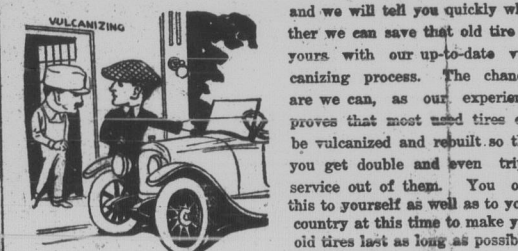

POLICE ORDER SHOW CLOSED

Royal Exposition Shows Closed
Down Tuesday Night—Trou-
ble in the Air.

The Royal Exposition Shows ad-
vertised to appear at Riverside Park
all this week under the auspices of
the Campbellton Fire Brigade arrived
in town Sunday evening and immedi-
ately proceeded to unload their
equipment. By Monday evening the
show was in full swing and was pa-
tronized by large crowds.

Because of the complaints of citi-
zens several features were closed
down because they were of an im-
moral nature, while others were ar-
ranged to cause operations because they
were gambling games.

Tuesday afternoon the management
had a meeting with the Police and
License Committee and agreed to
change certain acts and upon agree-
ment the show opened up Tuesday
night. The police were on hand, and
everything was running smoothly, but
it is said that when the police left
the former order of things prevailed
and everything was running wide open
when the police again came on the
scene and ordered the show closed.

Another stormy meeting was held
Wednesday, but by this time the Fire
Brigade, which had signed the con-
tract for the show, repudiated their
contract because of the nature of the
show and would have nothing further
to do with it, and the Police Commit-
tee would not again give permission
to open as the former agreement had
been broken, so no show was in pro-
gress last evening.

The manager held an open air
meeting at the grounds last evening
which was largely attended. He ex-
plained his side of the story very con-
vincingly and was loudly applauded.
He circulated a petition asking that
the Police Committee permit them to

complete their engagement, and this
was very largely signed.

The shows are along the lines of
those which usually appear at fairs
and exhibitions and are permitted in
most towns. The gambling devices
complained of were wheels of fortune
and the holders of lucky numbers re-
ceiving dolls. The immoral acts
where the usual course vaudeville and
no doubt should have been toned up
to a higher standard.

There is considerable criticism of
the town authorities for allowing this
show into town, but they say that
the interests of all were carefully
safeguarded by contract, which fully
covered the points of objection.

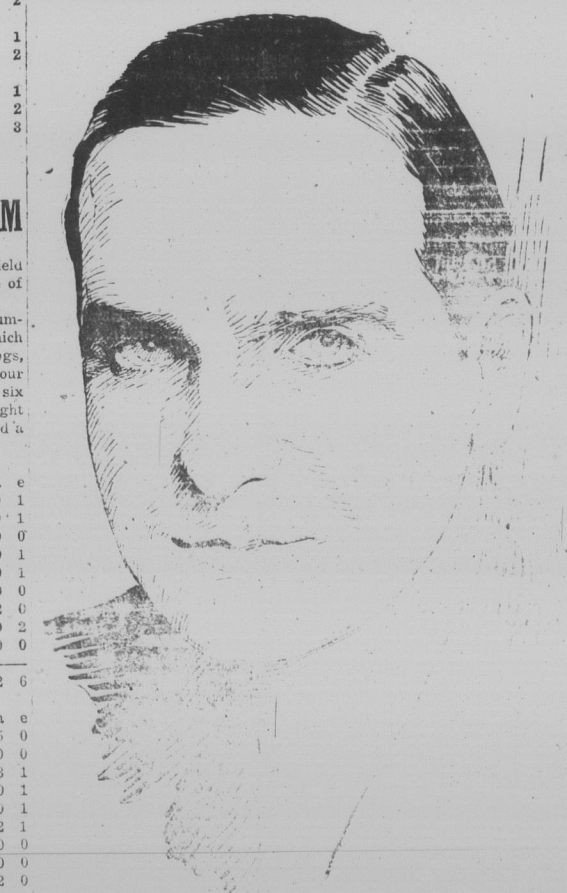
We understand that the manager of



Our Future King

It is due to no adventitious aid that the Prince of Wales has won his way to the hearts of the British people; it is because he has made this irrefutable appeal of frank, honest, unadorned, and generous youth to all true hearts. Modest and unassuming, notwithstanding his exalted state, he has never sought to obtrude himself, but his unadorned worth has, in spite of a seeming desire for self-effacement, become manifest, and it may be doubted if any prince in history has won greater regard from the masses of the people. The warm sentiment he has inspired is spontaneous and grows the stronger the better he is known. His war record proves that he is imbued with high courage and a strong sense of duty. Many pleasant incidents are related by returned soldiers of his kindly disposition, his sympathy and consideration, his good comradeship with British soldiers, and his willingness to share the hardships of a soldier's life. In contrast he has shown us to the principles of Germany, with its intolerance and wine like sons of Babel.

