#### CENTRAL POWERS DROP MASK: NOT FOR A DEMOCRATIC PEACE

Petrograd, Jan. 3.—The Bolsheviki foreign minister, Leon Trotzky, declared today that the Government, for the Russian workers, would not consent to the German peace proposals.

M. Trotzky's declaration was made before the central committee of the Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates, during an address, in which he denounced in scathing terms "Germany's hypocritical peace proposal," asserting that the Government of Russian workers would not consent to such conditions. He said that if the central powers did not agree to free disposal of the destiny of the Polish and Lettish nations it would be urgently necessary to defend the Russian revolution. He said the needs of the front would be satisfied, whatever effort might be necessary.

Representatives from all the fronts who attended the meeting declared the troops would defend the revolution, but said bread and boots were necessary.

After describing the actions of the Germans in Poland and Lithuania in recruiting for forced labor and shooting hunger strikers, the pamphlet continues: "The German Government only found support in Courland from the hated slave owners, the German barons, who have their prototype in the Polish landowners."

The document declares Germany desires to free the peoples on Russia's western frontier from the scope of the revolution in order to subjugate them with German capital, impose an Austrian monarchy on Poland, and make Lithuania and Courland German duchies. It concludes:

"On such a basis the Russian Workmen's Government can never enter negotiations."

After hearing the evidence the magistrate reserved his decision to permit R. J. Fisher for the prosecution and E. W. M. Flock for the defendent to submit authorities regarding the questions in dispute.

Laidley was arrested on the street by Constable Irwin because the officer said he believed Laidley had a bottle, although he showed not the slightest signs of intoxication.







### STEFANSSON IS NOT AT FORT YUKON; FAR FROM CIVILIZATION

Recent Message Carried to Fort Yukon From Herchell.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—Contrary to the popular impression created by a recent dispatch from the north country to the effect that Vildjalmier Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, was safe at Fort Yukon, it is now learned that he is still in the vicinity of Baily or Herschell Island, and will not be back on the outskirts of civilization for some considerable time yet.

The message which arrived at Fort Yukon, dated November 10, and which announced that Stefansson and his party were safe, came from Herschell by messenger overland. It is believed that Stefansson and his party are at Herschell still. He has three boats, the Polar Bear, the North Star and another. These are undoubtedly frozen in either at Herschell or at Baily siand. It is possible that Stefansson may come back to civilization with the Royal Northwest Mounted Police patrol, which leaves Dawson for Fort Mac-Pherson during the new year, and which will return in about a month. If he decides to do so he will meet the patrol at MacPherson.

In any case the patrol will likely bring back full particulars about the party. If he decides to stay till he can bring his vessels back it will be August before he can get around Point Barrow and out. There are about 24 in the party.






