### PREMIER ASQUITH WAS ABSENT POLITICAL CRISIS IS DELAYED

British Parliament Reassembled Today-Ministers Held a Lengt hy Session—Some of Them Appeared To Be Favorable to Putting Veto Resolution to the Lords.

[Associated Press.]

London, Nov. 15.-Parliament reassembled today, but in the absence of Premier Asquith the proceedings lacked the acute interest that had been anticipated, and the political crisis is delayed until Friday. By that time the Premier will have seen King George again and laid before his majesty the decisions reached by the cabinet at the day's session, which was unusually prolonged.

The fact that the ministers were in conference for two and a half hours was taken to indicate that two or three of them were favorable to the plan of asking the Lords to accept or reject the veto resolutions before the dissolution of parliament.

An adjournment until Friday was taken at the request of Chancellor Lloyd George, who said that circumstances had arisen "which in the judgment of the Government rendered it undesirable to proceed with the business set down for today."

He added that Premier Asquith would be in a position on Friday to make a statement of the Government's plans. The House of Commons was crowded to its capacity and a nervous

The Present Prices At present the price of live hogs in London is \$6 60 to \$6 65 per hundredweight, and a further reduction is Last year the price at this such citizenship. time was \$7 40 to \$7 50, with indications of a rise. Dressed hogs are now selling at \$9 to \$9 50, compared with \$10 to \$10 50 last year. Although at this time of the season every year the hog prices take a slump, it will be seen from these figures that there is practically a dollar difference in the prices of each year, yet the present retail price is as high or higher than the price of last year.

#### MEAT PRICES LOWER

Beef in New York Has Dropped Four Cents a Pound. [By Associated Press.]

New York, Nov. 15 .- Reports from various parts of the country, indicating a fall in the price of meats, are reflected by similar reports from local They say the decline has already begun, wholesale price of beef having dropped off at an average of three to four cents in the last age of three to four cents in the last week. This was regarded as significant by them, since no such pricecutting had been experienced in the past year.

#### PARIS SUFFERING FROM SEINE FLOOD

#### Many Subterranean Passages Filled With Water-Poor in Low Districts Suffer.

Paris, Nov. 14. - There has been no abatement of the flood from the River Seine, which continues to rise. The gauge at Pont Royal marks a height of 5.93 metres, which is 3.45 metres above the normal and somewhat higher than that estimated a few days ago for this date. The river authorities, although the tributaries and sources of the Seine are reported to be falling, estimate the rise will continue until Thursday, when it is expected the flood will reach a maximum of 7.20 metres, a little more than two metres short of the disastrous floods of last

January.

The low quarters at the eastern end deer. of the city and part of the Jardin des Plantes, or the Museum of Natural History, are now inundated, and the ubterranean passages to the Austerlitz station are flooded, gangways being improvised for passengers. 



#### MILK AND BUTTER STANDARDS FIXED

THE SEVEN WONDERS OF THE An Order-in-Council Announces Requirements of Lacteal Products-Harmless Coloring Allowed.

> [Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 14. - Milk, butter, and cheese standards have just been promulgated by an order-in-council. The standard for ordinary milk is 31/4 per cent of milk fat and 81/2 per cent of solids. Certified milk must contain 12 to 13 per cent of milk solids, not more than 10,000 bacteria per cubic centimetre, from June to September. or 5,000 from October to May, and must be taken from cows semi-annually given the tuberculosis test.

> Cream must have not less than 18 per cent milk fat, and must be free from any substance calculated to produce intensity. The standard prescribed for butter is 82.5 per cent of milk fat, and not more than 16 per cent of water. Cheese must have 45 per cent of milk

fat, and its coloring must be harm-Ice cream to be up to standard must have 14 per cent of milk fat, and less than 2 per cent of harmless stiff-



STABBED A GIRL

Unknown Man Under Arrest in Connection with Assault.



Americans Are Hoping That the Tariff on Meats Will Be Abolished.

The New York Herald of Sunday publishes the following table of illustrating the decline in meat prices in the past fortnight:

It was pointed out by the butchers that at the Retail Buchers' conven-tion in Chicago last September a committee was appointed by them to agitate for the removal of the duty on foreign meats. It was said that the members of this committee had received assurances from members of the Senate and the House of Representatives that in the event of Democratic victory at the polls the tariff would be removed.