Two inestimable advantages he has certainly had, inasmuch as he comes of a very noble stock and his scrupulous training has been such as to bring out all that is best in him for the worthy fulfillment of his high destiny. His parents have ever been the exemplars of those kindly domestic virtues which we are proud to think flourish in British soil. Their great ideal has not been the splendours of a court, which may, incidentally, foster extravagance and folly, but the cultivation of the tranquil joys and graces of well-ordered family life, which is the true basis of a nation's worth.

The Prince of Wales was born at White Lodge, Richmond Park, on June 21, 1894. But his youth has been developed by many and varied experiences and a wide range of interests due to personal aptitudes, real hard work and the requirements of his high position. His serious and wholesome bent was early manifest, for at tender age he showed great interest in natural history, mechanics and wireless telegraphy. He was also a hero-worshipper, for whom the study of great men lives had a special fascination. Till the age of 16 he was educated at a naval cadet. Two years later he was transferred to Dartmouth, and in 1912 he became a full-fledged midshipman. His naval training, as the prior experience of King George had shown, was a grand preparation for the fuller life that becomes the heir apparent, and at the age of 17 he sailed to Paris for a year's study of the French language and political economy. In 1914 he entered as an undergraduate at Magdalen College, Oxford, where he remained for two years, attending lectures and devoting special attention to constitutional law.

The scope of his interests and activities already include scientific, charitable and social organizations, and it is ever widening. In May, 1919, he became a Freeman of the City of London and on June 2 he was installed with impressive ceremony, as Grand Master of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, who is now Sovereign of the Order, was himself, when Prince of Wales, installed Grand Master, just 15 years ago.

If the many demands on his time and attention preclude the indulgence of the horse, which he has loved so manifest in childhood Prince Edward has developed a great interest in the nation's warlike activities, and in his visits to industrial centres he has shown keen and appreciative interest in technical operations. Not only does he show a discerning and approving interest in the industrial developments on which more than ever, the prosperity of the country depends, but, like his parents, he is intensely concerned for the welfare of the workers—solidarity may be improved and their social status bettered. He has endeavored by personal visits to crowded areas to gain firsthand an intimate acquaintance with the lives of the masses, and wherever he has gone he has left indelible memories of unaffected goodwill and sympathy. Tributes to his worth and kindness are plentiful in districts where the very poorest live, for, if reticent himself, the objects of his regard are not to be silenced.

It was recently reported that through a motor accident a youth was knocked down, but, fortunately, not seriously injured, by the car in which the prince was seated, and that his Royal Highness was greatly moved by the regrettable mishap. He removed the injured lad to a hospital and remained there anxiously till assured that the sufferer was in no danger and would very soon be well. Later, when the youth was able to go out, the prince invited him to Buckingham Palace, and treated him like a dear friend and asked him what particular present he would prefer as a souvenir. The lad replied that he would most appreciate a wrist-watch, and the prince assured him that his wish would be promptly gratified.

That reported incident is but one of the many that have never found publicity, proving beyond question that the prince is distinguished by very fine qualities and a noble character. A true gentleman himself, he is extraordinarily susceptible to the courtesy and consideration of others—all the more if these are displayed by humble folk as many soldiers and civilians can vouch. In these cases he is genuinely touched and his eager responsiveness leaves no doubt as to his gratification.

SUSPECTS TORTURED.

Japanese Have Trouble in Subduing Korea.

"The efforts of the new Japanese Administration of Korea to recover the confidence of the Korean people are largely nullified by official mistreatment of Koreans," says the Tokio correspondent of the London Express.

"While the use of paddles and flogging is publicly abolished by the Government, police officials regularly use torture upon the suspects."

The following particulars of the methods employed are furnished by Dr. Frank Schofield, of the Severance Mission Hospital, Seoul:

"Case 1.—An educated young man, punished with 50 blows of the paddle for complicity in the independence movement, and released after six weeks' imprisonment, was re-arrested and questioned with regard to the bomb that was thrown at Admiral Saito. During the police examination he was seven times suspended from the ceiling by a cord tied around his wrists; on five occasions his head was forced back and tied to his hands, which had been fastened behind his back; water was poured down his nostrils off and on during a period of four days, and for a further period of three days sleep and water were substituted for plain water.

As a last expedient in this man, pepper was used; the result was so severe that the young man became unconscious. All these methods having failed, the police ordered his toe nails to be extracted. The Korean torturer, instead, pulled out a piece of flesh from the inside of the small toe, which caused profuse bleeding and satisfied the police.

