ts and ying so London, Nov. 27.—Yesterday's events did not relieve the tension, but rather accentuated the complications of the situation. Mr. Gladatone's letter produced a strong impression upon the Nationalists, and from the indications given at the hastily summoned meeting it seemed that there was every reason to believe that yesterday would bring about new developments (which would lead to an amicable arrangement of the trouble. But although the conferences prove that great divergence of opinion exists, they show that Parnell is nearly resolved to adhere to his decision, and that unless a vote of non-confidence is passed by his followers he will not abdicate the leadership. After a long and earnest discussion of the situation, in which the most candid and outspoken opinions were given, Parnell positively gained a victory. The members, however, who advocated his retention, deprecated the idea of a final decision until the opinion of the entire party shall have been recorded. The meeting adjourned after nearly three hours of speechmaking, in order to obtain the views of the absent members of the party. A careful inquiry brings out the fact that little doubt exists as te the upshot of the matter. When the party reasembles on Monday it is probable Parnell will again be urged to retire by a section of his supporters, but already a reaction in his favor has set in, and if a vote is taken it is expected a large majority will be found on his side.

The meeting of the Parnellite members of the House of Commons, after the letter The meeting of the Parnellite members of the House of Commons, after the letter from Mr. Gladstone to Mr. Morley had been made public, was a stormy one, and the action of Mr. McCarthy in not making known the contents of Mr. Gladstone's letter at the meeting of the Parnellites yesterday morning was severely criticised. A majority of the Nationalist members present said they had believed, previous to the meeting in the morning, that Mr. Parnell, after his re-election, would not take an active part in politics for a few months. They now believed, if Mr. Gladstone's letter had been read at the morning meeting, the vote to retain Mr. Parnell as leader would have been different. Another meeting was held yesterday afternoon at which Mr. Parnell presided. He explained that he reconsidered his determination and had called the meeting at the request of the members of the party. The meeting lasted for half an hour. There was great divergence of opinion manifested throughout the discussion. No definite action was taken, and the meeting. Parnell's speech gave no indication that he intended to alter his decision to retain the leadership. Mr. Nolan was the only member present who flavored Parnell's retention of the office. Mr. McCarthy, whose frequent allusions to Mr. Parnell's great sacrifices to the Irish cause were applauded, said he hoped that after due consideration Parnell would see his way clear to retire for the present and save the sacred cause of Irish independence. It is stated that at the midday meeting of the Parnellites at least 50 favored retaining Parnell as leader. Several others, however, had written their resignations and were ready to present them in the event of a decision that Parnell should remain. In the latter case a meeting of the Liberals was to be called to express confidence in Gladstone and to appeal to him to continue as leader of the party.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 27.—Terrible stories are told regarding the kameras, or apartments, where men and women are temporarily imprisoned at Tomsk, Siberia. LONDON, Nov. 27.—A dispatch from Suakim says that the desert chief Senoussi is marching against the Mahdi with a large and well-armed force, and that the Mahdi, owing to numerous desertions and privation, is in no condition to meet the enemy. In Khartoum and vicinity all the food has been seized for the support of the Mahdi's followers, and the inhabitants are perishing by hundreds. An Arab living in Khartoum is said to have killed one of his slaves, the family being without food, and lived, with his household, for several days on the remains.

Crowds of people throughout the distressed district are demanding work from the priests and poor law guardians. It is admitted by the authorities that within three weeks many of the people in the Swineford district will be without food of any kind. Delegates have started for London to urge upon the Government the necessity of taking steps for the alleviation of the distress.

BREILN, Nov. 27.—Dr. Damm's pamphlet, entitled "Versus Koch," says:

Experiments with Lymph in London.

London, Nov. 27.—An interesting series of experiments were begun yesterday in the use of Prof. Koch's carative lymph at the King's College Hospital. Dr. Cheyne, one of the physicians attached to the hospital, who is a friend of Prof. Koch, has succeeded in procuring a quantity of the lymph and yesterday made the first injection to four patients, one of whom was suffering from tuberculosis of the hip, another from tuberculosis of the hip, another from tuberculosis of the foot, another from phthisis. Watchers have been selected who will take turns in noting the effects of the inoculation. A large number of doctors and students were close observers of the method of treatment.

At a meeting of the Medical Association, Prof. Virchow presiding, Dr. Koch was unanimously elected a member of the organization.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—The following is an abstract of the annual report of Mr. S. I. Kimball, general superintendent of the life-saving service:

The establishment embraced at the close of the last fiscal year 233 stations, 176 being on the Atlantic, 46 on the lakes, 10 on the Facific and 1 at the falls of the Ohio, Louisville, Ky. The number of disasters to documented vessels within the field of station operations during the year was 384. There were on board these vessels 3,197 persons, of whom 3,159 were saved and 38 lost. The number of ahlpwrecked persons who received succept a shipwrecked persons who received succor at the stations was 788, to whom 1,876 days' relief in the aggregate was afforded. The estimated value of the vessels involved in the disasters was \$5,266,853, and that of their cargoes \$2,289,055, making the total value of property imperilled \$7,555,908. Of this amount \$5,451,843 was saved and \$2,144,055, least 15,545, was saved and

Of this amount \$5,451,843 was saved and \$2,104,055 lost. The number of vessels totally lost was 76.

