BULGARIA APPROACHES ALLIES SEEKING A SEPARATE PEACE, IS WORD FROM SWITZERLAND

Bulgarian Minister at Berne Said To Have Made Overtures To Representatives of Entente, Looking To Peace.

London, April 12.—4:13 p.m.—Reports from a Swiss source have been received in Rome that the Bulgarian minister at Berne has made overtures to the Entente ministers with a view to the conclusion of a separate peace, says the Exchange Telegraph's Rome correspondent.

Similar advices regarding Bulgaria are sent by the Exchange Telegraph representatives at Lausanne. He reports that the Gazette of that city states it has learned that semi-official Bulgarian delegates are in Switzerland endeavoring to arrive at a basis for a separate peace with representatives of the Entente.

The past 24 hours has been marked by a general increase in the intensity of the fighting. The Germans appear to have been reinforced in the positions upon which the British assaults have driven them back, and are offering desperate resistance.

Various counter-attacks were launched, but with the exception of at Bellecourt these met with no success. Fighting for the key position at Monchy-le-Preux was very bitter, but with the British retaining

all their gains and consolidating the position. Time now is required to get forward the big guns and to make good the communications before attempting another great stroke.

With the British Armies Afield, April 12.—Canadians earned new honors today in a storming advance on a mile front south of the Vimy Ridge.

Dashing forward impetuously, they stormed and took nearly a mile of German trenches running south from the German commandant's house near the Fabarus Wood.

It was along this line of defence that the German forces have been clinging desperately since the first sweep forward of the Canadians cleared the top of the Vimy

MORE GUNS TAKEN. Headquarters reports today showed eleven more Ger-

man guns captured between Crosilles and Roeux. It was over ground inches deep in snow and flush, in cold, wet weather that the British and Germans battled man to man today-with the best man steadily winning. The British advance still continued. Stiffening resistance all along the line from Lens to St. Quentin showed that the Teutons were desperately striving to stop the encroaching wave of the British advance.

The British artillery superiority was also marked today. German marksmanship was bad.

ENTRANCE OF STATES FINAL STAMP UPON

Cornwall, April 12.—Sentence was handed down this morning in the case of Emerson St. Pierre, yesterday found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the death of his father, William St. Pierre, the Osnabruck Township welldigger, shot on February 8 and huried in the cellar of his home, and Nettle Richmire, paramour of the male prisoner, who this morning pleaded guilty to being an accessory after the fact. Emerson was given life imprisonment and the woman five years.

When the court had been opened the grand jury presented a true bill in the case of Nettle Richmire, who, upon being arraigned, pleaded guilty.

R. A. Pringle, K. C., Ottawa, crown being arraigned, pleaded guilty.

R. A. Pringle, K. C., Ottawa, crown counsel, addressing the judge, said that he had intended indicting Mrs. St. Pierre, widow of William St. Pierre, but the grand jury felt that her three little children should have her protection. His lordship would see that protection was afforded as far as possible. He would not press the indictment at the present time. The evidence against Mrs. St. Pierre as an accessory was not given the final stamp and seal to the character of the conflict, which was a struggle against military autocracy.

MILLION DOLLARS IN BUILDINGS PLANNED HERE THIS SPRING INCLUDES BIG FORD PLANT

Motor Company Will Install Coke Ovens Later On For SHE MAKES MUNITIONS, Enameling Cars-Industrial Expansion Includes Many New Plants and Addition's To Present Buildings - No Stagnation in Building Trade.

Notwithstanding somewhat unfavorable conditions, brought about by scarcity of labor and high prices of materials, the building season in London is opening with the big end of a million dollars worth of construction work in immediate sight. One of the biggest propositions of the year will be additions to the Ford plant here, which will entail an expenditure of about \$200,000. Manager Smith stated to The Advertiser today that work will be commenced inmediately on a factory addition three stories, 150×102 . The structure will be a handsome one of pressed brick with granite and terra cotta trimmings. A little later the firm will install coke overs with a capacity of 2,500 tons a day, and it is planned to enamel all the auto bodies here. When the addition is completed this fall about 75 more men will be given employment.

MILLS TO COST \$90,000.

The George A. Lochead Company of Toronto have the contract for the new Hunt Flour Mills in East London. The buildings and elevator will be of reinforced concrete, and will cost \$90,000.

Work is now well along on the \$100,000 addition to the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium at Byron. More work is planned and Architects Watt & Blackwell are getting out plans for large new stables.

Architect Nutter is getting out plans for an addition to an East London plant that will cost \$150,000.

Architect W. G. Murray is busy with plans for the new foundry and cupola house which Beatty Brothers will erect in Cheisea Green. These buildings will be of the most modern construction, and will cost about