"Case 2.—A young man charged with printing the 'Independence' newspaper, refused to give the names of his accomplices. He was beaten unconscious three times in six days and once by hot irons. When seen by the doctor he was a shivering wreck.

"Case 3.—A Korean young woman, also educated, was beaten so violently over the head that an abscess formed in one ear, and her knee and hip joints were twisted to the verge of dislocation. She was 'thoroughly spat upon.'"

"One result of such methods is naturally the production of false evidence and the prosecution of innocent people. Another is the creation of a conviction in the Korean mind that promises of reform are far from consummation only and that there is no hope of their condition being ameliorated under Japanese rule. Such are the evil results of tea years of military rule."

"Paper Silk" of Japan.

Millions of yards of a new kind of paper fabric are being manufactured in Japan. It is a composition of paper and silk and is called "paper silk," suitable for making blouses, sheets and other dress material.

It looks like mercerized cotton at its best, and can be used for all sorts of wearing apparel. It is estimated that the stuff can be put upon the English market at only 12 cents per yard.

A London merchant who has had twenty years' experience of Japanese imports declared that Japan's manufacturers are laying themselves out with the greatest success to beat the cheap goods of the Germans.

Tons of celluloid goods now come to Europe from Japan, which at one time flooded Great Britain from Germany. The secret of this is that the Japanese have the greatest available supplies of carborundum, which is so largely used in the production of celluloid material.

Many other goods which were formerly unobtainable are now forthcoming, since great quantities of producing plant and machinery have been hid down.

Discounts.

There are some singular discounts allowed in the book trade. They were happily illustrated on one occasion by Mark Twain. One day, while the humorist was connected with a publishing house, he went out to the printer, picking up a volume, asked the price. He then suggested that, as a publisher, he was entitled to a 10 per cent discount. To this the clerk assented. "As I am also the author of the book," said Mark Twain, "I must appear that I am again entitled to 50 per cent discount." And the clerk said, "And you are not a clerk?" "Well," drawled the unblinking humorist, "under these conditions I think I will take the book. 'What's the next?'" The clerk took out his pencil and figured industriously. "Then," he said, with great obsequiousness, "as near as I can calculate we owe you the book and about 27 1/2 cents."

Kava In New Way.

The national beverage of the Samoan Islanders is "kava," obtained from the dried fruit of a plant known to the botanist as Piper methysticum.

The classic method of its preparation was by chewing, this work being done by maidens; then water was added, and, after straining, the stuff was ready to drink.

Missionaries convinced the natives that this method did not accord with the best social customs, and so nowadays they grind the kava root in a stone mortar with a stone pestle.

To any unaccustomed person kava tastes rather like cognac, though some say it has a flavor of vanilla. Many Americans, however, having acquired a liking for it, drink it by the gallon. But the native way of preparing it is too slow for them, and they prefer to use a meat-grinder.

The newspaper publishers are getting it in the neck. Paper, ink, wages—everything, in fact—had doubled in price before the first of this month, and another big rise in paper, and increased newspaper postage to be paid by the publisher, add \$9,000,000 more to the cost of publishing Canadian newspapers. The Graphic has to carry its share of this burden, and it can do so only by getting higher rates for advertising.

THE PLEBISCITE.

That every county in the province but one voted in favor of Prohibition is surely a strong endorsement of the present act.

The provincial majority in favor of prohibition is in the proportion of two to one in a poll only slightly in excess of fifty per cent. of the total qualified vote. The majority against the sale of beer and wine, while slightly less, is so large that there can be no questioning the opinion of those who voted. The failure of between 40 and 50 per cent. of the qualified voters to express their preference leaves opportunity to say that the verdict is not a full expression of popular sentiment, but it can safely be answered that in few recent elections has a much larger percentage of the vote been polled. It can also be answered, and perhaps with the same degree of safety that a poll of the unvoted—could such a poll be had—would show at least the same proportions; if not a greater percentage in favor of prohibition. In other words, the government can safely accept Saturday's verdict as a fair expression of New Brunswick's opinion on the issues submitted to the electorate, and can safely use the result as the basis for whatever steps may be considered necessary in enforcing the existing act and in making its items even more drastic.

In Restigouche county the organizers for Prohibition are to be congratulated upon the success which crowned their efforts.

JOSEPH VERDAU KILLED ON TRACK

Struck by Limited While Walking on Track Near Richards.