In addition to the foregoing, there were during the year 145 casualties to smaller craft, such as sailboats, rowboats, etc., on which there were 229 persons, of whom 238 were saved and 10 lost. The property involved in these instances is estimated at \$81,527, of which \$59,102 was saved and \$2,425 lost. In addition to persons saved from vessels there were 27 others rescued who had fallen from wharves, piers, etc., and who would have perished without the aid of the life-saving crews.

The crews saved without outside assistance 167 vessels, valued with their cargoes at \$065,020, and assisted other efforts in saving 84 vessels, valued with their cargoes at \$1,502,210, making the aggregate number of vessels which they saved and assisted to save during the year 251, involving \$2,167,-236 of property.





In Manitoba the Local Legislature unanimously voted in favor of complete reciprocity, and in all the other Provinces the feeling is strongly in favor of only electing M. P.s that will favor reciprocity in everything. The people are acquiring wisdom. They know that if they wish a policy to prevail they must put the men in power who favor it, who will work for it, who will achieve it, if honorable

means will effect that end. and newspapers asserting that the restric-tionists favor reciprocity, but they have always reservations. They wish to reserve to elves the right to stand by the com bines, and to sacrifice the interests of the majority of the people, and so they favor a reciprocity which they know they cannot get. Now what is the use of agitating for that which is known to be clearly impossible of attainment? Let us be practical, fellow Canadians. The Chicago Tribune, which has wide influence as a moderate Republican journal, says:

It is strange that the Canadians cannot learn the lesson that the Americans nover again will consent to restricted reciprocity. The day has passed when they will concede reciprocity in this or that article. It must be reciprocity in averything.

UNDER THE SEMAPHORE.

Senator Morgan, of Alabama, Expresses

Bis Opinion.

Washington, Nov. 27.—The first of the leading Senators to declare himself of the subject of the trade relations between the United States and Canada is Mr. Morgan, of Alabama. He is a member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, and one of the ablest men in public life here. He says: "I will be very glad to see a just treaty of commercial reciprocity with Canada, to follow or to include a full and free settlement of all our controversies with Great Britain about the respective rights of the people on our northern borders and the adjacent islands and seas. Less than this will only patch up a truce to the controversies that have already done great injury to both countries. Our northern border is very frequently a dangerous thing to the interests and security of our people. A large part of the border line runs through the great lakes, separating the sovereign jurisdictions by lines that are incapable of visible demarcation. In the recent tariff legislation we encountered questions arising from this fact that were very difficult deal with in respect of the duty we should impose upon fish caught in British waters. If the subject was of great financial importance we could not avoid frequent collisions with the Canadian authorities in the effort to enforce this law. All these considerations move us urgently to have a settlement of all our relations with Canada and Great Britain that are so suggestive of immediate dangers. Shortly before 4 o'clook yesterday, reliet in the shape of death came to Mr. James Smith, and his earthly career and sufferings were no more. For the past week it was known that he could not recover and a large circle of friends have sorrowfully waited for the end, and it came at the hour stated. When first compelled to keep his bed, about nine weeks ago, Mr. Smith appeared to understand that death was nigh and he never once thought that he would ever again be himself. Deceased was born in Stillorgan, a small place about four miles from Dublin, Ireland, in 1829, the family consisting of William, Sarah, Bessie, Elizabeth, Jane, Mary, Ann, John and himself. He came to Canada in 1850 and settled in this city, working for a time as clerk for the late Mr. J. C. Meredith, clerk of the Division Court. Leaving this, Mr. Smith was engaged by Messrs. McDonough & Kent as bookkeeper, and while so engaged he also kept the books of several other business men of the city. After the disastrous fire which visited this firm Mr. Smith entered the hotel business, starting the Albion Restaurant in the Albion Block, next to the postoffice. From there the hotel was moved to his old stand on Richmond street below Dundas, and subsequently around the corner to Dundas street, where it is located at present. Mr. Smith was a warm-hearted, genial host and generous friend, and made countless acquaintances, who will hear of his demise with regret. He was a zealous fraternal society man, and was initiated into an Oddfellows' lodge in the pioneer days. He was a hard worker and became successively grand socretary, grand master and grand Lodge, Ne. 2, and also a member of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, in which he held the office of master of finance until his death. He was also a Freemason, being in communion with St. George's Lodge No. 42. Recognizing that the end was at hands some time ago, he spoke to a close friend, relative to his tuneral and recuested that it be attended with Oddfel.