Abolish the Tariff. Jacob Block, one time vice-president of the New York Retail Butchers' Association, said, in discussing subject: "We are positive that the tariff on meat imports will be abolished or reduced. The existing duty on imported meats, whether it be beef from South America or mutton from Australia or Canada, is two cents a port duty? I was in London recently and saw that American beef, the exporters have to pay three-quarters of a cent a pound for transportation

"It is not right that such conditions should prevail, and the one ray of hope is that the tariff on meats is to be abolished. The American workingman will then be able to eat meat once a day as he used to. At the present time he can eat meat only two or three times a week. Why when I first started in business meat was eaten three times a day in American homes and we had to put out a long line of meats for the breakfast demand. But the American workman certainly has a right to have meat once a day.

"The present reductions in the prices of meat are beyond a doubt a direct result of the election. The western beef packers are frightened. I do not expect to see the prices go much lower just now. The packers will await the action of congress, and f they see things going against them they will lower the prices still more in order to indicate that there is no need for a reduction in the tariff."

#### FIRE RANGING

Minister of Crown Lands Planning Revision of Forest Protection

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Nov. 14. — The provin-ial department of lands, forests and mines, it is stated, intends, on the advent of the new year, to grapple once and for all with problem of adequate protection from fire the forests and timbered crown lands of the Province.

While the official reports for the past session show that Ontario has escaped remarkably well from serious conflagrations, the dangers incurred have resulted in a searching investigation of Ontario's fire-ranging sys-

tem, by Hon. Frank Cochrane.
The minister has not made his plans public as yet, but it is understood that these involve a complete reorganization of the system of fire protection in vogue for many years past. None but efficient and experienced men will be appointed fire rangers in future, it is stated, and students, from whose ranks the fire-ranging staff has been largely drawn for some years, will be required to undergo a test before be-







This placed the trish party in a position to dictate, and when the new Parliament reassembled last spring, the Irish leaders sisted on the passage of a set of esolutions limiting the veto power of he House of Lords, before the consideration of the budget. The matter was finally settled in the Lower House by the introduction of a set of resolutions, which aimed to pass a law to prevent the House of Lords from rejecting or amending a money bill, but that such limitations shall not in anywise affect the rights and privileges of the Commons as they now exist.

The Second Resolution.

The second of the resolutions provided that the powers of the House of Lords respecting all other bills be re stricted, so that if any bill shall be passed by the Commons at three suc cessive sessions and rejected by the Lords at each of these sessions, it shall become a law without the assent of the Lords, provided that at least two years shall have elapsed between the introduction of the measure and its third passage by the House of Commons. The third resolution limited the duration of a parliament to five instead of seven years





"You have eliminated profit," said Mr. Waldron. "You would have reduced the farmer to penury." He reminded the club that in 1900 the exodus of native-born Canadians to the United States had reached 183,225. He denied that this exodus had ceased. There had been seventy thousand last year, mostly from the land, and mostly from Ontario


Neglecting Farms.
Depopulation and impoverishment, said Mr. Waldron, are shown in unrepaired buildings and fences, neglected orchards, ill-cultivated land, land turned to pasture, the disappearance of farm laborers, and their houses, and the significant fact that farm products have not appreciably responded to an extended period of high prices. Mr. Waldron quoted figures: In 18 cities the birth rate per 1,000 was 27.9, in 15 towns of over 5,000 the rate was 25.3, and in purely rural districts there were areas in which the rate had fallen to 14, scarcely exceeding the death rate. Difficulty is being found in maintaining a high level of rural educa-

tario, Mr. Waldron said, the population had gone back to the figures of 1865. In the past eight years the net loss in the rural population had been 63,000,000. Rural Perth since 1872 had lost 5,000; rural Norfolk 6,000; Huron 14,000. Since 1881 rural Middlesex had lost nearly 13,000. From 1888 to 1908 the rural population has fallen by 86,-In addition to this there are 130 000, while the urban population had increased by 450,000. The exiles were being replaced by Russian Jews, Macedonians, Greeks and Italians.

### FROM BATTLESHIP

Proves Aerial Navigation Will Be Factor in Naval Warlare.

Fort Monroe, Va., Nov. 14.-Aerial navigation proved today that it is a factor that must be dealt with in the naval tactics of the world's future if the successful flight made by Eugene B. Ely in a Curtiss biplane from the deck of the cruiser Birmingham can be taken as a criterion.

From Hampton Roads, Ely flew across the lower end of Chesapeake Bay, and landed on the shore opposite the fort.

When he struck the water on diving off the 83-foot platform erected on the bow of the Birmingham, salt water dashed into his face and goggles, so that he could not see for several minutes in which direction he was going. He planned to take a different course from that which he followed, and land a little further to the north. The highst height he attained was estimated at about 500 feet.
