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General News.

—Work has commenced on the
World's Fair grounds and buildings.

—Thomas Woodcock, of Wingham has
been fined \$15 and costs for using postage
stamps which had been previously used.

—The Portuguese on the Zanzibar are
rigorously boycotting the British. They
do not permit natives to sell even the
necessaries of life to English vessels.

—The chief officers in connection with
the taking of the census were notified to
present themselves at Ottawa on the 4th
inst. to receive instructions.

—George Westinghouse has received
\$250,000 for his air brake patents from
the London Air Brake Company. He is
also to receive a salary of \$30,000 a year to
cover any air brake inventions he may
produce.

—A parcel post arrangement has been
concluded between Canada and Barbados.
Overseas are being made with
the other West India Islands and with
Hong Kong.

—Mrs. Bertine Meloch, of Petiotote
near Windsor, Ont., Sunday night, gave
birth to three girls. The mother will
make an application for the Queen's
bounty of £5 sterling.

—A show of fat men has just been
held at Berlin. The gentlemen to
whom the prize was awarded weighed
400 pounds.

—Boston has just interned
one of its weightiest citizens—Mr. Bean,
who balanced the scale at 504 pounds.

—A collision occurred at Florence Kas,
between a passenger train and the train
bearing the troops from the seat of the
Indian difficulty in the west. Two sol-
diers and many cavalry horses were kil-
led.

—A well-known scientist has declared
that there is no such thing in nature as
a black cat. There is no case known in
science of a cat of this kind that has not
at least one tuft of white hairs to break
the monotony of color.

—Two hundred workmen in a suburb
of Berlin having 36,000 inhabitants,
claimed an annuity from the State on
the ground of old age on the first of
this month. A new law, the Invalided
and Aged Workmen's Insurance Law
then came into force.

—John Hisslop, a county official near
Hamilton, Ont., was murdered by masked
burglars, last week. The ruffians
painted a loaded pistol at his head and
blew his brains out on his refusal to
deliver up his money. The murderers are
still at large. A reward of \$800 is
offered for their apprehension.

—Mrs. Grace E. Ridely, of Amboy,
Ill., who went to sleep about nine mon-
day, awoke on Friday last for the first
time. She wandered about the house,
but did not speak a word. At
last she took her accustomed seat at
the table, but could eat nothing, and
when some one of the family attempted
to assist her she motioned them away
with a guttural sound, but no distinct
word was uttered.

—Archbishop Ireland has issued a
letter to the clergy of the archdiocese
of St. Paul, in which he forbids every
practice that in any way resembles a
lottery at Catholic fairs, prohibiting all
selling of chances, raffles, fish ponds,
post offices, and other devices generally
in practice at such entertainments, and
upon which church people largely rely
for their receipts. The letter has ex-
cited general interest.

The Canadian Samson.

Owing to the rivalry that exists in
England, Australia, Germany and Amer-
ica, Sandow, Cyclops, Hercules, Abba
Ajax, Polydore and others, and the in-
crease interest over feats of putting up
heavy weights, Richard K. Fox, of New
York, has decided to prove there is no
man living who can excel Louis Cyr, the
ex-police man of Montreal, in feats of
strength.

In order to decide this question, he
has agreed to put up a trophy to repre-
sent the all-round heavy weight-lifting
championship of America, England,
Germany or Australia, who will accom-
plish Cyr's seven feats, viz:—
No. 1.—Lifting 4,000 pounds of pig
iron with hands and back, without har-
ness.

No. 2.—Putting up to shoulder a 255
pound dumb-bell with one hand and then
pushing it up to arm's length.

No. 3.—Shouldering a barrel of ce-
ment, weight 300 pounds, with one
hand, without artificial means.

No. 4.—Lifting with one hand a woman
hanging on a ladder, holding them on
his chin in a perpendicular position.

No. 5.—Lifting with one finger a man
weighing 160 pounds, a 232-pound dumb-
bell and a 150-pound dumb-bell.

No. 6.—Lifting a 750-pound platform
on which are twenty men and a 250
pound dumb-bell, with his back.

No. 7.—Holding out in horizontal posi-
tion a 100-pound dumb-bell with one
hand.

SELLING LIQUOR TO INDIANS.—L. Vankoughnet, Deputy Superintendent General of Indian Affairs at Ottawa, has issued a circular to all magistrates and justices of the peace, calling their attention to the sale of liquor to the Indians, complaints of which are constantly received by him. Accompanying the circular is a printed notice which declares that any person who sells, barter, or gives, either directly or indirectly liquor to Indians will be prosecuted to the utmost rigor of the law, and are liable to a fine of \$300 and six months imprisonment. Half the fine will be paid to the informer.