A most distressing accident happened on Saturday night on the railway track just above Richards mill when the incoming Ocean Limited struck Joseph Verdaul who was walking along the track. The unfortunate man was struck about the head, and lived but a few moments after the accident. Deceased who was in his 22nd year was a son of Mrs. Thos. Verdaul of Kedgewick and had been employed at Richards mill. Being deaf and dumb he did not hear the approaching train. Much sympathy is expressed for the bereaved family. The funeral which was held yesterday morning from D. F. Graham's undertaking rooms, Rev. Father Melanson officiating, was largely attended.

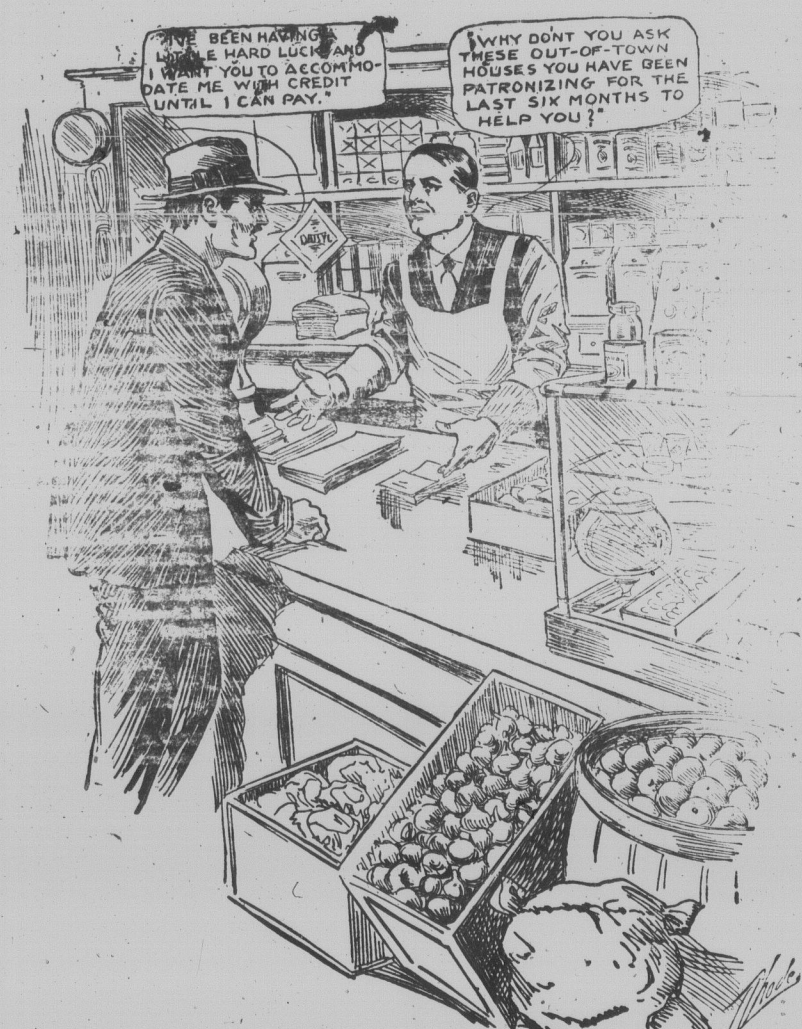

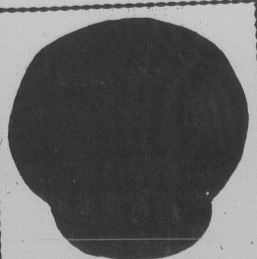

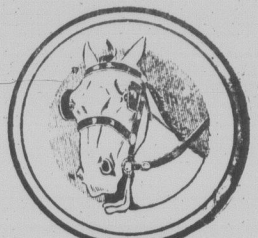

VICTORY FOR
PROHIBITION

Every County in Province Except One Vote in Favor of Prohibition.

With a majority of 21,000 for the retention of the Provincial Prohibition Act and a majority of approximately 15,000 against the sale of light wines and beer, the Province of New Brunswick gave emphatic expression on Saturday to its position regarding the great question of prohibition, at the plebiscite held throughout the province.

The four counties, Restigouche, Madawaska, Gloucester and Kent which were thought would go wet upset all calculations and each one with the exception of Madawaska returned a verdict for prohibition and against wines and beer, while Kent was the only county which gave a majority for Beer and Wine.

These were the counties feared by the prohibitionists and the ones expected to damage their cause. Workers for the cause of prohibition feel that the question has been settled for all time in the province and that it is now up to the government to see that a rigid enforcement of the law is carried out.

The women of New Brunswick were most active in the campaign and at the polls. They were enthusiastic in support of the present law and against wines and beer. They were at all polling booths and worked diligently for the success of their cause.

In Restigouche the temperance forces worked hard and rolled up a good majority for Prohibition. The women took a very active part in the fight and to them is ascribed the honor of the victory.
