The habit is generally established in the golden days of the honeymoon, when the two are one and would have no secrets from each other; when the bridegroom is fondly anxious to let his bride read all that he does not tell her. Sometimes this habit is not established until later in life, when the sons leave home to stand on their own feet at college, or to try the strength of their young wings in the world without. But what there can be of undiminished interest to a wife in her husband's general correspondence is a puzzle that no man can solve. How many husbands by the way, would have enough curiosity to avail themselves of the privilege of reading their wives' correspondence, or even to ask for it? They are generally quite content with the snatches from it read to them across the breakfast table.
